

JANUARY 1997

Dear Friends.

By the time you read this it will be 1997. Christmas will have passed and we shall have remembered again with real joy the birth of Jesus, and again we shall have experienced that real sense of God with us. In his first letter to the churches, St John writes these words:-

"We write to you about the word of life, which has existed from the very beginning. We have heard it, and we have seen it with our eyes; yes we have seen it, and our hands have touched it. When this life became visible, we saw it; so we speak of it and tell you about the eternal life which was with the Father and was made known to us. What we have seen and heard we announce to you also, so that you will join with us in the fellowship that we have with the Father and His Son, Jesus Christ." (1 John 1: 1-3)

Are these words not true for us as well as to the writer of this letter? We have again shared in the knowledge of Jesus coming into the world and making manifest the Word of Life. That is the joy of Christmas which will stay with us when presents are put to one side, the Christmas parties have all ended and the decorations are put away for another year. Jesus will still be with us; Jesus will make each day a day of celebration for all who share His fellowship.

So into 1997 and forward with a sense of celebration, a new year, a new challenge and new opportunities lie before God's people. "Every local church must ask itself why it exists at all; what is a church for?" This question was posed over 20 years ago by the then Provincial Moderators in their report to Assembly, and yet it is a question each church, indeed each organisation with every church, should ask itself on a regular basis. So ask yourself and try to give an answer which will be acceptable to Jesus, who is Lord of the church, and its organisations.

Part of the answer must be that we are here to celebrate, and to celebrate with joy, in a world that seems to have little to be joyful about. If Jesus is part of your life then you have much to celebrate, but too often we seem to forget this and become bogged down in the mire of daily living, allowing problems to just grow and grow until they pull us down. Yet we believe in Jesus and try to proclaim His love for the world, so why not show it through celebration, not only in our worship but in our lives. Surely in times of gloom and despair we should show something about the love we have found in Jesus. Nothing can do Jesus' love more disservice than a miserable, ill-tempered Christian. When the world looks for something different, can the followers of Jesus not offer this in the way we live?

No, we should not make 1997 the year of the pious religious smile (that's as bad often as the miserable Christian), but rather that the joy in our hearts should be on the outside as well as the inside. There will no doubt be difficulties and times of sadness as well as times when all goes well, and there will be times of great happiness. However we can face each day in the certain knowledge of Jesus who will be with us in every situation. What joy that brings to us. Once we show this simple joy we shall all live in celebration and perhaps show why the church is here.

Please continue to pray for us in 1997 - a new year filled with new opportunities.

CHRISTIANS TOGETHER IN WORTHING

Following a request from the Goring Clergy Fraternal, the group undertook discussion of the five-session studies included in the ecumenical booklet 'Called to be One'. The booklet was produced by Churches Together in England and intended for discussion by ecumenical groups during Advent, concluding with the production of a report for the County Ecumenical Officer. The discussions were of value to us all, giving each a greater insight into the structures and forms of worship in the various denominations represented.

January 1997 ushers in a number of ecumenical events in the Goring and Worthing areas, which include the following:-

January 5th A Joint Evening Service at St Richards CE from 6.00 pm The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, including:-January 19th - 26th January 20th - 24th Lunchtime Ecumenical Prayer Services from 12 noon -1.00 pm at Bury Drive Methodist Church. January 22nd Ecumenical Service at Christchurch Road Baptist Church, Worthing, from 7.30 pm, including installation of Revd Michael Hoare, Vicar of St Mary's Church, Goring, as President of Churches Together in Worthing. January 25th A Praise and Healing Service will be held in this Church from 7.00 pm which will be conducted by the Venerable Trevor Nash of the Acorn Healing Trust.

A FINANCE REPORT.

As I have only recently become Chairman of our church Finance Committee, it was with quite a lot of trepidation that I wrote, on the directions of the Treasurer and Committee, to 'Head Office' about our finances. Head Office means Tavistock Place, London, United Reformed Church Finance Department.

We had been asked earlier in the year to make our contribution to the M & M fund (Ministry and Mission) £44,000 for 1997. This equates to about £4 per church member per week, based on the membership at January 1996. What now follows is much of the report that I gave to the Church Meeting at the end of November.

Offertory in 1995 was £41,000 (that's money collected in Church on Sundays cash and envelopes)

in 1996 will be £35,000

Income tax rebates and hall rents amount to £10,400

Fairs and Sales £1050 Gift Day £4930 Total Income about £51,880

Payments for 1996 will be £36,000 for Ministry & Mission Fund

£22,000 Insurance, Heating, Maintenance, Manse, Cleaning, 10% Mission Fund, etc.

Totals £58,000

which is £6120 less than our income.

This will not be quite as bad as it looks as money that was to be set aside in Organ Funds and Maintenance Funds, etc, will not be set aside - we can't afford to. That is, we can't afford to save for the future.

The Committee feels that it is important to explain and define the 10% Mission Fund, Some while ago the Church Meeting said that we as a Church should tythe our giving if we expected our members to do this, and so now 10% of all offertory and all rents received from hall lettings in a given year, will be given to 'Mission' the following year (This also includes donations to charities).

For 1997 the budget for Mission will be £3670 i.e. £2000 as part of the M & M £1500 to Ruth Chatfield. £170 to other Mission work

In addition to all this, Junior Church and other organisations donate money to needy causes, along with the collection from the Christmas day service, and that collected during Christian Aid week.

By the way, in calculating our Budget for 1997, our Treasurer has had to budget for a deficit of £8,300; that is what he thinks our income will be short of what we need to spend by the end of 1997. Could you budget for a deficit in your business or home? We only can in the faith that our income will improve.

The message from the Committee to the Elders, to the Church Meeting, and to the Church is that we are hard up. Indeed we are VERY HARD UP.

Our income has suffered steadily over the past few years. We frequently mention the envelope scheme and covenanting. And many of our favorite church members and friends belong to one or other scheme, or perhaps neither – but they do the best they can with fixed finances – and to them I tender my apologies for writing in this way.

Do please join our envelope scheme if you possibly can. It means that you promise to make your contribution for every Sunday, even if you should be away, and that means a commitment that is very much appreciated by those of us who manage the purse strings. It's absolutely vital that we have a regular income, as everyone will realize.

You can imagine what Head Office said about the drop in the money we give them, from 44 to 32 thousand. If any bells were ringing it was the Lutine bell. The money we give to our Denomination is vital for paying our ministers, contributing to their pension schemes, running C.W.M. our Missionary Society, and making our place in the Christian world an important one.

We pray that this New Year will bring us all peace and happiness, and also a commitment to our Lord's work in this part of His world.

?? MONEY ??

- Q. 1 What happens to the money that I put into the collection bag on Sunday?
- A. The offertory, made up of loose cash and money given in 'Free-will' envelopes is divided into three amounts which may vary from year to year. This year 56% will go to U.R.C. headquarters and will be used to pay Minister's salaries (including Peter's) and for administration; 34% will be used for the running of this Church; and 10% will be used for Mission and outreach.
- Q. 2 Why should I use a 'Free will' offertory envelope?
- A. Anyone who attends our church regularly can use 'Free will' envelopes. By using this scheme for your offertory the Church knows how much money will be coming in each week. It enables the giver to promise an offering even on the Sundays that they are absent. For more details see Mrs Audrey Ebeling (She sings in the Choir).
- Q. 3 What does 'Covenanting' mean?
- A If you are a tax payer and promise to make regular gifts, the Church can obtain a tax repayment of about 30p for every £1 you give. For more details on his subject speak to Mr. Michael Ebeling, (&he sings in the Choir)
- Q. 4 What is Tithing?
- A. Over the centuries Church Members have been asked to contribute 10% of their income to the Church. The Bible has teaching on this aspect of our giving.
- Q. 5 Where can I read in Scripture, the relevant passages to help me understand my responsibilities?
- A. 2 Corinthians Chapters 8 & 9, (esp. Ch. 9 vs. 7 & 8) & there are others to which you may refer.
- Q. 6 What happens to the money that I put into the retiring collection plate after the service of Holy Communion?
- A. This money is put to one side to enable the Church to help people who are experiencing great difficulty or crisis.
- Q. 7 What happens to the money that is raised at the Church Gift Day, Craft Fayres, Coffee mornings, and Jumble Sales?
- A. Each year the Church meeting decides how to use this money in an appropriate way. This year it will go towards the deficit we have, as a result of reduced income, but it might be used for charitable purposes or a special project i.e. the new Church heating system.
- Q. 8 We give 10% of our Church income to Mission work -- 10% of what income?
- A. We give away 10% of the money collected as offertory at Sunday's services, and 10% of the money we receive from renting out our premises.
- Q. 9 Does the Church bear a financial responsibility for me?
- A. Yes. For each member of the local Church the Church's headquarters expects to receive £4.00 per week. This money is required of each Church to fund the Ministers' salaries and to administrate the Church at a national level. We look to our weekly offerings to cover these costs, (see Q. 1) It is known as 'The Maintenance of the Ministry Fund'.
- Q. 10 I give as much as I can; why do people think that I should give more?
- A It is not for anyone to judge how much an individual should give, that is between them and the Lord, however it is the responsibility of the Church leaders to encourage people to review their giving.
- Q. 11 I still have questions unanswered, to whom should I speak?
- A. Speak to the Minister, the Church Treasurer, Mr Roy Gooderham, (&yes you've guessed he sings in the Choir too) or to any member of the Finance Committee whose name appears in the Church Handbook.

(from the FIELD)

November 1996

Hello! I've now been back in Congo for a month, so it's time for an update on the situation here...

GOOD NEWS!

* Following the death of Gary Dawson in Congo earlier this year, God has now called a new Wycliffe team (Pauline from UK and Deseree from Jamaica) to work with the Teke people, taking over where the Dawson family left off! We are very pleased that from next Easter the house in Ngo will again be occupied and that preparations for Bible translation into Teke can continue.



* Andrea's parents are now at the end of their month's visit to Congo and they have certainly been a blessing to us. After an initial week in Brazzaville, they travelled with us to Boundji to get a taste of village life. Many people came to greet them, bringing presents of chickens, papayas, mangoes, etc., and the local children provided an audience for Andrea's Dad as he set to work on



our garden - digging a small vegetable garden, building a gate, repairing the fence, planting trees, killing the chickens, etc!

Meanwhile Andrea's Mum was busy in the house with sewing projects, washing curtains, cleaning, etc. The house and garden never

looked so good! We now have two solar panels on the roof which should give us a more adequate supply of electricity to run computers and lights. (However, we also still have bats in the roof, and unless we find a way to evict them, they will eventually cause our plywood ceilings to fall down!! Any suggestions??)

*The day after our return to Boundji, Andrea's friend Pulchérie was baptised in the river. She and Andrea had been praying and reading the Bible together for a while. We were delighted that in our absence Pulchérie herself decided to be baptised, and also that we got back just in time to witness her baptism.





BAD NEWS!

- * You may remember that whilst in England I asked particularly for on-going prayer for the Mboshi team: Louis, Henri-Camille, Andrea and myself. On our return we found out that our two Mboshi co-workers had not done any of the work which we had left them to do in our absence. We had carefully planned and discussed with them the weekly seminars they were wanting to hold in different churches, schools and neighbouring villages to present the Mboshi alphabet and sell our new reading and writing book. We were therefore quite discouraged to meet with them and hear their excuses.
- * We see that Henri-Camille is very busy with other activities and we are not at all sure we can count on him to give us the time and commitment necessary for translation work. We are also very sad that Louis and Marianne, who never married officially but insisted that the traditional ceremony was sufficient, are currently living separately and each is blaming the other for their broken relationship.

* We arrived in Boundii to find Mama Anne, the lady to whom we pay our rent (the sister of our landlord) dying of liver cancer. She was a good friend and mothered us a little bit! Although she was an active Catholic, once the hospital in Brazzaville could do no more for her, she starting wearing a piece of cloth around her arm as a protective "fetish" against the powers believed to be causing the illness. It was distressing to see her dving in much pain, and to wonder whether at the end of the day her "faith" really counted for anything.



FUTURE PLANS

Andrea and I are now in Brazzaville trying to make plans for the coming months. In the light of the above discouragements, we have a number of questions as to how to proceed with our work:

Will people never do anything unless we are standing behind them all the time? Should we be looking for different people to join the team (e.g. someone speaking the southern dialect)? How many co-workers can we cope with in terms of supervising and training them, and giving them financial support? Is it more important to have coworkers who are linguistically and intellectually capable or who really love the Lord? If the latter, then where are such people in Boundji?

We also have technical questions: To what extent is it helpful to show tone with accent markers in written Mboshi? What kind of compromise do we need to make between the Boundii dialect of Mboshi and the southern dialects, so that both will consider it to be "their" language? If we are able to start translating some of Genesis next year, how do we go about setting up revision committees to check the draft texts and how can we prepare churches for using Mboshi Sciptures?

On a practical level, our truck has been fitted with some replacement parts from Germany and took us safely to Boundii and back, but on the way back down one of the wheels was over-heating and burnt out the inner tube. After that we had to stop every hour or so to sprinkle the wheel with cold water and let it cool down! We need to know God's timing for replacing the truck - whether to wait for a better second-hand truck to become available here, or to import a new truck from England, which would be an expensive business.

In all these things we really want to look to the Lord for HIS answers, and we are very grateful also for your prayers on our behalf.

We will return to Boundii at the beginning of December and have decided that this year we will stay in the village for Christmas and New Year. returning to Brazza around 10th Jan. for two weeks. (However, don't forget that mail-still reaches us in Boundji! It just takes a bit longer.)

This letter also serves to wish you a Happy Christmas! God has drawn near to us in Jesus what a reason for rejoicing! In Him.

This group, operating from the Cleveland area, continues to make frequent trips to Romania to help various orphanages. They reported that when delivering supplies in November, several hundred children were transferred from one place to another, and all of them were still in summer clothes. The Agency was, therefore, very keen to take as many boxes of knitted vests, tops and blankets as we could reserve for them. 

Dear Friends

You have been hearing directly, at church meetings, and indirectly through our worship themes recently, of a desire to reach out as God's people into the area in which we are set. You will be aware of the first steps in such a movement, a challenge by our Lord, we believe, to pray for the streets where we live and around the church. You may or may not live within the identified area, a square mile, with the church at the centre, in which we will begin to work, but that should not prevent you from praying for your neighbours, for your street. You may pass through our currently identified area and be able to pray for one of the streets as you pass along, or you may be able to pray for a particular street each day even if you only pass along it occasionally. What is important is that we begin to surround this area, its homes, its people with prayer. Ideally people will regularly walk each street, praying as they go, supported by others in their homes giving time to prayer.

There is no need if you are walking the street to fall on your knees at every gate or door. There is no need to keep stopping and closing your eyes and putting your hands together. There is a need to pray in your heart, seeking God's blessing on the people – even if you do not know who they are – and listening to God who will lead you into the areas you should be praying for. The Holy Spirit is a wonderful prayer guide if only we will let Him direct us, and one of the joys of prayer walking and praying for people we do not know is that we are totally dependent on the Holy Spirit to lead and guide us. I may want to tell God why I think my neighbour does not come to church, but in praying for the street God may show me I need to pray about something completely different.

We can do nothing without prayer, for this must undergird all we do in Jesus' name. Yet we must also recognise that prayer is not just about telling God what we want Him to do in any situation, nor is it about telling God how He must act to help us do what we want to do. Most of our prayer should be about listening to God and listening as He tells us what we must do. Maybe you will not be asked to pray each time you walk down the street; maybe you will be asked to praise and you may find yourself singing hymns praising God as you walk along, or playing praise tapes as you drive. Yet these acts too are part of the undergirding prayer as we bring the presence of God into this area.

Someone asked if I could print my sermon notes after the service when we started thinking about where God has placed us, and how like trees we need to be rooted in God's love. Someone else rang to share how God had encouraged her to see the situation in which she lives with new eyes and how her prayer-life is changing. I find it encouraging that God is using our worship to speak to people so positively. However, what I find more encouraging is that we are beginning to see where God wants us to go and what He wants us to do. This vision of reaching into our community cannot be done by one or two, but must be shared by us all, otherwise the vision will remain a dream and not become reality.

So please may I invite you in Jesus' name to share in the vision, sign up to pray for the streets around our church; we all have our part to play in the work of our Lord. To end with a quote from a song we often play in our car "Get on your knees and fight like a man."

Please continue to pray for us.

He was a good family man, and he and Roberta had been married for more than 44 years. He was a grandfather - Helen, his daughter, and Allen his son-in-law had given him two delightful grandchildren - Keely and Liam. I shall miss him tremendously for his friendship and humour amongst many other things.

CHRISTIANS TOGETHER IN GORING. CALLED TO BE ONE'

As reported in the December 1996 issue of the Chronicle this group has been reading and discussing the content and questions posed in the ecumenical booklet 'Called to be One', produced for discussion in Advent. The booklet reminded us Jesus prayed to His Father that all His disciples might be one, as He and the Father were one, 'so that the world might believe' (John 17:21). Although the early Christian churches strove to maintain their unity, as the second millenium began Eastern and Western churches divided from one another, and later, in the 16th Century, Catholics and Protestants divided. To the world at large the Christian churches had not always been good ambassadors for Christ's ministry of Christian churches had not always been good ambassadors for Christ's ministry of reconciliation. In the present century many of the churches have been trying to overcome their divisions so that they may be more credible when they preach gospel of reconciliation. In the 3 meetings devoted to the group's consideration of the booklet we discussed jointly, and in groups of 2 or 3, our different forms of Worship, our denominational structures, preparations for membership, areas which we have in common, those where we differ, and possible ways forward to greater levels of unity. At the end of the last session a report was prepared by the Rev. John Sutcliffe and the Rev. Micahel Hore, based on the responses of the group to questions posed in the booklet. The report has been sent to the County

questions posed in the booklet. The report has Ecumenical Officer and is as follows:-


- ii. Occasional united services.
- iii. Meeting for socialising and discussing differences.
- iv. Bi-monthly services to worship together in the style of a particular church.
- For future development the group recommends
 - i. Occasional exchange of pulpits.
 - ii. An open-air service during the summer.
 - iii. March for Jesus / procession of witness
- c. The group did not think it appropriate to recommend any specific changes for any of the local churches.
- 2. Do members of your group believe in organic union, looking for the end of separate denominations, or in unity in reconciled diversity, looking for closer working together of continuing distinct denominations? Is the latter a stage on the way to the former? Or do you have some other vision of unity?
 - a. The group believed in unity in reconciled diversity, particularly looking for things we can agree on and speaking up about them, while maintaining a mutual respect with regard to our differences.
 - b. The group was divided on whether unity in reconciled diversity should be a stage on the way to organic unity.
 - c. There was no other vision of unity that found consensus within the group.
- Does your group think it would be helpful for some (e.g. two or three) churches or denominations to take steps towards closer unity, even though other churches and denominations may not yet be ready to join them?

Yes, if they thought it appropriate.

- 4. Have you any other comments you would like to make?
 - a. We would like to suggest the encouragement of groups that are more local. Many of the Churches Together groups cover large areas. Our experience in Christians Together in Goring is that a group covering a relatively small area allows Christians and church leaders to get to know one another better, and this leads to deeper respect and more effective co-operation. Such a group can act as a catalyst for other local groups or even larger groups.
 - b. The views expressed here generally represent the majority of thinking of the group and do not necessarily express the views of each individual member of it.



Dear Friends,

In a recent conversation with someone I shared that in our house we talked with God who was here as a real person. This seemed to be greeted with a mixture of two reactions, one which seemed to be 'so he should, he's the minister', tempered with a look that said 'I wonder if he's feeling all right – it may be the strain'. What I had hoped for was a reaction that said 'so what, so do I', but as this person was outside the church, I guess that was too much to hope for. Yet, was this reaction one that could even be expected among most people, even church people, in an age where God seems to have little place in the lives of most people. So where does God find a place in your life?

Now, if you are still reading, that's a step in the right direction, for at least you must be interested, but be honest with yourself, how real is God in your life? I'm not wanting to be negative, nor to suggest that everything you do should be centred around God, but that everything you do includes God – for this is what it means to let God into your life. He really must go everywhere with you, at home, at work, at play, not only in worship or your time spent in prayer or Bible study, but in all that you do. Once we accept this then we soon discover we can talk to God and we can expect God to talk to us. We can expect help with any problems we might have, and we can expect to have a fresh insight into God's powers.

Now, many people will ask, how can this be? It can only be because we are given the gift of the Holy Spirit, not something magical or mysterious which we cannot explain, but God's gift freely given to those who will receive Him into their lives. In 381 the Second General Council which met at Constantinople described the Holy Spirit as 'the Lord and Life-giver who proceeds from the Father, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped together and glorified together'. The 'Life-giver' is a phrase I find helpful and encouraging as it reminds us of the fullness of life that can only be found when God is present. Jesus Himself says 'I am come that they may have life, and have it abundantly' (John 10:10) and this promise is still real for us after His death and resurrection through the outpouring of the Holy Spirit.

Now I hope that you are still reading because this will come to you as Lent turns our thoughts towards our Lord. Lent for so many people is a time for giving things up. How much better to take something up, to increase God's place in all we do. All God asks is that you let Him into your life, even into the areas where, at the moment, you exclude Him, and leave the rest to Him. Don't forget though, that letting God into your life will transform it, as we have found, for the better, yet if enough of us are willing and prepared to do this then there will be a transformation in all we share. It's no use complaining that God does nothing for us if we do not let Him have complete control. The end of Lent reminds us so powerfully that Jesus has made the first steps, but the gift is only there when we move to take it.

Please continue to pray for our family as we value your support in this way.

THE NEW HOSPITAL CHAPEL

It was my privilege and pleasure to represent our Church at the Dedication Service of St Cuthman's Chapel in the new East Wing of Worthing Hospital. Worthing has waited twenty years for the completion of its hospital, and it was fitting that the Chapel, set in the heart of this fine new building, should be the first part to be officially opened, and on St Cuthman's Day. Officiating at the service were the Rev Martin Broadbent, Chairman of the London and South West District of the Methodist Church; the Right Rev Cormac Murphy O'Connor, Roman Catholic Bishop of Arundel and Brighton; and the Rt Rev Lindsay Urwin, Anglican Bishop of Horsham; also the three hospital Chaplains. It was a truly ecumenical service invoking the blessings of Almighty God on the Chapel that it may be a place of hope and healing and peace, and a place of prayer and support for the sick and those who care for them. We prayed that the Chapel be dedicated to the Glory of God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and for the worship of God in praise and prayer, and for the celebration of the Holy Sacraments. We prayed for the giving of health and wholeness to all who are sick, of comfort to all who mourn, of strength to all who tend the sick and injured, of light to all who seek the way whatever their faith or belief.

The singing was led by the St. Botolph's choir and joyously we sang 'Our God Reigns', 'Jubilate, everybody, serve the Lord in all your ways', 'Be still for the power of the Lord is moving in this place', and 'Let there be love shared among us'. We were reminded that whenever we look to the interests of the sick and suffering and all those who work with them, we are co-workers with God whose Son came among us to heal and save.

When the new wing is fully opened do take the opportunity to visit the Chapel – this is only a taster – and, perhaps, learn more of St Cuthman, depicted in the Altar frontal and on a banner. 2 Chronicles 6 vv 18-21.

More than 2.6 million Scriptures were produced during 1995. The 10 millionth Bible was produced in July 1995 and this figure included more than 70,000 produced for export to Vietman, Laos, and Myanmar (formerly Burma). In January this year 'Bible-a-Month Club' funds were to be used to provide paper for the Amity Press. Members of the Club pledge themselves to give a minimum of £3 per month to provide Scriptures worldwide.

THE WORLD ALLIANCE OF REFORMED CHURCHES

The WARC was founded in 1875, and it now has 199 member churches which link about 70 million Christians in 99 countries around the world. Moreover, it is estimated that there are about 550 Reformed Churches throughout the world, which means that the Reformed family is the third largest world communion after the Roman Catholic and Eastern Orthodox Churches.

The General Secretary of the WARC writes that it has the following contributions to offer the whole church:-

- the emphasis on the universal priesthood of believers
- the emphasis on Eldership

- our sense of responsibility for the political community, for the world, and our concern for world issues
- our system of church government, and the way our church life is structured

It is sometimes difficult not to be depressed by reports of declining membership and fewer ministers, so it should be a source of encouragement that the URC is a member of such a large world family of churches with shared beliefs.



Dear Friends.

At the end of this month I shall be beginning a sabbatical period which will last until the beginning of September. During this time I am going to look at the teaching of children and young people within the church. There are some important issues facing us all in this area of our work and, in particular, I aim to talk with people about the best time to work with children and young people. For example, is Sunday morning the only time, or even the best time? I also hope to look at materials available and the sort of format we use, for example, should we have the controlled system of learning that we find in schools, or should we look at the more relaxed format we use at times, like holiday clubs? We also need to consider those who teach and work with our children and young people. How do we best resource them and what sort of teaching notes and materials are most suitable? Then, of course, there is the big question of how we encourage people to be involved in this work and what sort of training we can provide.

I have always been somewhat reluctant to spend too much time away from the church and the work into which God has called me, not because I believe I am indispensable, far from it, but because I believe that such time should produce something positive for the church as well as myself, and because it rarely seems the right time. I feel certain that the project I am undertaking will be a benefit to the church and I know that it can only be done by taking time out from the normal tasks which so easily fill my time. I am not, perhaps naturally, so sure about the timing, for although we will have done some of the preparation for our autumn 'Emmaus' programme, there are still things that need to be done in co-ordinating groups, but I know that this will be done most efficiently by others, and of course the normal running of the church's life will also go on. It is in this part of the decision to take the sabbatical that it has been so good to know that we have here an eldership who have been called and empowered by God and who will ensure that all continues without even the slightest ripple.

One of the things I shall miss, however, is the elections in July, and so I hope you will forgive me for mentioning them now. Nominations for our eldership will already have closed by the time you read this, but as the names of those standing become known, please pray for the people who are allowing their names to go forward and pray that God will guide us as we vote at the church meeting. We shall, of course, be seeking other officers and people to serve on our church committees and as nominations are again invited, careful prayer will need to be made so that the people God wants to serve are those we elect. The system of eldership and church committees, which allows us to do the work that God wants us to do, will only function properly when we get the right people in the right situation. These things are not just about what we want to do but where God wants us to be serving Him, for they are not about our glory but His. My prayer as we come to this time is two-fold and yet a single thought, that God will raise up men and women who acknowledge Jesus as Lord of their life and who recognise that they are called to serve here at Goring and make that their prime commitment to their Lord.

My return in September will see us beginning our outreach and our study groups; it will also see us as the only church in Worthing with a minister. We will indeed be challenged in our life and growth together, but these must be seen as opportunities for God to work, rather than burdens to weigh us down. Enjoy the summer even with the responsibilities it brings on you in July, that we be ready to serve our Lord in the autumn.

Please continue to pray for us and our family during this time; we are very conscious of the protection of your prayers as we stand firm in the Lord's work, despite the attempts of those forces to undermine what God wants to do. If you need to contact us during these months and feel you do not see us around, please do so through Hilary Redman.

FEBA RADIO ON AIR TO THE MIDDLE EAST

In the Middle East, Sunday is a working day. People listen to their radios before leaving for work. One programme from Feba Seychelles they can tune in to every Sunday is 'From Darkness to Light', a series supported by several churches in the UK.

Programmes mainly comprise interviews, guests being asked how they became Christians. Last autumn one featured Moussa, a young Lebanese, telling how he came to Christ during

the war in Lebanon. Fatal told his story of addiction to cigarettes, drink and drugs and of how God rescued him from his misery through the influence of friends and the prayers and testimony of his sister.

Another programme had three people from different countries, one a Pakistani who found the Lord while in Scotland. Then there was the testimony of Kon Akij from Sudan. He came to Christ after corresponding with Feba staff and hearing God's word on the radio and at a local church.

Feba's extensive Arabic ministry was the focus for prayer on 'Feba Radio Sunday' on 27 April this year.

1997 also marks 25 years since Arabic broadcasts began from Seychelles on 5 March 1972. Now there are over 49 programmes each week on air.

This radio outreach was extended last autumn when Feba began transmitting Arabic programmes from a mediumwave station. The MW programmes in Arabic complement the shortwave service from Seychelles, reaching listeners in Syria, Lebanon, Palestine, Jordan, Egypt and north west Iraq.



Dear Friends.

The holiday season means GOING PLACES. I hope those who have already had their holiday will have pleasant memories, and that those of us who anticipate holidays will find renewal of body, mind, and spirit.

THERE is always a thrill and interest in visiting historical places, great cathedrals like Durham and Chichester. Part of the thrill is to stand where historical persons have stood. In Westminster Hall people go everyday to stand where King Charles the First stood for trial. During my ministry in Hoddesdon, Hertfordshire, I became aware of Isaac Walton, Charles Lamb, and William Cowper, the poet. I walked where they walked. At Grasmere, in the Lakeland, I like to walk the paths that William Wordsworth walked, and read some of the verses he wrote; or sit in Dove Cottage, the home of Dorothy Wordsworth, and recall events in her journal. At Paphos, in Cyprus, in an ancient Greek Orthodox Church, I stood on the site on which Paul and Barnabas preached. If only you can stand where someone else stood, and see what he saw, and also what he thought, and think the thoughts again, it is even more interesting and moving. This is even more so when you walk the Way of the Cross in Jerusalem, or stand on the site of the garden of Gethesemane on the Mount of Olives, or sit quietly in the Garden of Resurrection .

On the third of July

I visited friends in the City of Bath and immediately thought of one of my favourite authors - Jane Austen - who walked its streets and visited the famous buildings, although she preferred to live in the country. My friends took me to see Glastonbury Abbey which I had not before visited. There is a well laid-out Exhibition telling you the story of the Abbey, and the kind of life led by the monks of ancient times. What, however, remains with me, is the impression of the majestic remains of the Abbey and in the silence the sense of this being Holy Ground, a place where God was present, and had been praised and worshipped. In the grounds is the winter flowering Glastonbury Thorn tree which is reputed to have come into existence after Joseph of Arimathaea's arrival in Britain. A branch of the tree is cut and sent to members of the Royal Family at Christmas each year. There is a legend that Jesus was taken to Glastonbury:

"And did those feet, in ancient times, Walk upon England's mountains green? And was the Holy Lamb of God On England's pleasant pastures seen? And did the countenance divine Shine forth upon our clouded hills?"

We do not know. What we do know is that where and whatever the Sanctuary where prayer is made and God is worshipped and His Word proclaimed, His feet walks within the Sanctuary today. When I visit a Church, whether it be ancient, or modern, I can sense, from the atmosphere, whether those who worship there do so in spirit and in truth. May people who come into this Church immediately feel and know that JESUS IS HERE!


LITTLE FISHES.

Special News Update from CAMEROON

reetings from Yaounde, Cameroon! Andrea and I are well and we give thanks to God who is still in control, despite the terrible war which started in Congo on 5th June. On 17th June we drove out of Boundji across a high mountain plateau into neighbouring Gabon...

June 5th: After confrontations in two towns near Boundji between President Lissouba's men and Expresident Sassou's "Cobra" militia, fierce fighting starts in Brazzaville. Both sides in this power struggle are heavily armed.

June 6th: We wake up to hear that the Cobras who control Boundji (Sassou is a Mboshi man) have commandeered most of the vehicles in town. However, our good old Daihatsu jeep is still outside our house!!

We could so easily have been woken at 4am by armed soldiers demanding our car keys! Cobras here are pillaging the houses of government people and are shooting in the air. Tension is high. All communication with Brazza is cut off. We pray for friends and colleagues in Brazza (including a Wycliffe mum about to give birth). The BBC tells us fighting is fiercest just where the Wycliffe centre is situated.

June 7th: At midnight an opportunist thief tries to break into our house. He threatens Andrea through an open bedroom window. We are able to shout for help and the man flees into the night.

June 8th: Two truck loads of Cobras leave Boundji for the next town (Owando), which is held by government forces. On the radio we hear that the French are evacuating foreigners from Brazza in the midst of heavy gunfire and mortar shells, and that there are many bodies lying in the streets. We wonder if our new centre has been pillaged or hit by a mortar yet.

June 10th: The Cobras have returned to Boundji, after killing a number of people in Owando. Rumours are spreading that soldiers from Owando are coming here to take revenge. Praise God that we can run to him with our fear!

June 11th: Two French development workers drive out of Boundji in a panic and head for the border with Gabon. (We could have travelled out with them, but wanted first to say goodbye to friends and pack up the house). After their departure we feel peaceful. A cease-fire has been announced in Brazza. We visit the Italian catholic sister in Boundji and encourage each other.

June 12th: The cease-fire in Brazza has not been respected. Truck loads of people fleeing Brazza are beginning to arrive in Boundji. Others are WALKING hundreds of miles to join their families in the north. We are gradually preparing to leave. We do not feel in danger and would like to stay, but we have no centact with the outside world and people will be anxious about us...

June 13th: Our neighbour has just received word that her brother-in-law has been killed in Brazza, and the women are wailing loudly. We know that many more have yet to receive similar bad news from Brazza. My church is having two days of prayer and fasting. Together we consider 2 Chronicles 7v14: "If my people... will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven and will forgive their sins and heal their land." We know that many are praying, but that not all are putting their lives in order before God. We must make sure WE are right with Him!

June 14th: Some friends are telling us to leave for Gabon as soon as possible. There is a lull in fighting in Brazza, but no real solution in sight. We have the truck all loaded up when we hear that our colleagues Pauline and Deseree are still in their village (Ngo) and are trying to contact us! (We thought they had gone to Brazza before the war started.) So we decide to stay until Monday to try & talk with them by phone radio.

June 15th: I feel strongly that I should talk to a nominally Catholic friend, Guy, ("Glee" without the "I") about surrendering his life to Jesus. However, he is not at his house...

June 16th: We speak to Pauline over a crackling radio. She & Deseree are fine but have been advised not to travel right now and they do not have much diesel... Guy comes to visit and we have a long talk. He has never understood that he can only save his life if he gives himself over to Jesus. We pray together and he does just that! New life in the midst of war and death - Praise God!

On the following day we really did drive out of Boundji, leaving Guy in the care of a Christian brother. We travelled across some deserted rough countryside but amazingly had no flat tyres or any other problems with the truck - nor with soldiers. The Congolese man who travelled with us was turned back at the border, as were refugees from Rwanda and former Zaire, but we were allowed through. On reaching the Gabonese town of Franceville (more than 250 miles from Boundji), we stayed there with missionaries for several days. We then flew to the capital, Libreville (just as well we had only taken essential luggage!) and later to Cameroon.

Already in Gabon we began to receive news via telephone, fax and E-mail of the missionaries who had been in Brazzaville. One family had everything looted from their house and left with just the shirts on their backs. The "mum" gave birth in Brazza and was evacuated the next day! Another family had bullets come through their roof, and most were stuck in their houses for several days until they could be safely escorted out by French military. One evacuation plane was shot at as it took off from Brazza, but got to Kinshasa safely. The stress was great, but so was God's protection and help!

We hear that Pauline and Deseree are still doing fine in Congo! However, two Congolese pastors have travelled up the Congo River by motorised dug-out canoe and then journeyed inland to their village, in order to bring them out to Kinshasa. We are praying for a successful conclusion to this rescue operation!

Our big concern now is for Congolese friends and colleagues who were in Brazzaville. Our Director, Larry, just wrote from Kinshasa that "we are hearing Brazzaville being blown to bits day after day". Many have fled into the countryside or been killed. If you are stopped at a road block and are from the "wrong" ethnic group you are likely to be shot. Shops have all been looted and food coming from Kinshasa is very expensive. Our two co-workers, Louis and Roch were in Brazza at the start of the war, as was the Mboshi student (another Guy) who became a Christian following our recent survey trip. WE HAVE NO NEWS OF ANY OF THEM.

Of secondary concern is our newly renovated Wycliffe centre, vehicles office equipment, computers, personal belongings, etc. left in Brazza. It is possible that everything is lost, and we may not be able to return for a

while. As a Wycliffe branch we will have to rethink our whole strategy for Congo.

In the meantime, Andrea and I have been warmly welcomed by Wycliffe colleagues in Cameroon. From mid-July to mid-August we will help with a course training Cameroonians to analyse their own languages. We will stay in Cameroon for several months. Our director and some other Wycliffe Congo members are planning to come here for a while. The future is uncertain for us, but not for God!



Dear Friends.

It is good to be back this month into a more normal routine than has been the case over the time of our sabbatical. The project we committed ourselves to has gone very well, even if not quite the way we thought at the time when we were planning, and we hope that the outcome will be seen in the life of the church as we seek to share the Good News of Jesus with children and young people over the next years. There will also be a document sharing some thoughts should anyone wish to read it. Please ask if you are interested.

Apart from our main concern, this time has given the opportunity to reflect on many things which crop up during the day to day experience of ministry. Perhaps the greatest joy of the sabbatical was the opportunity to create time and space to a project which so often gets too little of our time, the ability to concentrate on one aspect of ministry without any other time pressures which inevitably are around in the normal round of responsibilities. This whole aspect of time and ministry is something that really has struck home over the past few weeks.

There was once a time when the greatest pressure that the mail brought was a financial one. Not the bills that needed to be paid alone, but rather the fact that we, like most ministerial households, seem to get our fair share of letters appealing for financial help. We hear from Christian Aid or Tear Fund regularly, and especially when there is a disaster which needs to be met. We have appeals made for the homeless, the hungry, the young and the old. We could help drug rehabilitation groups or battered wives' groups, the needy at home and far away. The list is almost endless and arrives, not because we are very wealthy, nor because we are seen as a 'soft touch', but because each group hopes that they will persuade us of their cause and we in turn will persuade the church to share its resources with these worthwhile charities, all of which can make a very good case for us all to support them. Yet you and I know that there is a limit to how much can be supported and we must make some tough decisions on occasions, and equally, once you get more than two or three people together, someone will think it's the wrong decision. A long, long time ago our decision was to give our tithe, 10% of our income, to the church where we worshipped, and our gifts to a small number of charities who we feel an affinity with.

Now let us share with you what we see as a new pressure that the post brings almost every day. It is the pressure to give not our money, but our time. Almost every day there is an invite to go on one course or another. Why not spend a few days away learning the art of marriage counselling, or a week learning to deal with bereavement, come to lunch and hear about our hopes for the church, or come to our worship seminars over the next few Monday evenings. Recently there arrived an invite to circle any one of six days and choose am, pm or evening, with the promise that if there was enough interest, something could be 'fixed up'. Half days here and evenings there and suddenly there is no time left for anything else. Each and every opportunity would be time well spent, and anyone could make an excellent case for going on all these courses, but again some difficult decisions need to be made.

Part of the consideration given in deciding how to use our time in the sabbatical was, 'will it benefit us?' and 'will the outcome benefit the church?' These same considerations need to be given by us all as we see advertised around our buildings so many ways in which to spend our time away from the base in which God has placed us. Time is as valuable a gift, perhaps even more so, than our financial wealth, so it is vital we use it properly. The decision to give most of our available time to God means in the first instance, giving it to the work of the local church, and the opportunities to grow in the fellowship into which we are called. Over the next weeks, months, even years, there will be opportunities for all of us to use our time for the work here in Goring, but we need to commit that precious resource to the Lord's work here or else we will find that the harvest is plentiful but the labourers are few because they are all busy elsewhere.

It's good to be back and to spend time with you all in the Lord's work.

FEBA Radio has been broadcasting to Mozambique for a long time in the national language, Portuguese.

Programmes presenting the Gospel include the evangelistic series Words of Life, Sound of Youth and News of Joy. A listener writes, "Your programmes have been very useful for me and comforting. They feed me spiritually."

Programmes like Talk in the Field and Voices of the Village also bring practical advice in growing food and basic health care.

LISTENER TURNED BROADCASTER

He encouraged him in his new found faith and introduced him to the Baptist Church he is now attending in Pemba, capital of Cabo Delgado, a Province in northern Mozambique.

Pastor Jemusse at the Baptist Church says that Bacar's doing well. Nowadays he does more than listen to radio. Towards the end of 1996 he began working for Radio Mozambique. He is now making programmes in Kimwani - a language spoken in Cabo Delgado.





Dear Friends

This month I would like to share with you a letter I have written to Rev. Tony Burnham, the General Secretary of the URC.

"Dear Tony

Having just returned from Sabbatical, I have been 'catching up' with all sorts of things in the life of our church, including the decisions of Assembly. should, perhaps, state at the outset my opposition to the ordination of practising homosexuals and, therefore, I am opposed to accepting them for training for the ministry within the URC. Having experienced the need to minister to those in such a relationship, and to minister to families whose children live in such relationships, I would not wish to exclude anyone from the love of Jesus our Lord and Saviour. I also recognise that there are those who have difficulty in accepting my ministry as a remarried divorcee; however, it seems Scripturally clear that when we recognise that we have fallen short of God's standard, and repent, turning again to God, that we find the forgiveness and peace offered through the death of Jesus. This is not what I hear those who wish to seek ordination as practising homosexuals saying, rather they are arguing that such relationships are not sinful - a view I cannot support. For the church to ordain those who continue to live in such relationships, is to accept their argument that any loving relationship is what God intended. I find no support for this view in Scripture, indeed the opposite, and I hear Jesus saying 'do not sin again'.

This being the outline for my opposing this move, may I also express a further concern about the nature of the URC. I am a member of the URC because, although any human structures are flawed, I do believe that the conciliar nature of our church is a good way of discerning God's will as His people meet together in prayer under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. I think that there will be clear guidance by the Holy Spirit and that the outcome of the vote for resolution 19 does not give this clear guidance. In any church meeting we seek a clear majority and certainly I would have interpreted such percentages as a need for further prayer and reflection had these been the results of a church meeting where I was in the chair. I recognise that we will not always be unanimous and I hope I would be the first to accept a vote that went against my understanding if it were clearly the will of God. This is not the case with resolution 19 and, therefore, I urge Mission Council to go back to resolution 18 and allow the church more time to seek God's will while retaining the position as it existed prior to the Assembly. We cannot allow too much time even if some think two years was long enough, it clearly was not.

I remain committed to the conciliar nature of the URC but I shall write and speak to oppose the ordination of practising homosexuals for the reasons I have outlined. My prayer will also be that we may, as a church, repent and turn again to the Lord living in faithfulness to the paths He laid out for us at the time of our union.

Three Christians are being held in police custody in SHAHADARA, Pakistan, accused of abduction and rape of Rahila, a young Muslim woman who has gone missing. Pastor Salim

Arthur, his son Reuben and Salima, a 22 year old woman, were arrested on June 21st, along with seven other members of the Pastor's family, who have since been released. Rahila, a former class-mate of Salima, had ben attending Bible studies with her at the Pastor's home. When her family discovered her interest in Christianity they immediately arranged for her to marry a Muslim. At this point Rahila disappeared. It is thought that she may have run away to escape a marriage she did not want, or possibly to marry a different man.

Please pray for Rahila. If she has run away, pray that she will show herself for the sake of her friends. All the Christian families in the village, especially the Pastor's family, feel vulnerable to attack while she is thought to have been abducted. Pray for the three Christians in prison that the truth of the situation may be revealed, and that they will be released. (In a bulletin from 'The Barnabas Fund')

The prayer of a good person has a powerful effect. Elijah was the same kind of person as we are. He prayed earnestly that there would be no rain, and no rain fell for 3½ years. Once again he prayed and the sky poured out its rain and the earth produced its crops. James 5 vv 16b-18.

EGYPT. There has been increasing violence by Islamic militants against Christians, especially in remote areas. Pray about the lack of adequate protection by the authorities, and the failure of Muslim leaders to condemn the militants. Thousands of copies of the Jesus film and Prodigal videos were sold at the Cairo Book Fair in January. Pray that they may be shown often to families, friends and neighbours by those who purchased them. Many people, whether by accident or design, tune in to Christian radio broadcasts and newer media, like satellite television and the internet in Arabic. (From World Press News).

LONELINESS

Loneliness is one of the most debilitating and devastating dis-eases experienced, i suppose, everywhere. Since coming south to live, however, it would appear to be of endemic proportions. There are times, may be many of them, when we do not feel as if we are in relationship either with Christ, or with other people, when for one reason or another, we feel totally and utterly alone.

Let me paint some pictures of loneliness:-

- 1. There is the loneliness associated with bereavement when someone precious and close to you is no longer there. That loneliness expresses itself in grief, numbness, bewilderment. There is a whole range of emotions that of being left alone without intimate relationship because of suffering experienced by the loved one because of the unexpectedness of it perhaps wrong relationships never put right. It is a physical, loneliness with many emotional expressions as well.
- There is that devastating loneliness even when surrounded by people. In a crowd you can feel very much on your own. Everyone else is with someone, but you feel left out. Even when, to all intents and purposes, you are part of the crowd, may even be the life and soul of the party, but deep down you FEEL alone. Or again, maybe you really are alone, living in a situation which enforces that isolation on you. You wonder when anyone will contact, write or telephone you, or invite you out. Maybe you have even chosen that aloneness, but not the loneliness it produces. We can look at these pictures in a different way, for behind each of them are expressions of physical, emotional and spiritual loneliness. Physical loneliness is felt most deeply by those who live alone. There is noone to talk to, and to share with when sickness and problems arise. Is it worth cooking a meal just for one? etc. Emotional loneliness afflicts everyone from time to time. There is also much we want and need to talk about, and share with another, but cannot bring ourselves to do so. People do not seem to have the time, or inclination, to understand. We feel hemmed in, with a great wealth of feeling struggling to get out - a desire to share things at a deep level, not just superficialities. There is the need to be understood. There is the need to love, and not to be misunderstood in that, as well as the need to BE loved and FEEL loved. Spiritual loneliness is greatest when we lose the awareness of God's presence. There is a great empty hole at the centre of our being, and there seems to be no meaning or purpose in life.

The answer to all these types of loneliness lies in GOD. How can we work through this desperation and come again into the fullness of relationships and wholeness which God intends for us? I would suggest four things:-

- 1. Experience His loneliness. Read Matthew Ch.20 vv 36-46 and Ch.27 vv 25-50) the story of Jesus praying in the Garden of Gethsemane before His arrest, and then the crucifixion. We have never experienced real loneliness when we see loneliness in these terms. Jesus was at the greatest point of need as He prayed in the Garden, but even His closest friends could not keep awake to support Him. He was without human fellowship. Then on the Cross He was much more significantly separated from His Heavenly Father 'My God, my God, why hast Thou forsaken me?' That is total, and utter loneliness, to which we have never been subjected. Jesus understands how we feel. It is important that we enter into some of what He felt as He died for us. We shall never be as lonely as He was.
- 2. Allow Him to fill the hole inside. We must trust Him with our deepest thoughts, feelings and needs.

- 3. Let Him take away our fear of being alone. If we allow Jesus to fill that hole inside us we need not fear to be alone with Him. In fact, we must seek out such times. Aloneness is not the same as loneliness. Jesus sought solitude many times to be alone in prayer with His Father.
- 4. Let Him give us people. We are not made to live alone, and we need people to share our lives as Jesus had His disciples. Let God open us up to people at Church as neighbours in our families to others who also badly need such fellowship perhaps through the telephone a letter or by a visit and thus help to free others from THEIR lonely prisons. From Good News Bible: God has said 'I will never leave you, I will never abandon you' (Hebrews Ch.13 v 6). 'Even if I go through the deepest darkness, I will not be afraid, Lord, for you are with me.' (Psalm 23 v 4).

SUMMER CAMP AT FELPHAM

During the summer I spent 10 days as part of a Scripture Union Mission team at Felpham. Here is a brief outline of the week:

- Fri 8 August arrive and meet other team members over a meal
- Sat 9 August preparation day: discussing the programme, decorating the hall, Making props, rehearing drama and songs, etc.
 - commissioning service in the evening led by Prayer Support team leaders
- Sun 10 August in pairs visit different local Church services and tell them about mission activities

afternoon outreach event on the Promenade (fast paced music and games)

Mon 11 August to Fri 15 August

The mornings began at 8.15 a.m. with the whole team (35 people) meeting for an hour of praise, worship, prayer and Bible study. After that we divided into our smaller groups depending on the age we were working with: 5-10 year olds; 11-18 year olds; or adults, and went to our different venues.

I was working with the 5-10 year olds (with 15 other leaders) and was responsible for a group of 5 year olds. Our theme was "GO BANANAS" and we looked at 5 Biblical characters who trusted God and stood out amongst those around them: NOAH (Gen 6v9-22);GIDEON (Judges 6 and 7); ELDAH (1 Kings 18v17-39); ZACCHEUS (Luke 19v1-10); and JEMIMA (Luke 7v36-50). The morning session was between 10.10 and 11.50 a.m. and included welcome and registration in small groups; then all together for singing, watching the video introducing the Bible character of the day, messy activity with quiz and watching drama; then back into small groups for drinks, discussion and activity on main teaching point for the day, craft; then all together again to review the day's teaching and give out notices; and finally back into small groups to go home.

On Thursday morning we had an appeal and 24 of the 70 children came and asked to become Christians. I was especially encouraged as 3 of my group of 6 asked me to pray with them.

The children arrived again from 2.10 to 3.15 p.m. for the afternoon sessions which were blocks of activities:- Potted sports; Tide fight with other age group teams; Praise party; Craft afternoon; and Fancy Dress party.

Each day after the children left we had "free time" for 1½ hours when we often went for walks to the beach, into town, and generally spent time together. Then after the evening meal we had our preparation time for the next day. This was spent reviewing the day, praying, studying the theme for the next day, and lots of cutting out for craft activities. We usually left the hall at approximately 8.00 p.m. whilst the teenagers were still meeting (they had morning, afternoon, and evening activities!).

On Friday evening there was a family Barn Dance and the hall was packed.

Sat 16 August - packing up, clearing away, cleaning, etc.

- afternoon outreach event on Promenade
- Family Quiz evening

Sun 17 August – team review of the week

- Worship together, with Communion
- lunch and return home

The weather was hot and sunny all week but on our outdoor events just enough cloud over came over to protect us from excessive heat.

I really enjoyed my week and can't wait for next year.





As all you gardeners will know, gardening is like everything else, if you do the ground work properly, remove old roots, stones and weeds, then you save yourself time in the long run. Planning and preparation are essential if the joys which will come eventually are not to be spoilt by the unexpected or the overlooked problem which will raise its head. Of course, you do not want to pull everything out of the garden either, for it would be foolish to reduce your garden to plain soil so that you could start completely afresh. Where would the joy of seeing some hidden gems suddenly spring up come from? The work of those who have arranged the garden before should not be lightly discarded as we begin to mould and shape flower beds, bushes and other features, and certainly not until they have had a chance to make their impact on you. Perhaps, however, as you look at the garden there are things which need to be moved, and these must be transplanted with care and at the right time. There are things which will need to be pruned and maybe things which do need to be discarded. Then, of course, there are the new things to plant. Deciding where and when is very important and they must be tended with love and care.

There is, of course, one main problem in the planning and preparation of your garden, and that is that really in many ways it is an act of faith. Few flowers or shrubs look as good as they did in the catalogue, and what grows well in someone else's garden may struggle in yours. Then, of course, we are dependent on God to send the right amount of sun and rain, and at the right time, to help the garden grow, for without God's help all the preparing and planting, the planning and the working is in vain. St Paul reminds the church in Corinth that it is God who matters because He makes the plant grow and 'we are partners working together for God'.

Now all this is by way of introducing some thoughts on the proposed 'Worthing Area Ministry'. There can be little or no doubt that change is on the way and we need to be prepared and ready to take full advantage of the new opportunities which will be presented to us. By the time you are reading this, all the churches will have met and discussed the proposals and we will be exploring the outcome of those decisions. However, it is a good chance to look at our own church, our own part of the 'garden'. We will not dig up everything, but what do we feel needs to be pruned? What will need to be removed that new things can be planted and encouraged, and is there anything that needs to be moved to create new areas of growth. Remember, good planning and preparation are vital if the final result is to be as good as we wish.

Many people have asked what we think. Well, like many in the churches we have experienced both 'group ministry' (churches coming together) and 'team ministry' (working alongside other ordained ministers), and so we are not going into this with our eyes closed, as it were. There are, obviously, advantages and disadvantages for everyone, but if we all come in the power of the Holy Spirit then we shall see the Lord do great things. We began by saying that with a 'manageable' garden, gardening could be enjoyable, and the same is true in full-time ministry like everything else. One of the great advantages in Worthing is that there will be three full-time 'gardeners', their selection and how we use them will be vital, but so will the support and encouragement of each church member, for we will be a team together to ensure that the garden God plants here will bloom and flourish.

Please continue to pray for us and our family in these days.


The Fruits of Believing

Poverty is reflected by the fact of 80% unemployment and yet the people are warm and very hospitable. They are keen to offer their skills and time but they lack money to buy materials where buildings are required. The pastor of the church in Nagyzolos, Bela Czirok, mentioned that their members are building a church in faith as money for materials is prayed in. They have an immediate need of £1,500 for roofing materials before the winter.

Our World Church & Mission committee has given £100 from its budget, and also a further £500 has been forthcoming through our church. At our Church Meeting in September it was agreed that we make this need known in the hope that there will be others within our fellowship who would like to contribute to this project.
