A CONTRIBUTION FROM AN ELDER.

Dear Friends,

"I was glad when they said unto me, Let us go into the house of the Lord" Psalm 122.

At this time of the year some of us are disappointed that we are unable to come to Church for our usual act of Worship and Spiritual Renewal for the coming week.

Television and radio offer us alternatives which may be helpful. We may find curselves worshipping in another Church or denomination from time to time.

Often these occasions leave us feeling that something is missing - is it because it is unfamiliar, different hymns or songs, or a different style of worship, or because we are alone? It would be a mistake to think that it was any the less sincere or God inspired. No one fellowship has ever held the monopoly of either receiving or passing on the Holy Gospel of God's love given to us in His Son Jesus. Indeed, we thank God for the diversity of ways in which His message is given: one way to the Shepherds, another to the Wise Men.

It is a gracious gift to be able to discern, receive and thus be inspired by the message, even if set in ways unusual to our own. Perhaps we may hear it in a verse of a hymn or song, the Bible reading, a sentence in a prayer or the Sermon. Perhaps, even, in the beauty of the flowers, or a stained glass window. It may be something quite simple, but precious, especially if it's directness stays with us in the next few days or weeks.

Read again Psalm 122, which some of us found helpful in the New Year's Day Prayer Vigil, and may it's words inspire us as we find our personal Jerusalem, and pray for and find peace within it's walls.

Especially remember their care of students from other lands and their witness to the Gospel.

In <u>Iran</u> Scripture supplies are exhausted. Pray that the authorities will allow the importing of Scriptures and the reopening of the Bible Society office.

TUE STUDENTS Universities and schools are back in full swing after the Christmas break. Pray for Christian teachers, Parent-governors and students to have a sanctifying influence on others through their witness. Remember organisations helping overseas students including the Universities and Colleges Christian Fellowship and the International Student Christian Services.

WED PAKISTAN Pray for Evelyn and John Mobson flying to Kunri in February for two months to help during the season when specialised treatment and surgery is given for eye related problems. They are supported by a Christian organisation in Germany which helps visually handicapped people.

TMU MEDIA Fray for Christians working in radio, TV and the press that their witness may be clear and their values God honouring. Those involved in setting up Christian programmes for and in Third World countries especially need wisdom.

FRI BANGLADESN Sadly it seems that official communication has come to an end with the Kushtia diocese. Still pray for the corporal and spiritual needs as they struggle to maintain a living church in a hostile environment. Marian Bairoi has moved to another girls hostel and is also doing social work in the community.

SAT IRAQ As Saddam Mussein continues to violate Inter-National law, causing much tension in the Middle East, let us praise the Lord for the many Bibles being distributed. There are still more needed. Pray for Christian workers and especially Arab Christians.

"Once, in a moment of discouragement, I took down every encouraging text that I had put up on the bare walls of an old house where the Walkers and I were camping at the time. (This was after a rather bad time of fever when Mrs. Walker took my Tamil books away. I couldn't even trawl round the walls of my Jericho, much less march!) At last I wrote this and put it up 'The Lord opened the mouth of the ass'. It was a great comfort."

A THOUGHT FOR LENT.

Greetings in the precious name of Jesus.

By now we should have consumed our pancakes on Shrove Tuesday and entered, on Ash Wednesday, the season of Lent, which lasts until Easter Eve. In the Christian calendar we are to regard this period, which embraces forty week-days, as a time of preparation for the celebration of the greatest event of all time, namely Easter.

The forty days are to remind us of the time Jesus spent in the wilderness being tempted by the devil. The Bible says that after fasting for forty days and nights Jesus was very hungry. The tempter came and invited Him, if He was the Son of God, to turn stones into bread. Jesus proclaimed that Scripture says, 'Man cannot live by bread alone, but every word that God speaks.'

I believe it is significant that Jesus. King of Kings and Lord of Lords, was tempted to put His own needs and desires first. And yet He resisted in the power of the Holy Spirit, quoting as His answer the all powerful word of God.

What greater preparation could we possibly have for Easter but to consciously determine to deny ourselves in putting God first in all the various areas of our own lives and in the life of our Church?

May our hunger in this season of Lent be not for the superficially attractive things of this world, but for the revealed word of God in Scripture. Let God's word really fill that part of our lives which no amount of pancakes will ever fill.

The plan to use any surplus from the proceeds of last year's harvest to re-start the building of the Manse has had to be postponed because the need to install electricity in the village clinic was given priority.

Sadly, without a Manse, they will not be assigned a Minister, so their spiritual leadership will be lacking, unless the Education Authority sends them another Christian catechist/teacher.




COACH OUTING.

FROM THE MODERATOR OF THE SOUTHERN PROVINCE OF THE UNITED REFORMED CHURCH, The Revd. David L. Helyar. MA.

Dear Friends in Christ,

We hear much these days about preserving a right and healthy environment.

Many years ago George Matheson remarked that, of all creatures, man is the most miserable. Why? Because 'he is the only creature in the world that does not know what is good for him - does not know his own environment.'

The message of Easter is that God offers us an end to our miserable condition. By allowing His Son, Jesus Christ, to die for us on the cross He overcomes the oppressive and stifling environment of sin and death. By raising Him from death He brings us with Him into a new environment of eternal life.

We have no power of our own to place ourselves in this environment of a new and living relationship with God. This is God's own work through His Son so that, as we believe in Him, we may experience that new environment.

As Paul writes: 'Anyone who is in Christ is a new creation; the old has gone, the new has come!'
(2 Corinthians 5:17.)

But this is not a new environment simply for the individual believer to enjoy. The death and resurrection of Jesus have cosmic and eternal significance. As the Easter hymn so rightly proclaims: 'Jesus lives - to Him the throne

Over all the world is given.'

It is the risen and exalted Christ, seated upon the throne, who says: 'I make all things new.' (Revelation 21. 5). We don't have to look beyond our own lives to know that there are habits and attitudes which need changing and renewing. We don't have to look further than our television sets to see that there is much in the world around us which is very far removed from God's just and loving purposes. Christ has won the victory - but is He really seated on the throne of our lives?

Furthermore, do we seek to relate His victory to all the daily events of life?

If we want to honour and serve our crucified and risen Lord, then we have to carry our Easter celebration into the routine of daily life. Only then can we fully know and enjoy the environment into which God has placed us.

My thoughts and prayers are with you this Easter, during your present ministerial vacancy, and in the

months ahead.

REPORT OF THE U.R.C. SUSSEX WEST DISTRICT COUNCIL MEETING 4.2.93.

The Meeting was held at Shelley Road URC, Worthing, and opening devotions were led by their Interim Moderator - Rev. Bob Murray.

The President welcomed new people, including a retired Minister, Freda Gurner who is now living in Lomas House. The President reported that several people are unwell, including Rev. Roy Clarke (He has since died). Peter McLellan, an Elder of Sompting, died last week of Motor Neurone Disease, aged 47.

Rev. & Mrs. Bill Purvis are shortly celebrating their Golden Wedding Anniversary.

DISTRICT SECRETARY The Council approved the Executive's nomination of Mr. Lang Popley, an Elder and former Church Secretary of Portslade URC, to serve as District Secretary for 5 years, to be reviewed annually.

TEVS OF THE CHURCHES. Clermont URC Brighton - there was much discussion about the appointment of Rev. George Musgrave of the Congregational Federation to serve as Interim Pastor there for 1 year. In the future it is hoped to discuss Ministry in collaboration with other URCs in Brighton.

Telscombe Cliffs. Rev. Alan Whillis was appointed Interim Moderator for 1 year.

The Brighton Churches are having further meetings to discuss their future Ministry.

Shelley Road URC. Worthing. Miss Kathleen Coltman is authorised to preside at Holy Communion during their vacancy. There is to be a meeting about scoping in March. Their eventual goal is thought to be a team Ministry, involving all 4 Thurches in the Worthing area.

Goring URC. Rev. John Flack is re-appointed as Interim Moderator for a period of 4 months, until the end of April.

<u>Littlehampton.</u> Rev. Noel and Mrs. Ann Shepherd leave Littlehampton United Church in March and are moving to Harrow United URC/Methodist Church. Mrs. Nancy Welch is appointed as Interim Moderator until their new Methodist Minister is welcomed on 5th September 1993 at 7.30pm.

East Vittering Church. Mr. Jim Bailey of Chichester URC/Methodist is to serve as Lav Pastoral Assistant under the supervision of Rev. Alf Lawson of Selsey Methodist. Mr. Bailey is already assisting with the West Wittering Church.

Pagham. Rev. Bob Boulter retired from Pagham at the end of February and will live in Selsey. Rev. Peter Newell (recently retired from Upminster, who is the son-in-law of the late Ralph Beale) is now living in Storrington and was appointed as Interim Moderator of Pagham for one year.

Scoping Policy. The Pastoral Care Committee is sending a letter to all Churches explaining the situation in the URC, and particularly the Southern Province, regarding the Ministerial situation. shall need to reduce the number of Ministers as we already have too many in this Province and, with 19 Ministers due to retire over the next 3 years, and not enough students in training to replace them, it is likely that Churches with less than 150 members will not be scoped for a full-time Minister. scoped full-time Ministers now have flexibility clause written in, to enable them to assist other local UR Churches. It was hoped that this letter would be discussed at Elders' and Church Meetings. There was some discussion about pastoral care should be exercised within the District - such as a District visitation every 5 years, or new Support Groups for each Church, or an annual written report to the Pastoral Care Committee who seeks to provide continuous care for all Churches.

Financial Matters. The car mileage allowance has been raised from 20 pence a mile to 25 pence a mile from January 1st 1993.

Peacehaven Resource Centre - their financial situation is much better and the Centre is moving to a central site in Telscombe Cliffs.

<u>Property Matters.</u> New regulations concerning fire safety in places of Public Assembly were due to be introduced on Jan 1st 1993 but, because the cost in some cases could be very high, the Government is

reconsidering the matter. Ken Ashby hopes to inform all Churches of these regulations by July.

Bosham is very happy with the transformation of its Chapel and Hall.

Hounsom continues to have vandalism problems. Information was given about the possible infilling of the Church and Church Hall.

Goring - damage from a recent break-in was reported. Shelley Rd. have successfully let their Manse and essential work on the kitchen area of the Church has been completed.

Youth Matters. Paul West, of Sompting, will speak about PILOTS at the District Meeting in June.

On April 3rd an April Fools Evening will be held at St. Columba's URC for youngsters over 10.

The Youth Service at Littlehampton in November 92 was good.

It is hoped to hold a Youth Leadership training course at Sompting this year, in September.

Yorld Church and Mission. It is hoped to hold a District Day in the Autumn at Central Hove, on Evangelism.

A Christian Radio Station is being proposed for Greater London.

Available for Church House is John Finney's book 'Finding Faith Today.'

Locally, Rustington URC invited Simon Ward of Scripture Union to discuss with them about their lack of young people. As a result, Simon Ward will be spending a week with them, getting into a local primary school to take assemblies together with members of their Church. In addition there will be Special Families activity Day on the Saturday and a family Sevice on the Sanday. We are asked to pray for the in this watere or faith, for the week large and and a family Sevice of the Sanday.

Synod Inminations were approved by the Council. but further Representatives are required for Church and Society Committee, the Ministries Candidates Committee, as well as a District Ecumenical Officer! Other News Items.

The District Elders' Day held on Jan 30th was very worthwhile and one of the best well attended by 125 Elders.

Nominations are required from the District to attend the General Assembly at Portsmouth from July 5th to 9th.

Friday March 12th is the CPAS Ladies' Workshop Day at St. Stephen's C of E in Angola Road, Worthing.

August 7-13 is the World Mission Family Holiday Conference at Swanwick entitled 'Journey to Justice', with particular reference to South Africa.

August 21-27 is the URC Family Forum at Swanwick, celebrating 21 years of the United Reformed Church. I mentioned about our Church Family Weekend in Eastbourne April 2 - 4.

The next District Council Neeting will be held at Petworth on April 15th 1993.

REPORT FROM THE STEVARDSHIP COMMITTEE.

At the Church Meeting held on 25th Feb it was agreed that we could proceed with repairs specified for YEAR 3 of the Quinquennial Survey. These are considerably more expensive than for the repairs carried out last year.

1. Renew roof over Minister's Vestry, Boiler Room and Inner Passage with high performance felt. Work to be carried out by Stoner Asphalte of Southwick.

Price £1034, including VAT.

- 2. Overhaul tiled roof above Church Hall (built in 1948), Mr. R.J.Surridge will replace defective tiles at a cost of £186.
- 3. Resurface Drive. 4 Estimates were obtained and it was decided to proceed with the third lowest which was from WARINGS CONTRACTORS LTD. of Hilsea, Portsmouth. Cost, including VAT £5578.
- I have asked the Contractors to notify the Church well in advance of the date they propose starting as there will be considerable disruption, and access to the drive could be difficult at times.
- 4. Floor repairs East Hall. Remove existing pine block floor, and lay new IROKO wood block floor. Mr. R.J.Surridge and South Coast Floors will carry out this work. Cost £3042 inclusive.

I have requested that this work is undertaken during the Summer holidays.

The Manse. 140 George V Avenue.

Repairs completed are as follows:-

Treatment of woodworm in roof timbers and understairs cupboard by Rentokil Ltd.

Upgrade electrical installation - work undertaken by D.H.Amey Ltd.

Mr. C.A.J.Edwards has installed a balanced flue gasfired boiler on wall of kitchen (old boiler removed). Churchill Vindows of Lancing have fitted double glazing replacement windows on rear and side elevations.

General repairs not started.

The committee wish to thank Mr. Stanley Sanders for his excellent work in maintaining the flower beds and verges at the Church, and for offering to fit 4 new units in the kitchen at the Manse. (Units were purchased at a discount price from B. & Q.)

Also our thanks to Mr. Roy Gooderham who maintains the garden at the Manse.

Damage caused by the break-in on 19/20 December 1992 cost £640.00 to repair. A compensation claim for £640 has been sent to Officer in Charge, Police Station, Worthing. Court proceedings have been instituted, and the first Court appearance was on 22nd Feb 1993. Following the break-in A.D.High and Son Ltd., installed 3 security lights on the East elevations of the Church. The West elevation may also need security lights, but it is possible that there will be adequate lighting from the Inland Revenue car park.

TRIP TO SAUDI ARABIA.

My three weeks trip to Saudi Arabia, connected with my job, proved to be an experience in many ways. For a start, the flight took about 14 hours, stopping at Jeddah and Riyadh, and changing planes to Dharan. This, plus the time difference of 3 hours ahead, meant I was absolutely shattered upon arriving at the hotel. The hotel itself was excellent, as was the food. (I put on a stone in weight) Language was not a problem as English is widely spoken.

The Arabs don't really produce anything of their own, apart from oil, of course. The Suks (local shops) were owned mainly by people from India, Sri Lanka and the Phillipines. I thoroughly enjoyed the bartering system and managed to settle on a few bargains; however, many of the goods for sale are imitations; gold is still the best buy.

Before I left I was determined to see some of the country, so took off on a 50 mile trip of the surrounding area. The desert proved to be more rocky than sandy, with not one camel in sight!

I was glad to return to the UK when I did as there was a lot of movement at the Air Base due to the situation with Iraq.

By the time you read this I will be off on my travels again, this time I shall be staying in Southern Saudi Arabia at Khamis Mushayt/Abha, which is 7000 feet above sea level. I am told it will be very hot and dry, and the atmosphere will be very thin, so I will be more light-headed than usual. Also, I hope it doesn't rain this time. (We were almost flooded out last time!)

I must thank you all for the prayers and support you gave to my family while I was away. It is great to belong to a loving and caring family.

MINISTRY IN THE WORTHING AREA.

Over the last year there have been regular meetings of representatives of all the Worthng United Reformed Churches with the West Sussex District Pastoral Care Committee (PCC) regarding the distribution of our resources, with particular reference to the ordained ministry. This has been reported to both Elders' and Church Meetings, although until now no significant progress has been made, or suggestion made.

In February 1993 a letter was received from the PCC addressed to all the Churches, on its policy for scoping. In substance it contained nothing different from what we were told at the time we received the scoping for our Church in April 1992, that is, that the Southern Province has already more than its fair share of Ministers, and our own District should aim to reduce the number of full-time Ministers. "No Church with fewer than 150 members should expect to have 'its own' Minister" except in exceptional circumstances.

Although we are scoped for a full-time Minister with a built-in clause of 'flexibility', how this flexibility is introduced needs interpreting. It implies that our scoping may be changed, but only after consultations between the committee and the Church, and any Minister in post. However, we are called upon to be outward looking and flexible. Sharing our Minister with other Churches to help with pastoral care was implied at the time of our scoping. Now it may be that we need to think more positively about a 'team ministry' in Worthing, perhaps 3 Ministers to 4 Churches.

The practicalities of how this may be applied will take much consultation and planning between the Churches as vacancies occur. Perhaps an opportunity to discuss this should be made at Church meeting, but if you have any positive suggestions, or have experience of team ministry and how it was set up in other areas, please put your ideas in writing to one of the Secretaries.

URGENT PRAYER REQUEST. HEVS FROM MOSCOW CAUSES GREAT CONCERN.

President Yeltsin's attempt to govern by decree, prior to a referendum on who rules Russia, could have far-reaching implications for Christians there. If he fails the 'old guard' may return to power, with committee-style government built on ATHEISTIC foundations. The Church would be an early target for special attention.

Evidence of this possibility is seen in what happened on the first morning of the attempted coup of August 1991. Our office received a telephone call at 10am demanding that all publication and distribution of Christian literature must cease.

A very clear signal of intent!

So let us pray that forces of evil, darkness and oppression may be driven back from the seat of power so that all Russians may be able to continue to exercise freedom of conscience and that the Church may progress openly with the work of the GOSPEL..... At the same time praise GOD that the Easter television production for Russian children moved ahead unhindered.

PASTORAL LETTER

Dear Friends,

John in his letter to his friends, John Ch.4 v.16) writes "God is love." (1 Knowing this we can also say, "Love is God." John goes on, "Whoever lives in love lives in God and God in him." This means that wherever there is Christian love, there is God. In his Gospel John records Jesus' commandment "Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." Living in faith and obedience brings us close to our Heavenly Father in love. We know the properties of love, how it heals and how it hurts, how it makes demands upon us and how it compensates. We know how love comforts us and blesses us, and we know the anguish which is felt when love is denied.

God gave us His Son Jesus; Love Incarnate and Divine. Love crucified and risen that we might be free yet held by that love. This is Love in action. His face will have worn all the expressions of love, expressions that can be readily observed everyday in the faces of the people. Those we know well, relatives and friends; those we see in the neighbourhood, in the shops and in the street; those we encounter across the world when we we see broadcast into our travel; and those homes when we watch the News. Joys and sorrows. The presence of God however difficult to grasp, becomes clearer and more real when, whether in Bosnia, starving Africa or any place apparent hopelessness, we see Christians upholding the weak and the helpless.

But not everyone knows that love which is of God. Many do not recognise Him, and so Jesus commissioned His disciples to make His love known to the world. (Matthew Ch.28) We have a priceless gift to share, but how? Jesus has taught us how by His own Ministry, in

His own community. We take love to our neighbours when we pray for them; when we visit them or invite them to our home; when we offer a word of support or share in their rejoicing; When we telephone them, or write a little note; sometimes all we have to offer is a listening ear or a loving smile. Jesus said "Whatever you did for one of the least of these of mine, you did for Me." (Matthew Ch.25), We each have our part to play using the gifts that He has given us through His grace, and He will not fail us as we work alongside Him. who banishes fear and brings hope, comfort and strength, and He, if we ask Him, will us to be channels of His grace. His Kingdom is at hand.

God bless us all as we try to follow His example in our pastoral care of each other and all those with whom we are privileged to meet in His name. Amen.

REPORT OF THE SUSSEX VEST DISTRICT COUNCIL. MEETING ON APRIL 15th 1993.

The meeting at Petworth opened with devotions led by Mr. Stan Chapman. Mrs. Ruby Clarenbone chaired it. We stood in memory of Rev. Roy Clarke and Constance Fairhall of Lomas House. We prayed for Mrs. Audrey Clarke and Rev. Derek Morrill of Petworth who is now undergoing chemotherapy, also for Rev. Brian & Jen Sturtridge of Bognor and their daughter, Caroline on the recent tragic death of their son Jonathon whilst working with the Church in Taiwan. Officerships. Rev. Peter McIntosh will take Rev. Ron Christopher's place on Provincial Church and Society

Committee. A District Ecumenical Officer is required. Vacant Pastorates. Shelley Rd has been scoped full

time with full flexibility.

Goring. Mrs. Elsie Flack approved Interim as Moderator for 1 year from May 1st.

Care Report. Worthing. The Elders Churches (Goring, Sompting, representing 4 Columba's, Shelley Rd.) had a lively meeting with the Moderator and Ministers at Shelley Rd, exploring the possibility of team ministry. (Durrington LEP had not notified this time). A small working party is to be set up to look into the feasibility of 3 Ministers serving 4 Churches. There was much concern within the District meeting and it was felt that it was important to discuss these possibilities within the individual Churches because the ultimate decision for any team ministry lies with the local Church.

Flexibility. The Pastoral Care Committee brought a draft resolution on the flexibility clause which should be read in conjunction with their letter on scoping. It is important for all Churches to discuss this at Elders' and Church Meetings so that the District can discuss it at their September meeting.

Patoral Care of Churches. A new scheme Church to carry out a self-assessment at periodic intervals will be discussed at the next District Meeting in June.

Property Matters. Shelley Rd. has had a new roof over its kitchen area and has plans to improve the Church main entrance area. Ultimately they would like to have a coffee bar and lounge, toilets and a youth activity room.

Financial Matters. Ministry and Missions contributions for 1994 will be finalised after General Assembly.

Forward Planning Group. A small group meeting informally as and when needed to bring ideas to the District was approved.

Connect '93 will be in London on October 22 - 24.


BOOK AID.

ANOTHER LETTER FROM THE EDITOR OF REFORM

Dear Theophilus (to borrow a trick from St Luke).

If your magazine editor has allowed me the courtesy of this page in a previous issue, you will remember that I wrote about the first URC Mission Council last October as something 'disturbingly different'. There have been two more Mission Councils since then, and some who were there might comment that they were becoming disturbingly similar: they are always under pressure at the end to complete the agenda; and they are still looking for an agenda which will be mission-led.

In January Mission Council were the guests of Muswell Hill URC in north London. In March they returned to High Leigh in Hertfordshire, and found that their first job was to balance the URC's 1994 Budget. Few Council members, I imagine, had expected this to be one of their tasks, but then they remembered that the Council is asked to decide the Church's priorities. And when the Church's programme is estimated to cost half a million pounds more than its expected income, who else should decide how to raise the extra money or, alternatively, cut the programme?

After learning sessions with the URC's financial officers, and discussion and prayer spread over three days, Council agreed, with sadness, to recommend that the stipend rise which had been expected to provide our ministers with £13,200 per annum from July 1 should only go to £13,000. With some other, smaller savings from the programmes, this should provide a balanced budget for 1994.

The Council was told by its prophet-in-residence, this time the Revd Victor Premasager from the Church of South India, that Mission Council had lost its vision of mission, to be 'co-opted and domesticated into the budget concerns of the Church', and members nodded their heads in sad acknowledgement. Your reporter would say, however, that mission in the 20th century does need a budget: the URC's priority in the last two years has been to pay its full-time ministers enough to set them free from worries which can cloud the mission vision for us all.

The Council made a good many other decisions in which the element of money was less apparent. Positive approaches to work among children, decisions to maintain a high standard of training for ministers, a review of the way all kinds of training are given in our Church. With the mission priority in mind, they looked at the resolutions coming to the 1993 General Assembly in Portsmouth. That should ensure that there is adequate time for the provincial resolutions which each synod, including yours, decided on after the Mission Council meeting.

The Portsmouth Assembly will have Europe as a theme. What fun it would have been to have held part of the Assembly on a cross-channel ferry, stopping off in Caen or Cherbourg to greet a few of our fellow-Europeans and catch their vision of mission as well. But maybe Assembly at sea isn't everyone's idea of fun.

The letter includes such phrases as 'a million thanks for your bold effort to put our church on a solid foundation' and 'the Presbytery Chairman has asked us to give his thanks to you' and 'we shall never forget you in our prayers'. A copy of the full text of the letter is on the Mission Notice Board in the Church Hall.

YOUR PRAYERS ARE ASKED FOR THESE PEOPLE.

Sudan stands at the crossroads of Islam and Africa. The outcome of the Christianity in East violent conflict between these two spiritual forces and their social and political manifestations will have a great bearing on the destiny of the whole African Continent. Since the abolition of the South's autonomy and the introduction of (fundamentalist Islamic Law) up to 1.5 million people are believed to have perished and up to 5 million moved from their homes. The National Islamic Frontbacked regime of General Umar Hasan Al-Bashir has adopted genocide as its ultimate weapon in its jihad (Holy War) against the black non-Muslims.

Mass starvation and displacement of population, razing scores of villages in the Nuba Mountains, deporting over 400,000 refugees to desert concentration camps and terrorising over 250,000 hostages in Juba without adequate food, medicine and sanitation, are among the means the regime uses against Sudan's non-Muslim communities.

The dynamic Church is the principal barrier to Islamisation. Gen. Bashir's regime uses drastic measures in its battle to subjugate and eliminate it: arrest and, in the Nuba Mountains, crucifixion of pastors and evangelists, expulsion of missionaries, closure and destruction of Churches, crude anti-Christian propaganda, and harrassment of ordinary Christians. In the midst of all this the Church has been growing at a phenominal rate. Just over 20 years ago 5% of the population claimed to be Christian. Reliable estimates now put the figure at 20% nationwide, with 80% of Southern people identifying themselves with the Church.

From his refuge in Nimule the Episcopalian Bishop of BOR said that his war-torn diocese had grown from 2 to 140 congregations in 10 years. Other denominations have seen similar growth. The strong faith and courage of Sudanese Christians has been forged with great suffering. 'Though we are hungry, thirsty and dying of disease, we will take our cross to show the world that we are Christians,' declared a

bold pastor in a village that had been bombed and occupied by the Sudanese Military, 'so why doesn't the Christian Community in the rest of the world raise its voice on our behalf?'

Response from the Church in the West has been conspicuously absent! The Church in Sudan is grateful for material aid, but has been largely left alone while paying a heavy price for standing true to Christ.

Christians in Sudan ask for Prayer support and public expressions of solidarity from Western Church Leaders. BRETHREN - PRAY FOR US!!!

REPORT OF THE SUSSEX WEST DISTRICT COUNCIL REETING. 10th JUNE 1993.

The meeting was held at St. Columba's U.R.Church, Worthing and opening devotions were led by Rev. Stuart Bidmead during which Rev.Roy Parkington was inducted as President of the District Council for a period of 2 years. Thanks were expressed to Rev. Stuart Bidmead for his work as retiring President, and to Rev. Beryl Chatfield recently inducted into Durrington L.E.P.

Officerships Vacancies still exist for District Ecumenical Officer, and for the Convenor of the District Youth Committee.

<u>Bounenism</u>. Rev. Geoffrey Beck, speaking about his experiences of Eastern Europe, said that the Church there is alive and active, but under great pressure both from within and without.

<u>Vacant Fastorates.</u> TELSCOMBE CLIFFS. Rev. Alan Whillis will be inducted September 11th at 2.45pm.

GCRING. The District concurred to the calling of Rev. Peter Heckels as full time Minister and he will be inducted on September 18th at 3pm.

EAST VITTERING. Mr. James Bailey will be commissioned as Pastural Leader on June 14th at 7 pm, and Rev. Alf Lawson (Methodist) will be the Oversight Minister.

PAGHAM. Scoping is deferred until September, but the members would prefer to be linked with Bognor URC.

Pastoral Concerns.

BRIGHTON. Brighthelm has some problems, and needs our prayers. The Pastoral Care Committee suggest the setting up of a Support Group.

WCRTHING AREA. 1. Shelley Road is to be scoped full time.

2. After much discussion and 2 amendments, the following resolution was passed:-

'Following the Pastoral Care Committee recommendation to the last meeting of the Council that when a Ministerial vacancy next occurs in one of the four Worthing UR Churches (Goring, St. Columba's, Shelley Road or Sompting) it should not be filled. Council now requests that the four Churches, in consultation with the Pastoral Care Committee, should determine the future pattern of Ministry for those Churches, and the framework

for its implementation as soon as possible, and to report back to Council not later than JUNE 1994.

The scheme should envisage the possibility of extension to other Churches at a later date if that is desirable.'

It is, therefore, important that the 4 Churches bring this matter to the attention of all their Church Members for discussion, as there are many points to be considered. Perhaps we could discuss it at our July Church Meeting.

3. Rev. Roy Parkington asked for the District's approval to continue for an extra 2 years in the Ministry following his 65th Birthday in 1995. This had been verbally agreed by him and St. Columba's Church when he came. After some discussion this was approved. SOUTH OF THE DOWNS AREA. Bosham. The situation regarding the sale of the Manse at Bosham is serious as no other housing has been found for the Pastor and his family. Pastoral Care of Churches. More detailed information and a draft form on a new scheme should be sent to Churches before discussion at the September Council Meeting.

All Churches are reminded of the need to discuss the Pastoral Committee's Draft Resolution on the Flexibility Clause as this will be discussed at the District Meeting in September.

This reads as follows:-

'In view of the current shortage of Ministers which makes it no longer possible to provide one Minister for every Church, and following the statement of intent contained in the Pastoral Care Committee's letter to Churches, dated 25th Jan 1993, Council hereby gives notice that, in order to provide for joint or team Ministries, it may be necessary at any time to change the scoping of any Church and to invite both Church and Minister to negotiate a new call with terms of settlement for approval by the Council.'

This should be read in conjunction with the letter mentioned in the draft.

Perhaps this could also be discussed at the July Church Meeting as it is relevant to the Pastoral Care Committee's resolution on the Worthing Area.

The District appreciated the work of Peter Spicer and his Pastoral Care Committee.

Property Matters.

All Churches were asked to check on the safety of their electrical installations as one Church recently had a serious incident which could have been fatal. Churches should consider fitting Earth Leakage Trips in both Manse and Church buildings.

GORING. It was stated that because of Rev. Peter Heckels' family, consideration is being given to the selling of the present Manse and purchase of a more suitable house. PORTSLADE are selling their Manse.

LITTLEHAMPTON had urgent roof repairs and District approved their application to the Province for a Grant and a loan.

Financial Matters.

Our prayers continue for the District Treasurer - Rev. Derek Morrill.

World Church and Mission.

Rev. Brian Stone urged us to start planning now for 'ON FIRE - PENTECOST 94'.

The District Day on Evangelism will be held at Hove Central on Saturday November 13th.

The next District Council Meeting will be held on September 9th at Portslade.

As a result of my being informed that the Elders' Church and Family Committee had given permission to release some of our old Mission Praise hymn books which were surplus to requirements, I announced that we had some spare copies. As a result, I'm sure that you will be pleased to know, they are now in use at the Durrington LEP, Bosham, Pulborough, Petworth and Brightelm.

The Meeting ended with the Grace.

Continuing my tour of the Assembly, information stands produced more surprises! In one corner of the room I saw a stand entitled 'Lesbian and Gay Christian Movement'. I was, however, shocked to read that the stand was promoting the notion that you could be a sexually practicing homosexual and be a Christian at the same time!

I approached an official-looking person, wearing a clerical collar, and asked him whether the URC agreed with this, and he said they didn't. I then explained that, by allowing the stand to be at the General Assembly they were, in fact, endorsing it. His answer to this was 'woolly', and when I told him he replied, "Yes, well that just about sums up the United Reformed Church - woolly."

As Christians we should not be woolly about our faith. We should love all people, irrespective of their sexuality but, at the same time, should stand firm in the Bible's teaching, and not conform to the standards and pressures of this world.



Dear Friends,

I am writing this on the day after Rev. Tom Weal spoke about deserts and how we all have to pass through our particular desert. Whilst we are in that desert we should remember that we are not alone - the Lord is with us - our friends and neighbours have been there, too.

But deserts can be fascinating places, and though barren and dry and dangerous, can be full of colour and interest, even life. We have driven through the deserts of Arizona and the Mohjave in the USA and there, square mile after square mile is filled with all kinds of tough, scrubby bushes and cacti. They often have incredibly coloured flowers. There are birds, too, including runner-birds, very odd they are, and lizards and snakes.

So, whilst we may pass through a desert in our lives it can be a living desert if we look around and see where we are walking. You could say that out interregnum has been a desert experience, and without our own Minister there have been times when we have foundered. However, our 'Ministers for the moment', John and Elsie Flack, have helped so much to keep us far more than just floating.

There have been a number of highlights over the past two years, and much has been accomplished that will be taken into the New Era of ministry; some may not be as discussions in Elders' obvious to everyone, such Meetings to clarify our thinking on Baptism Dedication. We are much clearer than we ever used to be, and parents are made very aware of the promises they will asked to make when Elders visit them. Membership, too, is more clearly defined and several visits may be made before the Right Hand of Fellowship is offered. Other more obvious highlights have been the Provincial Synod held in the Church in March 1992, the Church Weekend this year, and the very remarkable Evangelistic Weekend at the end of June this year.

MY IMPRESSIONS OF ASSEMBLY 1993.

It was a tremendous privilege and joy to be chosen as one of the 6 Representatives for our District at the URC General Assembly held at Portsmouth from July 5 - 9. The 21st Birthday of the URC. Thank you for all your prayers; we were very conscious of being supported in prayer.

John Gordon, representing Northern College, and I stayed at Giles Tewkesbury's house, which meant that we enjoyed times of fellowship and prayer together, plus an enjoyable short walk to and from The Guildhall for our 12 hour day. During the week we learnt that Alison Gordon had gained a place at a College in Manchester for a 2 year training as a Dental Surgery Assistant, starting in September. John is now doing a 6 week placement with a Church in Manchester, having passed his first year exams.

It was wonderful to be at Assembly with over 700 people - truly we are just a small part of God's family world-wide, as we were reminded by the presence of visitors from other denominations and from our Churches overseas. One evening John and I chatted to the President of the Church of Jesus Christ in Madagascar where British missionaries took the Gospel 175 years ago.

Going to my first Assembly was a very interesting experience. One votes and speaks by holding up a red card and catching the Moderator's eye! Some things surprised me - I was disappointed with the lack of life and joy in some of the worship - we had unfamiliar hymns with difficult tunes and a number of set response prayers. I found the Bible study each morning rather dry - and I know others felt the same way. However, for me Assembly was all about people and much delighted me - the richness of fellowship at the opening Holy Communion Service, the opportunity to pray for those in need and for and the times of sharing together and encouraging each other before the business began, over meal times and at the ending of the day. I enjoyed meeting several old friends and making many new ones, realising we have many brothers and sisters in Christ.

Supper one evening was spent with John Gordon, David Helyar and John Titlow at the Burger King! John Titlow, at Sittingbourne, now also has a small Church at

Sheerness, which is where his wife Barbara has a teaching post starting in September, having passed her B.Ed. Degree at Sussex University. Another supper I spent with Cyril and Joan Franks.

I found that The Guildhall ladies' cloakroom was an ideal place for a quiet moment of prayer with a friend!

I was refreshed and blessed by going to the G.E.A.R. informal worship on Tuesday at lunchtime, and by the young people from FURY leading informal singing, accompanied by guitars, on the steps of The Guildhall at lunchtimes - a lovely witness to the Lord!.

I was pleased at the way in which the business of Assembly was conducted. We had received a book full of reports to read through beforehand with over 50 resolutions. There were apportunities for any voting member to raise questions or state their point of view, as we debated these reports and resolutions. One resolution, dealing with part of the Statement of Faith for Ministers' Ordinations and Inductions, had 7 amendments before it was finally passed.

Ve learnt about the work of the Mission Council and the Church was congratulated on it's increased giving, but a further increase will be needed to meet the budget for 1994. As a result of the increased stipends for Ministers supplements should cease and Ministers will now have to retire within 6 months of their 65th birthday, unless prior arrangements have been made. After much debate it was decided to welcome representatives of other faiths as guests at future Assemblies.

We rejoiced to see 44 newly ordained Ministers and 6 new Churches being welcomed into the URC, but it was said we should also hear about the closure of Churches.

Concern was expressed for the Unemployed, Homeless and poverty of many in this country and for the plight of the Third World. We are asked to put our concern into action by:

- a. Writing to M.Ps expressing that concern, being willing to have higher direct taxation, and by opposing VAT on domestic fuel.
- b. Asking local Supermarkets to stock Fairtrade Mark products like Café Direct.

c. Boycotting Nestlé products because of many infant deaths in countries where free baby milk has been issued to ill-equipped and uneducated mothers.

We had several excellent presentations, including one on Disability presented by a lady in a wheelchair, one on Urban and Rural Mission, and another presented by Rev. Martin Nicholls, the Chaplain of the Fury Youth Centre at Yardley Hastings, who brought to life the excellent new URC resource materials for children, young people and Church Members.

Time was spent on Europe and Rev. Pavel Smetana, Moderator of the Evangelical Church of Czech Brethren gave a moving address of what difficulties the Church is facing there.

The Wessex Province put together a thought-provoking Wednesday evening Celebration entitled 'Treasure', involving drama, mime, song and words. based upon the discovery of Treasure within the Tudor Ship 'Mary Rose' - we, too, have spiritual treasure that needs to be discovered, recovered, uncovered and shared with the world.

The new General Assembly Moderator, Rev. Donald Hilton, spoke in his address of how very big God is - yet he has chosen as his symbol for his year of office a question mark (?) - in our quest to follow truth.

The retiring Moderator, Mrs. Ruth Clarke, gave her reflections on her year of office under the headings of Celebration, Together and In Good Heart. She spoke of Romans 13 v9-13 being a suitable text for a Moderator.

Rev. David Helyar, giving the Provincial Moderator's report said that as the Church we need to be:-

RISK - TAKERS - going forward in faith.

CARE - TAKERS - having compassion and understanding

UMDER - TAKERS - doing God's will with perseverance and prayer for our God remains faithful.

We voted for next year's Moderator who will be Rev. Jack McElvey, recently retired principal of Morthern College, where John Gordon is training. An overseas student has challenged him to consider Mission in his year of office 1994-1995.

The Assembly next year will be residential and held at Lancaster University from July 7-11. In 1995 it will be at Eastbourne.

WORLD WISSION. RUROVANGELISM IN RUSSIA.

Eurovangelism has been invited to produce a series on the life of Jesus for Russian television with total freedom to make it as directly evangelistic as desired. The prime-time transmission on Russia's network is being provided free! The fact that Eurovangelism had already produced two widely-acclaimed programmes, at Christmas and Easter, brought this unique opportunity.

The Director, Dave Foster, is (or has been) in Israel with a TV crew and Russian presenter.

The idea for the 'Life of Jesus' series came from TATIANA TCHERNIAEVA, one of Russia's best-known TV presenters. From Communism she came to faith in Christ and now uses her professional skills and high-level contacts to communicate the reality of the Person who transformed her life.

The series will not be dramatised in the sense of using actors but more as a journey to places of significance (Bethlehem, Wazareth, Galilee, Jerusalem.) with commentary from the Gospels.

The National network claims viewing audiences in excess of 100,000,000 (One Hundred William!). The potential is even greater when extended to 25,000,000 (25 William) more Russians living in now-independent states of the former Soviet Union.

Previous programmes attracted requests for video versions to show in schools, hospitals, children's and old people's homes, prisons, etc. Video tapes of the new Series can be provided for similar use.

'Bibles International of Canada', working with the Russian Ministry of Education, on the Biblical content of the new curriculum being developed for schools, is interested in producing — at their expense — a booklet of the series which can be offered free of charge when it is shown.

The concept need not be confined to the Russian language. Interest has already been expressed in relation to Romanian TV, and then production will be such that for comparatively little extra expense it can go into any language.

This is not 'just another' project, but an unique - perhaps unrepeatable - opportunity to communicate a positive message to tens of millions of Russians. Eurovangelism is already demonstrating God's love in action through its humanitarian ministry in the country.

Now, with the help of Christians who care for their Spiritual welfare, they can discover the life-changing reality of One who 'when He saw the multitudes was moved with compassion' and responded to their need. 
Concrete eaves beam forms part of the main structure. This beam is rendered and finished with grit. Repair defective rendering in consultation with Colin Redman.

TESTIMONY.

At 16 years of age I went forward at a Billy Graham Rally Relay to give myself to the Lord and was eventually haptised in a Baptist Church in Kent. Follow-up teaching was virtually nil, but I was encouraged to continue coming to Church on Sundays. There were no Study Groups, Prayer Groups or Youth Groups, but as I was a Scout Leader I considered that I was probably leading quite a useful life and I tried to be as good as I could not always with hoped-for results!

At Scouts I subsequently met and married Ian and, when our two children arrived, it seemed important for us all to worship together, and I became a member of our Parish Church and was Confirmed. When, in 1979, we moved to Worthing, my younger sister became very ill and, after 5 years, died of cancer. I was so angry with God that I just did not go to Church at all, and was secretly quite horrified when my Mon 'got involved' with a Christian family. Of course, I went several times to Services at his 'new' Church, and to see him and his fiancee admitted into Church Membership — and was amazed that everyone was so friendly and kind.

I started going regularly to Goring United Reformed Church, and joined a Bible Study Group lead by Irene Tuley and Jane Archer, and started, at long last, to become more knowledgeable about God's Word — something which should have happened to me at 16! I learned that to be a more effective Christian I did not need to try to be good, but that if I invited the help of the Lord Jesus He would Baptise me, not with water, but the Holy Spirit, to enable me to do His will. I am quite amazed now to find that I reached 50 years of age before knowing this basic underlable fact!

A lot of things suddenly became very clear to me as the Holy Spirit gently led me torward to do His will. I was very blessed with some special gifts, and every morning was woken up with the song 'We've a story to tell to the Wations'. I avidly read every copy I could find of this - trying to work out what I was supposed to do with it. I eventually blotted it out, and sang 'Praise the Lord' under the shower instead. Then 4 months later, the day after my son married, it became clear. It was the song chosen by FERA Radio at the morning Service. I knew them that I had to volunteer to help there and struggled for 3 weeks, with my normal reticence, to keep away. I finally went to volunteer, fully expecting them to laugh or bring out a straight-jacket but, to my absolute amazement, they had a job for me to do. I am still there, after a year!

Last Sunday I was very warmly welcomed into GURC as a Church Wember and now feel, not only part of the Body, but also a member of a loving, caring family. In the last 18 months I have been encouraged to grow from the babyhood of last year to become more mature for God's work and to His Glory.

I feel the Lord will have many more surprises in store for me in this second part of my life; if I listen to the Lord's Word in the stillness; if I obey His Word; if I am, if not able, but available; if I love the Lord my God with heart and soul and mind and my neighbour as myself; if I pray to Him for His enabling and guidance in all these things. My Scout motto is still 'Be Prepared', but now it has, for me, a different meaning.

You may see me smiling when I enter His building - I have a lot to swile about! HAVE YOU?
