

#### The Minister's Sermon - Coping with Worry.

I know that as soon as I start to talk about worry there are some people who either begin to build up a resistance or stop listening because they think I don't know what I am talking about. But before you switch off let me ask the person who says "You can't help worrying" whether you can't help it because you like to be worried because people will pity you, or because the easiest thing is to worry? Of course everyone faces situations where it is easy to worry - in fact most people can find something to be worried about most of the time if they want to; end it is indeed hard not to worry, but to say it is hard is not to say it is impossible. But if it is hard why should we trouble - why not let us keep our worries? The answer is quite simple. Everyone knows that the person who is worried is to a greater or less extent handicapped in taking their full part in life, that if worry continues and increases then it incapacitates people altogether. A very high proportion of the mentally ill today are so because they cannot control the natural and inevitable tendency to worry, and they cannot control it because they haven't got the means to control it.

So let us ask what worry is - it is compounded of two things and you will not like it when I tell you what they are. The first is fear, that may not surprise you. When you're worried you are afraid of the development of a situation or of the unknown. The second element in worry is selfishness. You may not mind saying "Oh, I am worried" but you won't like saying, "Oh, I am being selfish". And now you will perhaps deny that this is true. When you are worried you are worried for somebody else, someone in trouble or ill. Yes, but how much is really concern for yourself? Are you unhappy because of their situation or suffering, or afraid that the unknown may be hurtful to you? Sometimes a big worry is that we shall ourself prove inadequate for some need.

Now what can we do about this? First we must say that it is no good thinking that this is something we can cope with by ourselves. It is no use Digitalisation by Graham Redman - gurc.org.uk/digital - Copyright 2009

making up our minds that we won't worry and trying to suppress every tendency to worry. That is purely negative. The only way of dealing with it is by a positive approach, by putting something else in place of our worry. What can you put in place of fear? "Perfect love casteth out fear". What can you put in place of selfishness but care for others? In other words anxiety is a spiritual condition and it must have a spiritual cure. Love means trust and trust is expressed in prayer.

But before we go further let us be certain of one thing - no amount of prayer and no amount of faith will mean that God will do what we want Him to Indeed if we are simply trying to get our own way with God we aren' really praying. When I was a student pastor I went to an old lady who was dying. All the relatives assured me that they had prayed for her recovery. In fact that night she rallied and they said that God had answered their prayers. The old lady lived for another two weeks - two weeks of great suffering for her and anguish for them. No one could believe that that was God's doing. dangerous for us to assume that we know what is best for ourselves and our loved ones. The first thing to do in facing a situation of worry is to face the possibilities without trying to hide from them. Let us illustrate our point with a loved one who is ill. What can the result be? He can get better, he may have a long illness, disability or pain. He may not get better at all. Of course we want him to get better. What are we to do? We must pray about it. But we shall not advise God or demand what we want. We shall pray as little children. We shall face the situation before God. We shall tell Him what is in our hearts, ask Him to help us not to be selfish, and then leave the matter entirely in His hands, not believing that God will put everything right for us, though our loved one may get better and our prayers may have helped him. But we must believe that whatever happens, even the worst, it is in God's hands and in the end all is well.

This is not an easy thing to do but nobody has ever said that either faith or love is easy but it is the Charles by Way Red Ren The Copy of the control out

It is strange that within a month the Church should have lost two of the great stalwarts of the Sutton colony in our midst.

One must not press the comparisons too far but there were many similarities between Mr. Pearn and Mr. Dearsley. Both were "big" men in every sense of the word - not only in stature but in big-heartedness. Both, as Fred said to me the last time I saw him, had minds of their own and would not be sidetracked from the course they knew to be right.

As we think of Fred it is not with sadness but with joyous remembrance of a life lived abundantly, suffering borne with great fortitude and death faced with unswerving faith.

In his early days here he served the Church as a Deacon with a special interest in financial affairs and his advice on all matters was always sound and shrewd. It was during this service that I first came to know the strong quality of loyalty which has always characterised his friendship. For four years he gave devoted and enthusiastic service as Missionary Secretary.

There will be many in the Church now who never knew him in his full health. Yet all will remember him as a man of breezy cheerfulness even in the face of adversity. During these long years of suffering endured with amazing courage he displayed his optimism and humour. His secret was his deep Christian faith. His life and the manner of its passing will remain an inspiration to us all.

#### Goring (Sussex) Congregational H ousing Assocn. Ltd.

We have obtained Builder's estimates for the proposed conversion of 18/20 Shaftesbury Avenue into 6 flats and a housekeeper's flat, all to accord with the very stringent requirements of the Worthing and the Sussex County Councils and the Department of the Environment. On working out the running costs based on the total cost of about £36,600 and obtaining a loan of £18,000 and grants from the Council, as required we submitted our figures to the County Rents Officer who valued the flats on a rental basis of £6.00 to £6.50 per week.

The Rents Officer takes no account of the capital involved in settling the permissible rent, and as the cost of the loan would be over £5 per week for each flat it is clearly impossible to let the flats at £6 when lighting, heating, cleaning, insurance, repairs and maintenance and a house-keeper would all have to be provided by the Association.

As the Borough Council then refused to grant us the finance needed in addition to our own funds of nearly £12,000 we feel that our plans have been

frustrated at every turn by 'Officialdom', or to comply with the standard demanded the costs have become prohibitive. The Management Coamities have most reluctantly decided that the houses must be sold and a smaller property purchased, perhaps a nouse already used as a flat-let house, but it must be realised that this is unlikely to be in such a favourable position as Shaftesbury Avenue in regard to the Church.

It would be the intention of the Committee to buy such a property from our own resources without Council loans or grants but possibly with a private mortgage if required, and it is fully interded to continue with the Housing Association.

A concert version of Iolanthe, the Gillert & Sullivan light hearted fantasy is to be given by the Leighton Singers in aid of the funds of the Association on Wednesday 2nd February at 7.30 in the Church Hall - admission by programme at 150 each (with tea in the interval!) obtainable from the Church Organisations, the writer or at the door.

Minister's Sermon - Revelation 21:5 Behold I an naking all things new.

It must have been true for many centuries, ever since man took his first step beyond his most primitive state, that he has looked for a better and happier world. Before the first world war there was a time when many believed that man had reached such an advanced state of civilisation that his progress into the golden age was inevitable. No doubt there have been other periods in human history when men felt they would go on from one stage of human betterment to another. We can be equally sure that there have been periods in history when nan has felt that all his effort and struggle towards a better life was in vain, rather than getting better he could see things getting worse. Such a time would be when a civilisation was moving through the collapse of norality and of law and order to its inevitable doon, when it must have seemed to men that there was . nothing to take the place of the decaying civilisation but anarchy. Even at such periods of history there would have been those who lived and laboured for the betterment of mankind and who looked for the dawning of a new age. Most people, however, scen to oscillate between hope and despair of the days in which they live as the news which they read or hear seems better or worse.

The Christian believes that the will and purpose of God is for the enrichment of the life of mankind, that all men should live together in peace and without fear - that His provision of the resources of the world should be justly shared by all - that none should be oppressed, but all be so free of material cares as to be able to see the truth of the love of God for them and worship and serve Him.

God is making all things new. There are times in history when it seems that because of man's evil God's purposes are frustrated. We believe that God's purposes cannot finally fail, His will will be done, let us see the glory of our lives in having some place, by God's grace, in the working out of His purposes.

#### Why Doesn't the Church ----?

You have often heard criticism beginning "why doesn't the Church do this or that ...?". This article tells of one of the things the Church does here in Sussex and all over the country.

Do you know that the Church in Sussex runs its own nationally recognised adoption society - a society which has ensured that hundreds of babies have been given the chance of a real family life as the adopted children of Christian married couples who have longed for a baby to love and bring up in the way of Christ?

Do you know that the Church has twelve trained social workers in Sussex, helping people to sort out all manner of family problems?

Do you know that the only mother-and-baby homes in this county for unmarried mothers are maintained and run by the Church?

What branch of the Church does all this?
The Chichester Diocesan Association for
Family Social Work - C.D.A.F.S.W. for short. It is
called the Chichester Diocesan Association because
the work was started by the Church of England in
Sussex, the B ishop licenses all the workers of the
Association and the Diocese is responsible for the
central office and staff in B righton. However,
the cost of the workers' salaries and their office
and car expenses, and so on, has to be met by the
local Branches.

The Cost? Altogether about £40,000 a year. The Local Authorities, recognizing that the Church is doing work on their behalf, meet about one third of this sum, leaving the Churches £26,000 to raise each year!

Now the C.D.A.F.S.W. is not exclusive in the help it gives - it helps anyone, of any religion. lor this reason, in recent years, happily, Churches of all denominations have joined in supporting this tork, and so it can be said that this is something the whole Church does.

It is vital and compassionate work, undertaken in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, whose hands

are always outstretched to heal and make whole. (Our Representative is Miss E. Fisher, 21a Rose walk.)

#### Community Education for the Young European

This is a youth exchange programme which offers young adults (17 to 25) the chance to combine community service with further education in a western European country for one year.

Selection for the next group to go will begin shortly and perhaps you could go with them. No special qualifications are needed and the programme is open to all irrespective of educational background.

During the one year there is the chance to learn a new language, see a new country and to become a more interesting and successful person. The fee to the volunteer is £50 (reasonable for a chance of a lifetime) but a further £100 has to be raised by the volunteer through sponsorships. Once you've made your mind up it's all quite simple! Minister's Sermon 1 Cor.15:7-8 God be praised He gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. Therefore stand firm and immovable, work for the Lord always.

In this magnificent chapter Paul begins by establishing the truth of the resurrection of Jesus. His last piece of evidence is conclusive. "Finally He appeared unto me". This sort of evidence we can ourselves experience, and if we do nothing can take our conviction away from us. From his absolute certainty about the resurrection Paul draws two conclusions. First, that death is shown to be meaningless. Jesus said "he that believeth on me shall never die". Secondly that our life has ultimate victory; no matter what we suffer here, there we shall enjoy victory beyond all pain and sorrow.

Here we must remind ourselves that when the Gospels talk about eternal life they are not talking about life beyond death, they are talking about the quality of our life here. There are not two lives one here and one beyond. There is only one life, thus dying is like going to sleep, as we awake from sleep the same person as when we went to sleep, we shall wake from death the person we were before we died. Thus what we are doing in this life is fashioning the spirit with which we shall begin the next when we pass through the doorway we call death.

Paul draws exactly the same conclusion about the resurrection because when he comes to his climax and says, "God be praised He gives us the victory", he goes on "therefore my beloved brothers stand firm and immovable, work for the Lord always".

"Stand firm and immovable" - have a faith that nothing can move, a faith that is strong enough to meet temptation - that can overcome failure - can live in this world with its false values without being tarnished - strong enough to stand alone when it scems that everyone else is turning away; a faith that can take hold of the vigour and enthusiasm of youth and make it splendid for God, a faith that can meet ill health, old age and death itself and always see the light beyond. Because life is one - stand

firm, immovable. But the call is not to the passive resistence of evil or the changes or chances of life, we are to "work for the Lord always". It is not enough to say you believe, your life must be the evidence of what you believe by the service to which your life is devoted; and let us be sure of this, this service is not a part of life, it is not something we do sometimes, a function we fulfil in the life of the Church. To work for the Lord always is so to dedicate life that the spirit in which we live amongst our fellows can only be described as being in the love of Christ.

This is the victory, not one to be entered into later on, not pie in the sky, but victorious living here and now and if, as we have thought about sted-fast faith, if, as we have reckoned that the service of life is the whole of life, we have felt that we are such poor beings that this victory cannot be ours, then let us know that it is not something we of have to achieve by our own struggle, it is the gift/Christ, the risen, living and present Christ.

Minister's Sermon Luke 17:21 The Kingdom of Heaven is within you".

This text may also be translated "The Kingdom of Heaven is among you". Some have suggested that with these words Jesus meant that His coming to earth had inaugurated the Kingdom, which was on earth by His presence. But clearly from His teaching Jesus did not mean that the Kingdom would not be on earth after His ascension, and equally clearly the Kingdom does continue in men's hearts, so either way the text is translated for us it comes to mean the same thing.

The Gospels speak of "the Kingdom of God", "the Kingdom of Heaven", and sometimes Jesus speaks of "my Kingdom". There is of course only one Kingdom, however it is described. The word "Kingdom" in this context means exactly the same as it means anywhere else, "the area over which a King rules". We sometimes speak of Christian countries, and whilst we know that there is no such thing as a country over which God rules, we also know that there are countries in which Christian ideals and principles are not without influence, but Christian ideals and principles are in men's hearts, so again we come to the conclusion that God rules where, and to the extent that, His Spirit is in the hearts of men.

When we speak of the Spirit of God in our hearts we are immediately faced with tensions. We want to love and serve God, but we are people of this world and in two ways are constantly pulled away from the Kingdom. First there are within us by nature emotions or passions which work against the Kingdom within; it is natural for us to resent injustice for instance. In the sconnd place we are involved in the world about us and cannot always be absolutely Christian. All Christians would nowadays say that war is unchristian, but what is to be done in Northern Ireland? Absolute honesty is certainly a Christian principle, yet we are all, at times, involved in dishonesties, even lies.

How far is the rule of God within us? Fully to answer this question we must look a little more deeply. What do we mean when we talk about our soul or the spirit of God in our heart? I suggest that

we shall be much nearer the truth if instead of heart and soul we talk about desire and will.

What is it that we really desire in life? Let us try to be absolutely honest with ourselves and face the secret of our own thoughts. What is it that we want more than anything else — is it Christ? What is our will? What are we really working to achieve? Again the necessity to be completely honest with ourselves, are we consciously striving after Christ-like-ness?

But this self-searching must not be discouraging. So let us finally remind ourselves of what an unspeakably wonderful thing it is that we, the people we know ourselves to be, can have the Spirit of God in our hearts, and it is a gift.

Our hearts, O God, are swept by a storm of distractions; turn as we will toward Thee, we think a thousand flickering thoughts that hide the glory of Thy holiness, lend us Thy Holy Spirit that strengthened by Thy might we may gather ourselves compactly in singleness of will to worship Thee, to seek Thee seriously, and to lift up our life for Thy judgment and mercy. Make our own need plain to us that we may not weary Thee and deceive ourselves by fretting about the short-comings of others. Keep us near enough to Christ to understand how much we need Him and the fellowship of His forgiveness. Through the same Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Minister's Sermon - The Parable of the Sheep and the Goats.

Most people if they were asked to say what this parable is about would say "judgement", which I suppose is the orthodox view. Personally I doubt whether Jesus ever talked about judgement and believe that what there is in the Gospels on the subject reflects the teaching of the Church influenced by other religions, rather than the teaching of Jesus. The reason for this is that the idea of judgement must be based upon fear, if there is nothing fearful in judgement it doesn't matter, it is meaningless. I do not believe that God uses fear "perfect love casteth out fear, there is no fear in love". In place of the judgement of God I would place the realisation of the truth of the self, and base this on the words of Jesus in John 3 "It was not to judge the world that God sent His Son into the world, but that through Him the world might be "The man who puts his faith in Him does not conc under judgement but the unbeliever has already been judged in that he has not given his allegiance to God's only Son. Here lies the test: the light has come into the world, but men preferred darkness to light because their deeds were evil."

If you learn to play the violin you may imagine you are pretty good until you hear David or Igor Oistrach play, and then you will know the truth.

Igor Oistrach play, and then you will know the truther This parable is not talking about judgement later on, it is talking about life here and now, how to live in and possess the Kingdon. If we ask how can we live in the Kingdon we are talking about our relationship with God through prayer and worship, this is what Jesus meant when He said "The Kingdon of God is within you."

There are occasions when we are conscious of a relationship with God through worship and prayer, when our hearts are conscious of God's spirit and blessing, but this is not always true, sometimes prayer seems dull and lifeless, and how can we know God's presence when we are involved in the hurly

burly of life?

In His earthly life Jesus identified Himself both with God and man, with God - "He that hath seen me hath seen the Father"; "The teaching that I give is not my own it is the teaching of Him who sent me." Jesus identified Himself with man, "Whosoever receives one such child in my name receives me"; "Anything you did for one of my brothers here you did for me."

As we have said, it is not always easy for us to realise our relationship with God, but we are in relationship with our fellow men all the time, but Jesus said what you have done for others you have done for me, and He is one with the Father. We are inclined rather to like this parable because we have cared for others and thus we have cared for God. We must also remind ourselves that the other side is also true, - the unkind, the thoughtless, careless, hurtful things we have done to others we have also done to God. Our whole relationship with our fellow men is our relationship with God.

Jesus supremely identified Himself with God and man, with you and me, in the institution pf the Last Supper - my body broken for you - my blood shed for you. By receiving these His symbolic gifts we symbolise our desire to receive more of His spirit into our hearts, in His spirit we love and serve our fellow men more truly, in loving and serving our fellow men we enter and possess His Kingdom.

#### Operation Outreach

Last year we celebrated the tenth anniversary of the opening of our Church with an excellent programme of events of special and pleasure to ourselves. This year we celebrate the twentyfifth anniversary of the founding of our Church, and it was decided nearly a year ago that to celebrate this event we should not simply have services with a special preacher for our own edification, but that instead we should develop and carry out a plan to try to fulfil the function of the Church, hence Operation Outreach.

Many of us have taken part in visitation efforts and most of these seem to have very little value. Operation Outreach is not just a visitation campaign; it is first of all intended to give people some knowledge of our Church life, since many people have very little idea of what goes on within the fellowship of the Church. Many who know the outside of our Church have no idea how beautiful a place it is. Our intention is not first of all to get people to come to Church, but to give them an opportunity of knowing more of our life and experiencing something of our fellowship. The Pastoral Committee of the Diaconate has given a great deal of thought to the preparation of a brochure which will be distributed in the areas to be visited ahead of the visitors. The visitors will be given full details of the various activities of the Church and supplied with forms to record their reports. The invitation which we are sending out is invitation to tea in the hall, and this will be an opportunity for those who respond to see and hear more of our Church.

I had hoped that we would be able to tackle four areas at once, but what we can do is dependent entirely on the number of visitors or pairs of visitors to respond to the call; our aim is to allot to each visitor or pair 20 houses as a maximum. To do two areas we need just over twenty and to do four areas we need about forty visitors or pairs — is this really beyond a Church of over 300 membership? Some people may feel that even with guidance and instruction they are unable to undertake any visiting

but we shall also need a few helpers to collate the information on the visitors' report sheets.

If we only have enough volunteers to do two areas this September we shall tackle the Crossways Estate and the area immediately south of the Church bounded by Shaftesbury Ave., Marlborough Road and Clive Ave.-in this event we shall hope to do the other two areas next September.

Before the visitation begins we shall ask the other Goring Churches to notify us of any of their members living on the roads in question, and afterwards we shall pass on to the Churches the names and addresses of any who claim to belong to their denomination.

Please determine that you will help with this effort and let either Mr. Bond or myself have your name now. The fact that you may have missed our preparation meeting need not deter anyone from taking part, and we shall repeat what is said then on the evening of 14th Sept., when the scheme will be launched; this will also be a dedication and commissioning service which we earnestly hope many people will attend.

#### The United Reformed Church

It is now quite definite that the U.R.C. will come into being by the union of the Congregational Church in England and Wales and the Presbyterian Church of England on October 5th this year. On Oct. 5th there will be a United Assembly of the two Churches in the Central Hall, Westminster, at 10 a.m. and a Service of Thanksgiving in Westminster Abbey at 3.30 p.m. This Service will be televised on B.B.C. 2 and an edited version will be shown on B.B.C.1 at 11 a.m. on Sunday morning 8th October in the Seeing & Believing Programme.

At the first Church Meeting after October 5th the Church is asked to make several decisions with regard to its own life; these decisions concern the number of Elders the Church will have and the length of the term of their active service, and the Church will elect its officers after nomination by the Digitalisation by Graham Redman - gurc.org.uk/digital - Copyright 2009

Elders; finally the Elders have to report to the Church Meeting the means by which they propose to manage the finance and the property of the Church and these arrangements have to be approved by the Church Meeting In view of the fact that the first normal Church Meeting after Oct. 5th would be Nov. 2nd., it has been decided to postpone the Church Meeting set for Sept.28th until Oct.12th, and we shall be glad if Church members will alter their diaries accordingly.

We hope to be able to arrange to show the edited version of the Service on Oct.5th as part of our Morning Service on Oct. 8th, and this will mean starting that Service earlier than 11 a.m., but if this is possible adequate notice of the change will be given.

The name of our Church after Oct.5th will be "Goring-by-Sea United Reformed Church".

All this concerns the practical arrangements with regard to the formation of the Church; what is essential is that we should realise that we shall be a new Church with a new outlook and new opportunities. The Church will be new if its formation is the occasion for a very real act of re-dedication by all its members.

Another reason for the continuance of our group is that Yapton for the present is not coming into U.R.C., but by this means we shall keep in fellowship with that Church and we hope may thereby encourage entry into U.R.C. at a later date.

The Worthing Group will not have any business meetings or commissioners, that will all be the function of Sussex West District, but the Ministers of the group will continue the Fraternal they have enjoyed together for some years past, and will act as a sort of Executive Committee for the group.

My dear Friends,

It was several months ago that I said I had drawn up Orders of Service so that we should have a different Order both morning and evening for the first four Sundays of the month. We shall revert to our present Order when we have a visiting Minister and on the fifth Sunday of the month when that occurs. There has been a delay in introducing these orders due to the holiday months, but we shall be starting on October 1st.

I believe that the worship of God is the reason for the existence of the Church and that this worship is what we have to offer to mankind and what mankind supremely needs, though many do not recognise this to be true.

In drawing up these Orders of Service I have had three principles in mind, first that there should be more congregational participation in our worship; secondly, that we should make fuller use of our excellent choir - music in worship means a great deal to a great many people, and thirdly, that since our congregation is far more interdenominational than our congregations used to be our worship should be more broadly based to make more folk feel at home with us. At the same time it will remain true that half our services will be of simple congregational form.

I know that change is always unwelcome in some quarters; I am sure that some people will say that they don't like this or they don't like that. Please remember that to be stuck in a rut is disaster and that we must endeavour to cater for all not onlygital and individual diaster. Copyright 2009

At the preparation meeting held for the first stage, it was unanimously decided by those who had volunteered to do the visiting that we should go straight on to the second stage in October, and thus complete the whole operation this year. I am greatly encouraged by the interest in and support for this endeavour; whatever else it does it must be a strength to the inner life of the Church.

Now all our activities are once again in full swing - may those who are called to leadership in any sphere know the guidance and inspiration of the Holy Spirit, and may they know too that all their work is supported by the prayers of us all.

Minister's Sermon Mark 5:19 Go home to your own folk and tell them what the Lord in His mercy has done for you.

It is not in the least surprising that the man who had been healed at Gadara wanted to remain with Jesus and enjoy the fellowship of the disciples. The world had been cruel to him, only Jesus showed him any compassion. Jesus knew that for this Gadarene to follow Him was not to give him comfort and security. His way led to the cross and for the disciples after Easter the acceptance of His mission in a hostile world and this was more than the man could face. Yet the Gadarene was not told that there was no mission for him. He was told to go home and tell his friends what God had done for Let us not imagine that this would-be disciple of Jesus was fobbed off with a very easy task; for him to tell his friends what God had done for him was difficult indeed and it requires very little imagination to realise the discouraging and cruel sort of thing people would be all too ready to sav to him.

It is not surprising that we are sometimes tempted to remain contentedly in the fellowship of the Church. Here we have found the answer to the deepest needs of our lives through fellowship with God, here we are supremely at home in the fellowship of Christian men and women, like the man of Gadara we cannot think of anything better than to be with Jesus. As it was not true for the first disciples that to be with Jesus was the purpose of their discipleship, so it is not true for us. Mission is an essential part of the Church's life, a Church without mission must be a dying Church. When we say this we do not only mean that some members of the Church must be engaged in mission work, as with children and young people, or that there must occasionally be missionary efforts; mission must be the life of the Church and therefore it must be the life of all its members.

How often do we realise that our greatest opportunity for mission is frequently to be found on

our doorstep. Ordinary conversations should sometimes give us the opportunity of saying something like, "I believe", "the Gospel says" or "the Christian faith is?". How often when people tell us of their troubles, anxieties, sorrows or fears we have an opening to speak of our Christian faith. Of course it is not easy, of course we may be misunderstood or misjudged for declaring our faith, but what sort of cross are we prepared to take up? There is on thing that we can in all humility tell folk, for which there as no argument, and that is what the man of Gadara was told to tell. What God has done for us.

Well, what has God done for you? Have you ever told anybody about it? The man of Gadara was told "Go home and tell your friends what the Lord has done for you." And he did.

#### A Prayer

O Lord God, from troubled hearts in every land our prayers ascend unto Thee. Cut off from each other by hatred and contempt, divided by race and language, embittered by envy and pride, we lift our hands for gifts we cannot receive until we are at peace with one another and seek Thee together in common need. Bring us all in judgment before Jesus Christ our Lord, whose great love halted not before shame or death to forgive in perfect grace those who condemned Him. Bring us at last, lest we come to outer darkness, to kneel in knowledge of our need, and in such confession humbly to share with all men, in every condition of servitude and nature, the grace of Thy Holy Spirit, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

# Minister's Sermon

Galatians 6:2 Bear ye one another's burdens and so fulfil the law of Christ.

First of all let us remind ourselves of the law of Christ., "Thou shalt love the Lord Thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind, and thy neighbour as thyself" - we do this by bearing one another's burdens. Those who help the sick or lonely, the bereaved or distressed, kindly folk always ready to give a helping hand, all these fulfil the law of Christ. If this is the case there are a great many people about who fulfil the law of Christ without thinking or caring anything about Him. You can be certain that almost invariably when anyone is in trouble a neighbour will come along to give a helping hand. What this says is that ordinary human kindness, of which there is a great deal in this world, fulfils the law of Christ. This seems to fit in with the parable of the sheep and the goats -"inasauch as ye did it unto one of the least of these ye did it unto ne". Do we forget also that inasmuch as we have done petty or mean or spiteful or dishonest things, inasauch as we have had ill will or an unforgiving spirit towards one of the least of these, we have done it unto Him? We know that Christianity is something more than just human kindness. Are the things of which we have spoken really the burden of humanity? Most people experience illness or suffering at some time of life, 5 hut today a great deal of it is curable and for most of us for the greater part of life we are free from sickness. What about death? We know that at every moment of the day someone is dying somewhere and that sooner or later it must come to us all. only worries us for a while when it comes across our own threshold. We hear of a heavy death toll somewhere and say something like "how shocking" and think about something else.

what has been the real burden of humanity lately? Many are shocked by the Munich tragedy; racism in whatever form it occurs troubles many; the continued strife in Vietnam and Ireland is a burden on many a heart. these affairs is not so much that some people suffer and some people die, but the cruelty and wickedness of the hearts of men or, in Christian language, man's sin.

Bear ye the burden of human sin and so fulfil the law of Christ - but how do we bear the burden of human sin, isn't it only God who can do this? In what way, how is it true that Jesus bore the sin of world on the cross? One sin is the same wherever and whenever it occurs. Human cruelty, for instance, is the same in Vietnam, South Africa, Ireland or England, and basically all human sin is selfishness. Jesus suffered=at the hands of human cruelty of Caiaphas or Pilate, but their selfishness was the same as all the world's selfishness, the same as yours and mine.

This selfishness Jesus utterly forgave, revealing the eternal undefeated love of God, for this He gave Himself that man may overcome his selfishness by the gift of His Spirit received into his heart. So, following Jesus, we are copeing with human sin when we are forgiving towards our fellows, when by His grace no human evil is allowed to cause ill will in our hearts - this is the burden of Christ, by our sharing in it we fulfil His law.

### The Covenant Scheme

In the Income Tax year 1973/74 the effect of introducing the new unified system of Taxation with a basic rate of 30% will, if not modified in the meantime, have the effect of reducing the Church's income from the annual Tax recovery from £540 to £355 on the Deeds of Covenant which are at present in operation.

Furthermore, it is possible that some Sunscribers whose Income Tax liability hitherto has covered the Tax on their Covenanted Subscriptions will, by the increases in personal reliefs and allowances, be taken out of Income Tax altogether. (Will any such who may be concerned about their Digitalisation by Graham Redman - gurc.org.uk/digital - Copyright 2009

Position please consult their advisers - or me?)

However gratifying may be the diminution of personal Income Tax burdens, it becomes increasingly urgent for new Deeds of Covenant to be entered into if the Church's income is to be maintained even at its existing level. If, therefore you are financially in a position to do so will you please give this matter urgent consideration?

At the moment the total number of Convenanted Subscribers is not greater than forty out of a total membership of some three hundred and fifty. I am sure that we are not all so "Tax free" and there should be plenty of scope for a major increase in the adoption of the Covenant Scheme. The Treasurer will in coming days be needing our fullest support.

### News of local U.R. Churches

Reading through the magazines published in November by our local U.R. Churches, we were interested to learn that St. Columba's were

colebrating the fact that almost 45 years ago the first Presbyterian services were held in Worthing above Mansfield's Music Shop, then situated in Mortagu Street. The first service was conducted by three laymen and one laywoman, the latter playing a small organ. About 25 folk were present (but no minister), and we are told that on a subsequent occasion the offertory was solemnly taken up in a soap-dish, the more appropriate receptacle having been forgotten! In 1931 quite a small company entered the new Hall built on land in Heene Road, but by 1937, when the present church was completed, there were 300 members.

According to official statistics for our Province, the membership of St. Columba's is now 380, and this is some 20 more than that given for our own Church. In the new Sussex West District this membership figure is only exceeded by the Central Free Church, Brighton, who have 422 on their Church Boll.

## The Minister's Sermon - God speaks through trouble.

It is not at all clear from the Book of Hosea what really was his donestic tragedy, that is whether or not Gomer was a temple prostitute before he married her. What does appear to be quite certain is that Gomer was unfaithful to Hosea after she had given birth to his children. The names of the children must reflect what was the earlier teaching of Hosea - the first was a boy Jezreel, the name of the place where Jehu slew all the descendants of Ahab because he practised false religion. The second child was a girl Lo-Ruhamah, meaning 'not loved', and the third another boy named Lo-Ammi, meaming 'not my people'. Because of her unfaithfulness Israel was no longer God's people and He would no more have mercy upon them. when Gomer forsook Hosea he knew he was entitled to divorce her; he would do this not through a court, but by stripping her naked and driving her The probability is that Hosea was human enough to intend to expose Gomer in his first grief and anger that ahe had left him, but when this passed Hosea knew he still loved his wife and would go to great lengths to win her back.

As Hosea thought about his own sorrow the thought occurred to him that Israel had treated God in the same way as Gomer had treated him, Israel had gone a-whoring with false gods. God loved Israel, but Israel was unfaithful, now God could cast Israel away, but if he, a mere man, still loved the woman who was unfaithful to him, how much more it must be true of God that His love for Israel must be greater than Israel's sin. The beauty of this little book is in Hosea's pleading with Israel on God's behalf.

One thought of Hosea's we cannot possibly accept. Hosea believed that Gomer's unfaithfulness was of God's purpose because He wanted to convey to Hosea His message. Hosea looked at the sad events of his life and asked, "Why has God done this?" "What is God saying to me through this?"

We cannot believe that any of the suffering and

sorrow of this world is of God's planning or purpose. Perfect love cannot devise suffering or sorrow. may say of a man that "he was cruel to be kind"; you cannot imagine that that could be true of God. Man.s love is imperfect and he is limited by time, but God's love is perfect and He has eternity in which to achieve His purpose. We cannot, like Hosea, ask "For what purpose has God done this to me?". "What is God saying to me through this?" What we must believe is that all human suffering is suffering to God. What we can ask ourselves is "What would God have me to do with this suffering or sorrow?" Always when we think about this subject we must come to the cross, and the first thing we must put out of our minds is the thought that the cross was in any way God's will. The cross was man's sin. What Jesus did with it was to make it the supreme revelation of God's love, an offering which God could use for the salvation of mankind.

In the face of suffering and sorrow we must not ask, "Why did God do this?", not even, "Why did God allow this to happen?" We must ask, "What would God have me to do with this?" "What is God saying to me now if I listen to Him?" At times of strain and stress we must not look in at our own feelings and needs. We must look up to God and seek to make our burden something He can use for His purpose.
