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

It is very difficult to determine the exact origins of Saint Valentines Day. The story goes that during the 3rd Century in the reign of the Roman Emperor Claudius II a priest was arrested and eventually sentenced to be executed. Whilst he was in prison he fell in love with his

jailer's daughter and she with him. On the day that he was led out to his death he left a little note in his cell addressed to her. It was signed '*From Your Valentine*' So the tradition of Valentines came into being.

Of course today Valentines Day is big business for card retailers, florists, shops and the like. Nonetheless it would be good to think that it was not only commercialism that keeps Valentines Day alive, but a real desire for romance. Not the slushy romance of Mills & Boon but the romantic element that is so essential in human life that was exemplified in the little note left by the saint himself as he went to his martyrdom.

The Bible is the most romantic book of all times. It contains the most beautiful love story ever, that of God's love for humanity. Did you know that there are 536 verses in scripture relating to the topic of love? Just look at John 14 verse 21 where we hear words of Jesus himself -



"They who have my commandments and keep them are those who love me; and those who love me will be loved by my Father, and I will love them and reveal myself to them."

> Then there is the famous text found at John 3 verse 16 "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life." There is no doubt that we all like and need to be loved and the exciting



Bobby Hitchin advised us that the total sent to Headquarters so far, including proceeds from the lunch amounted to $\pounds 338-35$. She expressed her thanks to those who continue to fill phials for this part of our involvement.

CHRISTIAN AID

Bett Swierk reported that over 30 shoe boxes had been donated, and proposed that this work would continue in 2004, for those who desire to do so. A Carol Service at Lancing College Chapel on December 4th. would raise further funds for Worthing supporters.

Christian Aid was involved in Nicaragua, Central America, providing funds for the poorest smallholders to purchase plots of land to grow "Fair Trade" crops.

TEAR FUND

Gaynor Anderson-Easey is proposing to organise an event in the Spring of 2004 in support of this Organisation.

<u>GHANA</u>

Monica Leal continues to keep in touch with Rev. Samuel Nkrumah, who has been moved to a less isolated parish; and another church is commencing their re-Building programme,

BIBLE SOCIETY

Margaret Butcher informed us that the Society celebrates its Bi-centenary in 2004, among other events, there is to be a national service in St. Paul's Cathedral.

The Group acknowledged the past Colin Nodes request, that donations be made to this Society.

MISSION AVIATION FELLOWSHIP

Geoffrey Dean had information that new airstrips were being created to enable access from Uganda to vulnerable Christian groups in Southern Sudan, enabling other agencies to support need there.

LIVING HOPE MINISTRIES

We heard from Geoffrey that this Lancing based Ministry has organised a mission tour in Uganda; and a series of seminars to Church Pastors in Nigeria; where the Christian tribes face opposition from the Muslim tribes.

FEBA

Continue to develop technological facilities to enable the gospel to be beamed in the vernacular languages in parts of the Middle East.

Contact with Wycliffe and Ruth Chatfield will be taken on by myself.

The allocation of the funds available to us for 2003 was approved.


Bible Society

Congo-Brazzaville

Dec 2003/Jan 2004

Dear friends,

Here I am belatedly renewing contact as we enter a new year. My lounge is still decorated with Christmas cards, and my email box is bursting at the seams with seasonal greetings tucked in between all the work emails. Thanks to all of you who've made contact, and may the Lord bless your New Year! (In this culture it's OK to send New Year greetings until the end of January!).

So what's been keeping me busy since I last wrote in August?

At the end of August, Andrea Waldschmidt,



my friend and colleague here in Congo since 1994, announced her engagement to Sylvain Ebengue! Sylvain is Congolese, and he and Andrea have been attending the same church for some years, although Andrea had not considered him as a potential husband until a few weeks before the announcement, so it was nearly as much of a surprise to her as to us! More about this below...

During **September** I continued to give time to the Teke project, in order to make final decisions about changes and corrections to the Teke reading and writing manual. This revised manual then was published at the beginning of December and is now being used in the Teke-speaking area as the basis for classes teaching the Teke alphabet to those already literate in French.

October saw me in Cameroon, taking a course on tone in African languages. Not only did we improve our skills at hearing and writing

down correctly the tones (or melodies) of words and phrases, we also learned more about what tonal patterns to look out for in the languages in this part of Africa, and how we might want to mark them in orthographies. Despite the fact that most of the Congolese languages we work with do not currently write tone marks, there ARE languages which need it written, and others need analysis...

In **November** we brought together again translators from five different languages to complete the work on two booklets of Scripture portions based on Luke's Gospel. This was the fourth workshop dealing with these texts, and we were very pleased that, with the help of Keith Beavon (translation consultant from SIL-Cameroon), we were able to finalise the booklets and send them for printing to the Scripture Gift Mission. We hope to have the booklets available for use in churches sometime next year.



As soon as we finished the Luke workshop in **December**, we changed gears in order to prepare for Andrea and Sylvain's wedding days on 12th and 13th December. Yes, I say "days" because there were three different ceremonies:

First the traditional bride-price ceremony on Friday (in this case, Andrea's church and SIL-Congo acted as stand-in parents for Andrea and received gifts from Sylvain's family, and Andrea had to feed a blind-folded Sylvain some traditional German food – see left), then the official wedding at the Town Hall on Saturday morning, and finally the church service and blessing on Saturday afternoon. We were all quite exhausted by the end, not least the bride and groom, but it was a joyful two days of celebration and thanks-giving to God for this brand-new couple

Sylvain was not able to get his passport in time for them to travel to Germany to spend Christmas with Andrea's family, but they hope to travel once the passport and visa are issued.

After all the excitement I was happy to have a quiet Christmas in Brazzaville. I will be seeing in the New Year in Pointe Noire, whilst

helping the SIL family there to move both their house and the office to a new location.

Once we get into **January**, I will be progressively handing-over my responsibilities as country leader to John Phillips, who returned to Congo in October with his wife Elisabeth and their daughters (Miriam and Chantal), after some years of absence. We are very happy to have this experienced family back with us in the team, especially as Andrea will need to reduce her work hours a bit, (but she will continue to work for SIL), and I will be leaving for some months in England later in the year!

I expect to be in England by **April Fool's Day**, and will be taking some time to rest after a busy two and a half years in Congo. I'll write in more detail about my schedule in England hopefully in March. I'm grateful to God for keeping me going during the times when the work-load has been heavy and the stress of decisions and responsibilities was not easy.

Regarding the prayer requests I gave back in August, the church which was asked to support one of its pastors as a full-time translator has sadly declined to do so, and the checking of the Munukutuba New Testament has not been completed by the end of this year as was scheduled, due to a couple of set-backs.

- Please pray that the final chapters of Hebrews in Munukutuba can be checked at the beginning of January!

Please pray also for wisdom in knowing how to react to some dissatisfaction which has arisen among SIL employees recently.
Please pray again for more workers. It's a relief to be handing over responsibilities to John, but he really needs more help than is currently available to keep up with all the administrative tasks.
Please pray that we will be open to the Lord's leading in 2004!

Dear Friends,

Two horse riders were making their way across the South Downs when they came across an injured seagull. It was obviously injured fluttering on the path in front of them unable to get airborne. The lead horse stopped dead when it saw the gull and refused point blank to go any further. The rider on the second horse took his animal past the bird and waited for his companion to catch up. But as hard as he tried, the rider of the first horse could not persuade his mount to pass the bird. This went on until the gull managed to get itself into the air and make good its escape. This was a totally irrational reaction from the horse, because what harm could an injured bird do to a 16 hand hunter!

Sometimes we too have irrational reactions to life's challenges.

It could be worth looking at Matthew ch 14 v 22 - 33. It is the account of Peter leaping out of the boat he was in and running across the lake to meet Jesus. Not exactly the wisest of moves. Especially as he didn't actually make it! Jesus had to rescue him. Peter started out 0K, in faith, but let his eyes wander away from Jesus. He let doubt creep in. His faith suffered and he started to go under.

This is the start of Lent 2004, a real chance to develop our faith and trust in Jesus. An opportunity that we must take, so that despite the problems that life throws at us, we are able to deal with them. We do this by keeping our eyes on Jesus and not as Peter did let our attention wander. If we do, we will follow Peter and go under. We need to keep our eyes firmly fixed on Jesus to ensure we don't.

There are all sorts of opportunities during Lent to develop our understanding of Jesus.

So why not use them to grow in faith, trust and maturity.

CHURCHES TOGETHER IN WORTHING A new Christian Care Home ?

God wishes us to respect, care and speak up for the elderly. Much of this caring is necessarily done in care homes.

In November, I reported briefly on a presentation by John and Celia Royston (Managers at Koinonia Nursing Home) regarding the scarcity of Care Home places in Worthing, particularly those of a Christian nature. They wish now to find out the feelings of local churches towards supporting the idea of a new Christian care home in the locality.

Under God's blessing, *Churches Together in Worthing Homeless Projects* is successful, as churches support one another.

To progress this idea, John and Celia Royston have circulated a questionnaire. Goring URC has 64 people (49 members) over 80 years of age, 11 people are in care homes visited by 7 elders. Some of these people might have preferred to be cared for in a Christian care home.

In Worthing, there appears to be no Christian care home for elderly Christians, except of course Koinonia.

- How many of us, reading this would prefer to live in a Christian care home, when we come to needing care?
- How many of us, have a real burden to help in this need?

The Roystons will judge the need from church replies.

After our November Church Meeting, I telephoned Mrs Celia Royston. She said that she would write to each church, to identify those with a burden for this need. She proposes to bring those burdened together, to seek how to satisfy this need. Expertise advice would certainly come from Koinonia.

Even children who can't read are sure about the name on the book. It seems obvious that the Lord is preparing people for the coming of the New Testament in the local language next year, (it was type set in the UK earlier this year).


(Note that while visions of this sort are rare in the West, it is much more common for people to have visions that lead them to faith in areas where they do not have access to the scriptures and opportunities for sharing are limited).

The pastor says that scores of people have been coming to have the vision explained, including a man from a radio station run by the dominant religion in the area. He wanted him to preach about Jesus on this radio station. The pastor said he would on the condition that the church could have a one hour slot each week at a time of their choosing. This was allowed and they now get to preach for free on the radio every Sunday evening., just as the local population sit down for their supper (with the radio

Dear Friends

There are many images that come to mind when we think of Easter. Easter Bunnies, Easter Baskets, Easter Eggs, Easter Holidays, Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, etc. Easter Symbols: The last supper, the cross, nails, a crown of thorns, the garden tomb. the stone, the grave clothes, the resurrection. But through all these familiar things there is a challenge we face, and one we sometimes miss. Each time we experience the Easter season, it can lose its Impact and become almost stale. We've heard the messages, we've seen the images, watched the plays, some even seen the film! We've been shocked by the horror of all that Jesus endured - torture and crucifixion. But in our world of violence and cruelty and the medias graphic portrayal of such things, we can become numb to it and miss the reality of sacrificial love. As a result over time (so sociologists say), it just doesn't seem to be as "Amazing" or "Exciting." We can become dull.

We annually re-visit the **passion of Christ**, but how does that motivate our **passion for Christ**?

Jesus said: "I was hungry and you fed me, I was thirsty and you gave me a drink, I was homeless and you gave me a room, I was shivering and you gave me clothes, I was sick and you stopped to visit, I was in prison and you came to me... I'm telling you this solemn truth: Whenever you did one of these things to someone overlooked or ignored, that was me you did it to me." (Matthew 25:35-36,40 - The Message) Jesus was Drawing a Line in the Sand... For those who were NOT His Followers. "It's time to make a choice! Do you believe that I am the Son of God, the promised Messiah, the saviour or not? You cannot remain neutral!" For those who WERE His Followers. "It's time to get serious! You have to stop straddling the line! If you're going to be my follower, then start living like it!" One side of the line is death, darkness and despair the other side is life, light and liberty.

HOW DOES THIS APPLY TO US? Jesus is issuing the same challenge to us! He's drawn a line in the sand, we are urged not to become stale and rigid in our faith! But to pay attention to our attitudes, our actions, the way we treat others. Jesus would say "Don't fall into the dangerous traps of legalism, pride, or hypocrisy!" Now how are we going to respond? To be saddened and feel guilty by the passion of Christ, or to live with a passion for our risen Lord Jesus.

The 2nd Worthing Scout Group celebrated 80 years scouting with a Thanksgiving Service in our church on Sunday 7th March.



CHURCHES TOGETHER IN WORTHING COUNCIL & FORUM - 20 February

Environmental

Paul Willis, Environmental Co-ordinator, Worthing Borough Council, spoke on recycling services. A 3% increase in rubbish (by weight) every year, 82% of which goes to landfill sites. In 10 years we will run out of landfill space in Sussex. Only 35% of the town is taking part in the recycling scheme. 1400 Christmas trees collected.

Mission

Report on a Christian Aid & Church Missionary Society event Living Stones, exploring the faith, culture and stories of the Palestinian people.

11 February 2004 at St. Matthew's Church, Tarring Road, Worthing

When I arrived, shortly before the meeting was to begin. I was amazed to find St. Matthew's full of people who had come from many churches of the Worthing area. The church benches had been re-arranged, tables with tablecloths put up, and pittabread, olives, humous and other Mediterranean dips had been prepared to give us a taste of the Holy Land. And a very informative evening it turned out to be! There were three speakers, in the order of speaking: the wife of the vicar of St. Matthew's, who is Jordanian herself and who gave us an overview of the history of the Holy Land and examples of how the political situation had influenced the lives of real people. The other two speakers, representing Christian Aid and CMS, were a woman and a man who described the experiences they more recently made in Palestine, what everyday life for the Palestinians is like and in which ways Christian Aid and the Church Mission Society work in this country. Lots and lots of interesting information was passed on at times with the help of slides and also music! - and it was very impressive that all this was done in a totally apolitical way. The audience was presented with facts and they spoke for themselves.

First, a short history of Palestine -Israel was given. For hundreds of years, under the Ottoman rulers, people of the three faiths - Muslims, Christians and Jews - had co-existed in the land called "Palestine". When, towards the end of the 19th century Jewish immigrants began to come into their land, the Palestinians even welcomed them. The number of Jewish people wanting to live in Palestine increased steadily throughout the first half of the 20th century, and then dramatically after the end of the Second World War. In 1947 the Palestinians made up 70% of the population, owning 92% of Palestine, and the UN suggested to partition Palestine between the Palestinians and the Jews, whereby 47% of the land was allocated to the Palestinians. However, on the 14 May 1948, the day when the state of Israel came into existence. Ben Gurion. Israel's first Prime Minister, stated that all of Israel was the Holy Land. When US President Truman signed the recognition of the State of Israel, there was no mention of its borders. Still in 1948, in the War of Independence, Israel expanded beyond the UN- drawn partition lines, leaving the Palestinians with the West Bank and the Gaza

Strip, a land area which is 22% of what

was "historic Palestine". More wars were fought, more fighting took place....

After the 14 May 1948 about 750 000 Palestinians fled to the Lebanon and to Jordan, hoping that they would be able to return to their country soon. The UN gave them the right of return already in 1948, but their children and grandchildren still live in refugee camps.

Nowadays, 6.1 million Israelis live on 20, 770 sq km of land. The Palestinian Arabs live mainly in the West Bank - 2.2 million on 5,860 sq km - and in the Gaza Strip -1.3 million on 360 sq km, which makes Gaza one of the most densely populated areas of the world. Arab Israelis in theory are free to go anywhere. However, there are checkpoints on the roads manned by Israeli soldiers who can stop anyone from continuing his journey whenever they want to and without having to give a reason.

One of the speakers of the evening said that she went to the Holy Land as a tourist in 1998 and she experienced then how life was made hard for people, if they arrived at a checkpoint in a Palestinian car, and how frustrating she found it. No doubt, in 2004, the situation at checkpoints must be a lot more tense and difficult.

When checkpoints are closed, it means that many Palestinians from the West Bank and from Gaza cannot go to their working places in Israel.

Unemployment, in general, has increased a lot and with it financial hardship. According to the UN, unemployment in the Palestinian territories stands at more than 40% and almost two thirds of the population live below the \$2-a-day poverty line. Christian Aid is working in Gaza by training people, for example, as mechanics and seamstresses, and by helping people who need counselling and trauma treatment. CMS has been involved in the Holy Land for 150 years. CMS gives annual grants to two Palestinian hospitals and it supports various Christian organisations which work for a just peace between Jews and Palestinians and which give help to needy people. For example, one Christian organisation takes Palestinian children from Gaza who need specialist medical treatment to Tel Aviv hospital where they are treated by Jewish doctors. The third speaker gave a lot of information about the "defence wall" which Israel began constructing against Palestinian suicide bombers in 2002. The Israeli government has implemented a programme of demolishing Palestinian houses, schools and health centres to build this wall. Farmland has been cut in half or destroyed and very important access to water supply has been cut off for many Palestinian people. Every now and then there are small gates in the wall, but they are locked, and if they are not opened by the

Israeli soldiers, this can have serious consequences, for example, the harvest cannot be brought in. Some people now cannot reach their shop or their working place on the other side of the wall, and some children cannot get to their schools. In some places, the wall goes deeply into Palestinian territory and it goes through the middle of Palestinian towns, separating families and communities. The Palestinians have called this wall an "apartheid wall". The International Red Cross, which avoids making statements that could be interpreted in a political way, has stated that it considers this wall to be against international humanitarian law and says that it is a violation of the Geneva Convention. This wall costs 1 million dollars per mile to build and it will be more than 200 miles long. The World Council of Churches has said that "with security walls, total closures and checkpoints, Palestinian towns have become large prisons."

Christian Aid and CMS urge us to "Take Action". If many of us could write to our MP asking him to make our politicians exert pressure in the right places, this could help to bring about a just solution of the Israeli - Palestinian conflict.

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RUTH CHATFIELD'S ANNUAL REPORT 2003 FOR SUPPORTING CONSTITUENCY AND OTHER FRIENDS

The work that I have been doing this past year is: Country Leader, SIL-Congo

Location: Brazzaville, Congo

Highlights of the year include:

• We started off the year in crisis mode, with the death of the Teke project coordinator, and the sudden departure from the field of our country leader and his family, leaving us barely able to continue. A highlight of the year was seeing how God stepped in during February and March to enable us to continue with the work here in Congo! He provided 'out of the blue' and at short notice, 1) a Congolese administrator, 2) an experienced translation consultant to take over supervising the completion of the New Testament translation in the trade language, Munukutuba, and 3) an experienced SIL member from Central African Republic to help with training and language programmes.

• In November we held a translation workshop which enabled us to finalise the Luke portion booklets which will now be published by Scripture Gift Mission in five different Congolese languages this year. This project was started in 2001, so it was great to finally complete the work on the booklets and send them off for printing!

• In December we reprinted the Teke reading and writing manual, after a major revision. This was also a project which we had been trying to finish for a long time. We praise God that these manuals are now in use in reading and writing classes in the Teke speaking area.

Setbacks or disappointments I have encountered:

• It has been a hard year in terms of heavy workload, technical problems with computers and with frequent power cuts, some tensions and misunderstandings with personnel.

• I sometimes felt overwhelmed by my responsibilities and ill-prepared to spend so much time dealing with financial spreadsheets, writing financial reports and funding requests! But I made it through the year, with God's help.

Health: Good. No major problems apart from tiredness.

Support level: Adequate financial support. Thanks to you all!

Plans for the coming year: I am currently handing over my responsibilities to the new Country Leader, and I leave on furlough at the end of March 2004. I am looking forward to a time of rest and refreshment, and to seeing many of my friends and faithful supporters.

As I prepare to return to England for some months, it's good to look back over the past 10 years in Congo. Yes, that's how long it's been since I started working in Congo to further Bible translation and literacy in African languages.



You've been a <u>great support team</u> to me along the way! I've not had to worry about finances, thanks to those of you who've given so faithfully over the years. <u>What a privilege!</u> Your prayers on my behalf have also made a difference. <u>Special</u> <u>thanks</u> to my friends in Streatham who've been meeting every month to pray for me and

other missionaries!

I've certainly been changed by Africa. I've seen what a struggle life is for many: to find a source of income, pay their medical bills, stay honest in a corrupt society. I've learned to distinguish between essentials and all the nonessential things which so easily clutter our lives. I've seen also the spiritual battle. <u>Satan does all he can to block effective communication of the Gospel,</u> in whatever language - but he doesn't have the last word!

The verse-by-verse checking of the New Testament in Munukutuba did get finished in January! The glossary and book introductions are now being worked on. Progress in other languages is still slow, although we do have alphabets, initial literacy materials, and Scripture portions in several of them. I know that just being here and sharing in the lives of Congolese is as important as having a lot of "products" to show. I've been blessed by the warmth and stamina of my Congolese friends.

As I finish handing over work responsibilities to others in the SIL-Congo team, I am reminded of the words of Jesus: *"I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full." (John 10v10)*

May this be increasingly true for many more Congolese, for the missionaries who work here, and <u>for each one of you!</u>




The permission of the nominee must be obtained, and the nomination form must be signed by the nominee. the proposer and seconder. The forms are available in the vestibule.







SOUTHERN SYNOD

Meeting held at Sanderstead URC, CROYDON. 13th March 2004

- The Lomas House residents have settled into their new homes.
- The process of appointing Synod Moderators is being reviewed.
- Few replies were received to the Synod Structures document. "Catch the Vision" reports in writing 58% of churches responded overall a guarded welcome many churches have not grasped the size and challenge of the processes, which mean sacrifice and pruning next stage is the detailed outworking by Synod Staff who prepare a full report for the District Presidents. October Synod to consider a final version.
- The DEME scheme extended till 31/12/05 upon further research and consideration an informed decision can be reached.
- A presentation was given on the "Bullying of Ministers" (Rev. Lesley Charlton), to open up this issue.
- The retiring Honorary Treasurer introduced a resolution on "Resource Sharing" - great variation in Synod investment incomes. Synod resolution passed - more complete sharing of financial resources by 2013.
- Fair Trade Fortnight marks 10 years of Fair Trade Synod has many "fair trade churches".
- A story was told of South Norwood (Croydon District) of a significant project regarding community needs.
- The M & M contribution has been increased by 3 over actual pledges for 2004. Synod passed East Sussex's resolution - all churches to set aside 30 October 2004, as a 'Day of Repentance' and recommitment to follow Christ and Him alone'.
- Ministers asked to ensure concept of repentance fully understood in preparation for this. Youth & Children's Work training days arranged. Still a need for advocates/listeners for Racial Justice. Every church needs to have Racial Justice.
- Every church needs 'Racial Justice' on its agenda to promote and practice it
- World Churches of Christ Convention at Brighton July 28 August 1 NB this is a URC event!



"So I say to you, Ask, and it will be given you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you. For everyone who asks receives, and everyone who searches finds, and for everyone who knocks, the door will be opened." [Luke 11:9-10]

Many years ago, when I was a little lad, some pals and I would annoy friends and neighbours as we played 'knock down ginger'; a game that involved us knocking at their front doors and running away so no one was there when they opened the door. We had a most interesting talk from Mrs Alison Higton about Leonard Cheshire V.C who was a Group Captain in the R.A.F.

A bomber pilot during World War II having been on over 100 bombing missions his exploits were famous. He was appointed official British Observer at the dropping of the Atom-bomb on Nagasaki.

After the war, having been rather a rebel he found it difficult to settle down. He owned a house in Hampshire and in the late 1940s gave a home to a friend who was ill with T.B. Through this small beginning and funded with his own money the house became filled with T.B. patients. Leonard had found a gap in society for those who needed help and support and for whom it was not provided at the time. Over the years that followed his organisation grew as more and more houses were purchased and filled with disabled people of all ages and all manner of disabilities, but by then there were no T.B. sufferers.

The first home outside the U.K. was

opened in India in 1956. There are now 200 homes in 50 countries.

Leonard Cheshire married Sue Ryder in Bombay (now called Mumbai) in 1959. They had two children. He died in 1992. his wife survived him but she died in 2000.

Two people who lived their lives in the service to their fellow men and women. What a wonderful epitaph!



This is your life Mr Bill West

r William (Bill) E. West was born on 1st May 1904 at Wandsworth Common, the younger son of Mr & Mrs Arthur West. He went to his first school in Honeywell Road, Wandsworth then to secondary school called Sir Walter St. John (Sinjuns) in Battersea until he left in 1919. He was a Boy Scout and later became a Freemason. He said that he was too young to be called up for the First World War. Bill told me that on leaving school he was made an apprentice engineer to the **British Thompson Houston** Company making electrical instruments.

He married Clarice at St Barnabas Church, Clapham Common on 20 July 1929, and took a honeymoon in Teignmouth buying their first home in Worcester Park for £795. They later moved to Enfield, Middlesex where they brought up their children. They had a son Brian and twin daughters Margaret and Pat.

Brian died at the age of 54. Margaret moved to California with her husband and Pat moved to South Africa with her husband. Sadly Pat died in 2002 following a riding accident. Bill has 7 grandchildren and 9 great-grandchildren. Their occupations

ranging from a Commercial Artist, GP, Cheese selector for Woolworths, Consultant Heart Surgeon, Musician and many others.

Bill worked for the Columbia Gramophone Company making masters and secondary master records. It was here that he met, and worked for a Mr Mitchell, nephew of Reginald Mitchell who designed the Spitfire. Here he also met both Sir Henry Wood and Sir Malcolm Sergeant amongst many others. He enjoys good classical music one of his favourite pieces being George Gershwin's Rhapsody in Blue

As many young men did in those days, he made a crystal radio set, then because of the difficulties in hearing the broadcasts he added amplifiers -He was able to pick up both American and Australian signals.

During the second world war years he was appointed as works manager at Weston Electrical, responsible for making electrical instruments for aircraft. He was evacuated twice to Wakefield, but stayed with this company from 1936 until he retired in 1969. He built his own television set in 1945 with a 6" cathode ray tube.

Bill and his wife Clarice moved to Coniston Road, Worthing shortly after his retirement, coming to the Church here in Goring in 1969, helping for a time in the Girls' Brigade Company. He told me that his uncle, Ernest West was Treasurer at the Church. in 1949. He loved and worked in his garden until no longer able to do so.

He has many adventures including going down a deep gold mine and a also a deep diamond mine. He made his first parachute jump at the age of 89. He has flown through the Grand Canyon and has enjoyed travelling the world visiting his family in America and South Africa.

He said that his mother used to say to him, "have a good breakfast in the morning - porridge, egg bacon etc and that will set you up for the day!", and that, he said, "I have had until not many years ago."

His recipe for a long life? "Everybody asks me that", he says, - "a good breakfast, liquorice powder and malt, I cycled to work every day ~ 12 miles there, 12 miles back, rain, sunshine, all weathers. I have been keen on athletics, tennis, swimming, cricket, football, though only a goal keeper. I guess", he says "a certain amount of luck - we all have these nasty diseases inside us, in some of us it flairs up but in some of us it doesn't". Ambitions yet to be fulfilled would include a trip to Spain and to the countries of the Arctic Circle.

"I have a sweet tooth" he says, "and I like chocolates and ice cream. I am also fond of all vegetables especially if they are peas !!"

His family gathered from across the world to celebrate his 100th birthday at Bailiffs Court in Climping.

Who?

Mamy (pronounced similarly to '*mummy*' but not to be confused with my mother!) is from Madagascar, although he left there 20 years ago. He studied theology in France (Vaux-sur-Seine), and was living in the Paris area in the mideighties when I was also living there! But I didn't know him at the time.

Since 1989 he has been based in Sweden where he works as a pastor. He was married to a Swedish person, but sadly she left him and has married someone else. In the mid-nineties they spent a couple of years in Congo, teaching at the theological seminary in Brazzaville, where I met them once.

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Mamy visited Congo again last summer, since he was thinking about returning to serve the Lord there. We were both on staff at the student missionary convention held across the river in Kinshasa. He helped me with my luggage in the crush to get on board the ferry and I noted that he was a 'gentleman'! Since then, we've been in daily email contact and have appreciated this excellent way of building a long-distance relationship. I was able to visit him in southern Sweden this Easter, and he just spent a week in England. That's when we made the decision to get married this autumn in UK (date to follow). We plan to return to Congo together in 2005.

One of the wonderful things about Mamy is that he understands and is part of both of 'my worlds': Europe and Africa. We have both been involved in student Christian work (GBU/Intervarsity), and we both want to help equip the Congolese church to make a difference in Congo. We rejoice in God's goodness in bringing our lives together.

I'll make a second visit to Sweden in June, and Mamy will come to UK for two months at the end of July (staying at the Wycliffe centre while I am registrar there), to give us a bit more time together before the wedding.

The Lord Mayor welcomed us to the Mansion House and indicated that the City supported the work we are doing and then Jonathan Edwards addressed the gathering. Speaking as a new Vice-President, he said how excited and privileged he felt to be part of such an organisation in this special year.

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

My long time interest in objects powered by fire and water is probably, by now, well known.

What would I have done, as a small boy, to be riding one of those 12wheeled monsters that drew trains bound for Wales and the West Country in and out of Paddington Station in my train spotting days.

But even the sight of trains rushing through the English countryside would not have happened without the fertile enquiring mind of many many people, Brunel, Stephenson, and Watt to name but three.

Many people would have seen steam lift the lid of a kettle but it took the fertile enquiring mind of James Watt to convert this power into useable energy. He applied what he saw to everyday life. People all over the country had seen the power of steam but it took understanding and application to harness the energy and use it.

Jesus in Mathew Ch13 explained why he taught in parables. He explained that it was because people listened without understanding, They looked without seeing, and so he used the things of everyday life to help them see things in a fresh light. This he said helped them start to understand the things of faith that he was trying to teach, and help them start to live their lives in a new more fulfilling meaningful way.

We still need, from time to time, take a fresh look at our lives and ourselves, and to do that we often need to take a fresh look at scripture, and what the Bible stories are saying to us today. To do this we all need help. We all need the help of others to see scripture in a new light, if you like to see it with new eyes. Then we need to apply what we learn in new, imaginative, and creative ways.

It is published by a Christian outreach charity called The National Christian Trust, and they are distributed free to all who will make use of them. For the last meeting of the session we warmly welcomed Mrs Joyce Taylor chairman of A.D.A. Worthing Group to speak to us.

Dysphasia is something which unfortunately does not have a very high profile so Joyce explained that it is in fact the loss of speech and language due to a stroke or head injury. It is a particularly frustrating affliction not only for the victim but also for their carer.

Joyce knows first hand just what being a care to a dysphasic person means as she nursed her late husband for four years after he had suffered a number of strokes. He died in 1992. Later that year when the ADA Worthing group was set up under the auspices of the speech and language therapy department of Worthing Hospital she (Joyce) determined that the carers would be given as much help and support as the patients.

In the years since the group have met on these premises they have been very grateful of the rooms available enabling different sections of the group to have their own space, eg carers in the Harris Room are able to share concerns and worries common to them all. The self help group in the Cornwall Room and the rest of the members playing word/board games in the Main Hall, all meeting up for a quiz or other joint activity and a cup of tea at the end of the afternoon.

Some of the ladies of the Fellowship were able to relate with Joyce and her experiences as their husbands had suffered strokes and they know what little help had been forthcoming at that time.


As I have been part of ADA Worthing Group since its inception I could quite happily write more another time maybe! If however, you have any questions on any aspect of Dysphasia please ask me!





Churches Together in Worthing

The following points were noted from the CTW meeting held on 30th April.

<u>A presentation</u> was given before the formal business meeting by Gerald Thomson of Worthing Baptist Church. The subject was "The challenge of taking Bibles into schools". He has been involved in publishing and this has enabled Bibles to be distributed in Eastern Europe.

More recently he has produced books to encourage Bible study based on posters (one for each book in the Bible) - this book has the title "The Challenge" and can be obtained from him as also can a book of Bible stories for younger children.

1. St Paul's project

The work is in three places -

- a. Repair to roof (now complete).
- The Housing Project (flats) for adults with special needs (well in hand).
- c. Reordering the inside of the church to create a community centre (this cannot go ahead until a substantial portion of the funds needed of between £400,000 and £500,000 has been raised).

2. Sea Front Fair.

The service organised by Salvation Army will take place on the front at 10.30 am on 25th July.

"Great News on the Green" will take place in Steyne Gardens on 24th July from 11 o'clock. Stands will cover different aspects of ministry rather than be for individual churches, and help is sought from churches and others.

3. Young People's strategy Group.

Hand bills for a children's event held on 16th May had been distributed. The event was called "Kidz Utd".

4. Christian Aid Week

Was held on 9th - 15th May with the annual service on 7th May at St. Columba's.

5. Worthing Churches Homeless Project

There had been various fund raising events, and an American Tennis Tournament was planned for 12th June followed by a BBQ and flag day for 21st August.

World Church & Mission

Extracts from a letter received from a small village in Bangladesh

"

N.G.O. Pratibashi [Neighbour] is the registered department of the Bangladesh Government Social welfare and Juthika [wife] is the secretary and chief executive and helps the church very much. Through the N.G.O. we ran 17 free schools, each having 25-30 students, also 2 primary schools each has more than 100 children.

Climate is slowly changing in Bangladesh. Winter and Summer are becoming more and more severe every year. Our N.G.O. with the help of the churches distributed 200 blankets on the 20th. January to Hindu Muslim and Christian poor families.

Government officers were present and helped with distribution.

N.G.O. also help, families with the credit program.

I do not receive a salary from the church, so in my spare time I work in my small plot of land and grow different kinds of vegetables, I also planted some mango and coconut plants.

Some of the trees - mango - coconuts have already given some fruit and vegetables which gives me some income to support my children [3] with their education and other family expenses.

Credit system helped me to buy 2 calves, grown now - both have calves, milk is plentiful, help for my family.

I have made a small pond and I use some of the cow dung to feed my fish. Twice a year I get a small income from sale of fish.

In November I sold one cow and calf to pay school and examination fees for children, and to clear debts. I am grateful to God for His many blessings.

With government help in November I made a biogas plant [cow dung is used for that] We now cook by biogas and light our house and church. Biogas has saved us from firewood expenses. Many of the villagers are also making biogas plants.

Our evangelical work is much blessed, progressing slowly, more new believers among whom we work and prepare for baptism.

Please pray for us.





I am not very good at reading novels, that is to say I'm not very good at choosing them to read on holiday. I usually pick up some kind of text or reference book (last year it was Ovid). This summer I had a book token given to me and I was determined to use it to purchase a novel to take on holiday. Some thing to distract me, a diversion into a make believe world. Well. I like history, particularly English medieval history also detective stories and I spotted a book that would suit the bill. The awful secret by Bernard Knight.

In the last two pages the secret was revealed (do not read on if you want to read the book). A renegade knight of the Knights Templar was desperate to tell the world about some documents that were being withheld by the church in Rome. They would change the world as we know it, but oh dear, he was killed by an assassin before he could tell of his secret.

Fortunately the author fills us in. In short these documents declared that Jesus did not die on the cross but married Mary Magdalene, settled down and had a family. If true that news would most definitely destroy the Christian faith. Well what do you know there is another book out this summer; it's a best seller for holiday readers; it is Dan Brown's *The DaVinci Code*. It basically tells the same story but in more than two pages, it seems he has not been silenced or prevented from telling his story. Two things stood out from life 1000 years ago as in the book I read.

Firstly religion was little to do with the faith. It was a period known for the spread of Christendom not Christianity. It was a way of controlling the 'ordinary people' giving a kind of fragile stability to a volatile power hungry Europe. People were frightened by the penalties of challenging the iron grip authority and dictatorship of the church and state.

Second conspiracy theories and secrets. There was bound to be a lurking 'secret' that would potentially blow apart the fear sustained status quo of the church. But was that 'secret' something like; Jesus did not die on the cross or was it the equally controversial, Jesus died to set all men and women free?

How have things changed today? Well the church has lost its authority but there are still secrets or so it seems. Dan Brown's book tries to slam the Christian faith with a revived 1500-year-old legend used to discredit its beliefs [interestingly the main anti-resurrection legend as described at the end of Matthew was that the *dead body* of Jesus was taken by the disciples and hidden]. There is another difference from 1000 years ago; it is that Mr. Brown is free to tell of his secret.

You have to ask yourself this; where do you find your source of truth? Is it in a good novel or a well-contrived expose or the Bible? These kinds of books are at best interesting but (Continued on page 4)

A letter from Bangladesh addressed to Mrs Lily Collison :

Dhaka 4 August 2004

"

Love and greetings in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

You might have heard in Radio and T.V news and seen in the T.V channels many devastating scenes caused by the recent deluge in Bangladesh.

I went to Nittynandanpur on 19 July and then to visit other churches until returning to Dhaka on 29 July.

Nittyanandapur, Juginda, Bllovepur, Ratanpur, Karpasdanga, in Chuadanga and Meherpur districts are not yet flooded. But rivers are full up to the edge. People are fearing that any moment within a time all the paddy fields may be flooded, when, water will start coming from the 17 Northern flooded district areas.

Barisal and Southern Districts are under deep water. Our church members could not even take shelter on roads. In these areas people in rainy season live on land like Islands. Those islands are now under water. In many places roads are also under

water. People have made their shelter high with bamboos and planks. Boat is the only means of Communication. Saving children and animals is the main problem. Many people made floating places with collecting and putting water-hyacinth one after another and making a huge heap, then put planks on it, then human and cattle live on it. People mainly live on dry food as they cannot cook. So far people had some rice and some cash money. But price of every commodity is going very high. Day by day people will face more starvation, and hardship. When the water goes down farmers will not have seeds. They will have to borrow money, and the loan will not be able to be repaid without selling Land or some other things. Many houses will collapse when flood water declines. We fear that some of our

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church cum schools may collapse, in the extremely low lying areas there is 6 to 12 cubit high water above the land.

As Barisal district is very close to the sea, our church people face floods, cyclone, typhoon, and high water almost every year. They lost their houses and all belongings in the deluges that took place in 1988, 1998, and in July 2004. In those areas people are mostly poor farmers and fishermen. There is no high place or high building where they can go to take shelter.

I would like to request that you think about the life and resources of those areas where poor uneducated simple people live and who fight with nature most of the time throughout their lives. Please help those needy people with seeds, little bit of capital for their business, and house repairing help. I would also like to request you to help us to make one or two flood shelters. within 2 to five years. We will be able to use those buildings for school, church service and social programs. And at the time of flood, cyclone typhoon or any other natural disaster all people of that locality without cast or creed will be able to take shelter there. Until and unless Bangladesh government takes permanent steps with the helps of world bodies to save life and property and to build up their economy, these area people by themselves won't be able to do much for their life security and better solvent economy. As children of God we feel and should feel the urge to stand by the side of those people who are in need. As a fellow brother in

Christ I share my thought and agony to you. Let us all be channel and instrument in His hand to establish God's peace in the world.

About one third of Bangladesh is submerged and over 30 million people are effected. The official death count is over 700 and is rising. Road and Rail communications have broken down. Water borne diseases are spreading all over the flood affected areas. And thousand are in need of drinking water, dry food and medicine.

Through our church (U.C.B) administered and Bangladesh Government Registered N.G.O. PRATIBASHI (Neighbour) we have already donated some dry food and a little bit of essential commodities like sari, Lungi, Oral Saline, Water purifying tablets etc. among our church members, co-operative members and some outside people in extreem need in Barisal and Gopalgonj districts!

Much more is needed. Please stand by the flood affected people of Bangladesh. If you like to send any contribution you can in the first instance speak to Lily Collison who has Bank details All we are well by His grace.

Please convey our love and greetings to all of your Church members, and keep us in your prayers. Be sure that we will keep you in our prayers.

Dear Friends

I am writing this letter a week after the ending of the Beslan siege when Jakarta has been the victim of another terrorist attack and expects more bombs in the near future. It is also the third anniversary of the destruction of the World Trade Centre. Many of us may wonder, where is God in all this?

It was the question of where God was at the time of Auschwitz that has made modern theologians think that former pictures of God as a Ruler, omnipotent and commanding are not right. We read in the Bible that God is a God of love, if he is omnipotent then how could he allow six million Jews to be put to death in gas chambers? How could a God of love just watch as the Beslan siege occurred and ended in such a horrific way?

I believe that God is ultimately omnipotent, that he could bring the world to an end at any time if he wanted to do so. However, because he has given humanity free-will he does not enter events in the world unless he is asked to do so - by human beings. Even then he does not 'wave a magic wand' and make everything right. God expects us to ask him into our lives so that he can work through us, imperfect and sinful though we undoubtedly are.

Suffering can push people in one of two completely opposite directions. Either they stop believing in a God who could let such things happen and start to become bitter and twisted, or they begin to understand that in fact God is there in the suffering with them, right alongside the tortured, dying man, or the frightened, ill-treated child.

As the Archbishop of Canterbury said the day after the ending of the Beslan

siege, "Where was God? God is where God always is, that is, with those who are trying to comfort and bring light in any such situation." Paul Vallely, a journalist writing for the 'Church Times' puts it this way, "Where was God in Beslan? In the teacher who remonstrated with the attackers as they arrived, insisting that they release the youngest children, and who was shot for her protest. In the 17 year old boy who escaped in the early confusion, but who ran back into the school to comfort his ten year-old-sister." "God was even in one of the hostage-takers who, after the first explosion, moved children over to a window where they could breathe."

God has given us all free-will: in all our actions, even the smallest, we are able to choose between good and evil, between selfishness and caring for other people. God was in Beslan in the lives of those individuals who chose not to look after themselves but to care for the people and children around them. God was in the actions of ordinary people who did extraordinary things, risking death, which was the result in most cases, to bring what relief they could to their fellow hostages.

God is a God of love, he is also a God of justice. As followers of Jesus Christ we stand at the foot of his Cross and realize that God suffers with us, with all of humanity. We do not understand much about suffering but we do know that out of great suffering God is able to bring great good. The shining love which we see in the brightness of our Risen Lord Jesus assures us of that fact.



Teke Writers' Workshop held in Ngo, 2th-6th August

25 Teke people from 7 different towns and villages came together to develop skills as writers in the Teke language. The workshop was run by Andrea Ebengue (SIL-Congo literacy coordinator), Roch Beapami (Mboshi literacy coordinator) and Basile Okana (Teke literacy supervisor).

Teaching was given on the complexities of the Teke alphabet, and on how to write texts such as traditional stories, proverbs, historical and educational texts. The participants learnt to correct and improve each others' texts. They plan to start village writers' clubs, and to publish

some of their materials. At the end of the workshop, three of the participants wrote as follows:

"I would like to thank all those who worked hard to provide this training for Teke writers. We Tekes, like many African peoples, are losing a lot of our cultural heritage because of contact with the outside world. This workshop gave us the necessary tools, as pioneers in writing our language, to explore and promote our rich culture by making it available to others in written form."

The workshop was an extraordinary experience for me... I was very happy with the way you taught us so clearly and allowed us to ask questions. I was able to discover much about how to write stories, poetry, etc." Here's what you've been waiting for: the lesson on how to pronounce my surname-to-be!

RAHARIMANANTSOA

The final syllable is unpredictable, but the rest is quite straight-forward:

Ra-ha-ri-ma-na-

All the 'a's are pronounced like 'a' in "Chat".

<u>ntsoa</u>

Just one syllable, because the final 'a' is silent, and 'o' is pronounced like 'u' in 'Ruth'. So it sounds like "**ntsu**".

OK? I shall expect **perfect** pronunciation when I next meet you...

Training Teke writers to produce simple Teke literature is an important way to help the community become literate and to prepare them for Teke Scriptures. The Teke project has known many difficulties and setbacks in the past, so we are grateful to God for each little step forward.

Other news from Congo: The Munukutuba New Testament has now gone to the States for type-setting in preparation for publishing, and Andrea and Sylvain are expecting a baby next February!

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



Ειναι ελληνικα ψια μενα !

It's all Greek to me !

It took me a while to work out the humour in the limerick about the curate's cat in last month's Chronicle, I had learned Standard Modern Greek, in which the letter μ is called, mi (mee) so that it sounded more like a mouse than a

Cat ! I asked William to recite the Greek Alphabet as <u>he</u> knew it and when he reached 'm' he said 'mu' (mew), so then it all made sense and I laughed.

Some years ago, we were in Crete for Helena's wedding and I took William around to meet people in the local villages. We called at a kafenion which was run by a local priest and family. He didn't speak English, so I made the introductions in my basic Greek and we all took a Greek coffee (what we would call

Turkish, but not the Greeks) and William decided to try out the Greek he had learned at Theological College. Pappa Paraskava looked puzzled and eventually said to me "I'll have to get my son to translate, I don't speak English." So

I had to tell him that William was talking in Classical/New Testament Greek as taught many years before in college with seriously doubtful pronunciations !

Modern Greek in two forms, as well as two different sets of grammatical

rules had existed for many years one covering the language in which all official documents were written katharevousa; the other, demotic Greek, the less formal, less stilted language of literature and spoken Greek.

In 1976, demotic Greek became officially recognised and became the 'over all' language of both officialdom and literature. Then, in 1982, the 'twiddly bits' over the letters - the

system of accentuation - two breathings and three accents- were simplified to monotonic. A single accent is used over a vowel e.g. á and sometimes a dieresis

over a second vowel when two vowels together need to be pronounced separately — e.g. faî faee (food).

However, some thing's are slow to change and many terms, words and word endings, spellings and pronunciation still survive from katharevousa and remain

in common use, particularly in country districts.

When I first went to Crete, I used to stay in the (very basic) house of

an elderly man who had left school at 10 or 11 years old to look after the sheep and tend the vines. He could read only a little and write only to sign his name. He spoke in a broad local dialect. My Greek was at a very early stage learned from language books and tapes and some lessons from a lady from Athens.

My understanding of what he was saying was severely limited.

My Greek dictionary was in constant use and even then, I couldn't always find the word ! I said to someone, "I find it difficult to understand. Pantelis". He smiled, and. said, "Oh, you're doing very well, don't worry. ".We often don't know what he's saying and we live here !"

It makes you think, doesn't it? Thoughts, words, phrases, habits and customs which we ourselves find familiar and easy, may be strange, difficult and in-

comprehensible to others. Can we afford to be comfortable and complacent and

set in our ways, living in the past, thinking the same thoughts and saying the same things over and over? Yes, of course we need to keep our values and beliefs, but must make them available and understandable to those without our years of usage and experience. Religion or Christian belief does not have to be expressed in archaic (oldfashioned) language, neither does it have to be too facile (easy).

We need words and examples that will stretch the mind and thought to enlighten

and inspire, opening up the way to a well-founded Christian life. Remember

those times when words, thoughts or experiences suddenly made sense......

Suddenly you knew the meaning, suddenly you fully understood? "Eureka." "Eureka!" as Archimedes (Arkim-ee dees), Greek mathematician and inventor (c.287-212 B.C) cried exultantly when he discovered the principle of buoyancy and displacement while having a bath. In his excitement at his discovery (please don't do this in Goring) he ran naked through the streets shouting, ""Eureka !"('I have found it !").

Did you know that our Pilots have been studying Greece as a project, inspired by the Olympic Games?

There were some young people in Goring,

Who found life to be a bit boring.

But Pilots at Church

Soon ended their search

For something not boring in Goring.



The 2005 budget was approved by November's Church Meeting as above. Perhaps the most significant item is the reduction in the Offertory target from £50,513 to £48,275. However this does not signal a relaxation in financial vigilance for the Church quite the opposite in fact. Present indications are that Offertory this year will total only £42,275, some £6,000 less than next year's target. While unbudgeted receipts, from the Team and District, are making good the shortfall this year this will not continue to happen in the future.

The financial impact of the proposed joint pastorate will have to be worked through and we are nearing the end of our grant award from District for the quinquennial survey expenditure, but it is clear that we will be left with a large gap in our budget as these factors unwind. So we need to start now to bridge the gap. Can I therefore urge you to review your giving for 2005 - I intend to remind you to do so every year from now on. If we start now we will bridge the gap gradually and effectively, but if we postpone (Continued on page 7) The Local Church

increasing our giving it may prove much more difficult a year or two down the line.

It is as much our responsibility to provide for the financial well-being of the Church as the spiritual well being. So please come before the Lord in prayer and let Him steer your decision on how much to give in 2005. He does so much more for us than we can ever fully appreciate, let us respond appropriately.



Assembly Remits



Southern Province Synod St John's Orpington 9 October

Report given to November Church Meeting by Michael Donnelly

Synod Day of Prayer, 6 February 2005 (Sunday). Based on locally decided amount of repentance and Catch the Vision Prayer. -Moderator's letter commends this matter to churches

<u>Catch the Vision/Equipping the Saints.</u> John Ellis introduced the item, updating Synod on Catch the Vision and giving progress on Equipping the Saints. Three questions -Serving Elders, Deploying Ministers and Funding Mission stimulated the discussion.

<u>Children and Spirituality.</u> Mrs. Kathryn Copsey from Children in Urban Situations gave an insight into her work on children's spirituality. "Openness", "immediacy" and "freedom of spirit" characterised a child's spirituality. Largely disappeared - trust gone, quality of choices lost. Hard to repair. Damaged by TV, Home. Relationship is the key to working with children [Genesis 1:26].

<u>The Children's Charter.</u> Synod agreed the resolution wholeheartedly. Requirement now that it be taken forward in local churches. Rev. Stephen Thornton (author) spoke about the relaunched material. Children were equal partners in the Church and required the full diet of Christian Worship. <u>The Turn the Tide scheme</u> had encouraged churches to think about their youth and children's work. (Howard Nurden)

<u>Changes in Synod Structures.</u> Provincial Council to be transformed into the Mission and Strategy Group. A timetable proposed and carried. Convener of the Mission and Strategy Group - suggestions required by the 1st January 05. Further developments to Synod in March 2005.

<u>Safeguarding in the Church.</u> The Revd. Roger Jones is Synod's Link Person. All churches need a written policy for safeguarding children and young people - the Good Practice Guide a template. Monitoring to be achieved in the Church Annual Returns etc. [Policy received]

<u>Fairtrade</u> Southern Synod confirmed its commitment to working for justice and peace. The resolution to become a Fairtrade synod was carried.

It's all Greek to me!

Andrew's sermon on Nov. 7th about Saints reminded- me of the Saints' days we have celebrated in Crete from time to time.

The Greeks don't so often bother about birthdays as such, but celebrate their NAME days. As most people are named after saints, they celebrate on the day devoted to that saint in the religious calendar.

They receive their names at their (usually infant) baptism.

Some names are more popular than others, so that on some days, the whole of Greece will be partying - e.g. St. George's Day (23.4) or Maria (Mary) [15.8 and 21.11]. Helen, my daughter's name day (21.5) is the day sacred to Eleni and Konstantinos (Kostas).

On their name days you wish your friends, Χρόνια ηολλά [Kronya pole-a] which means "Many years". If your friends are elderly, you might wish to strengthen Χρόνια ηολλά by saying, να τα Κατοφτηφετε [may you live to be a hundred].

The churches dedicated to the saint have a feast day. There are special services and prayers from quite early in the morning, but you turn up when you can as it goes on for a long time. You try to get into the little church to light a candle and kiss the icon. Sometimes the icon is placed outside to make it easier. Now, please note that I am only talking about the little mountain village churches that we know in Crete and the now familiar inhabitants of those villages! Having lit their candles and kissed the icons, many of the men leave the church, which is too small to take the unusually large congregation, and stand outside for a 'fag' and a chat, leaving the more devout to the devotions !

The devotions are followed by the distribution of Holy bread. It is the custom to take some home for family members who could not be at the service. A variety of food and drink is laid out on trestle tables for all to eat. They all then go home and have their own celebrations for the rest of the day and most of the night !

At Exopoli the village near to Helen's home, 15th August—the Assumption of Mother of God' [Mary's day], is usually a festival with music and feasting for two days and nights.

Of course, the 25th December is the name-day of Χριφτός. Though Easter is the main time for family get-togethers, Christmas is celebrated increasingly as Greece becomes more westernised. So greet each other with Καλά Χριφτοῦγεννα [Kala Cristooyenna] -

"Happy Christ's Birth."

Happy Christmas, every body !

Answers to last month's quiz on Archimedes :

1. Archimedes lived in Syracuse, a seaport on the East coast of Sicily, Italy. It was founded by Greek colonists from Corinth in the 8th century B.C. and became a well-known centre of Greek culture. The city sided with Carthage against Rome in the second Punic war and fell to the Romans in 212BC.

2. Archimedes was directing the city's defence and was killed by the Romans while drawing geometrical plans in the sand.

3. Archimedes discovered and analysed the principles of the lever, and invented the 'Archimedean Screw' for raising water, consisting of either a spiral tube around an inclined axis or an inclined tube containing a tight fitting broad threaded screw. As this was turned on a pivot, the water was raised from bottom to top. 4. Archimedes became famous for his principle that a body when placed in a fluid loses as much weight as is equal to the weight of the displaced fluid.

King Hieron II of Syracuse had a new crown and suspected that it was not pure gold, but partly silver. He asked Archimedes to show that the jeweller was being dishonest without damaging the crown, Archimedes realised that if the crown was partly silver, it would take up more space than a pure gold crown of the same weight, because silver is not as dense as gold. By comparing the crown's volume (measured by the amount of water it displaced) with the volume of equal weights of gold and then silver, he was able to tell the king that his crown was not pure gold.

Don't quite understand? Don't know the meaning of some of the words? A good dictionary is a fascinating book to read!

Gelebrating 200 years of the Bible Society's work

A number of friends from various churches in the Worthing area joined together at Holy Trinity Church on the 13th of October, to enjoy an afternoon of fellowship and Thanksgiving.

We began with a short AGM- Mr Clifford Barnard, now retiring, has kept our finances in good order over the past seven years, and two years ago, he also took over as Secretary. In the last financial year £22,710 was sent from West Sussex for the work of Bible Society. Clifford stressed that the needs were continually expanding and, therefore, we must not become complacent. He urged us to keep up the good work! Canon Muriel Pargeter thanked Clifford for all the work he had done for the Society, and for his support and friendship. Muriel is also retiring after nine years in the Chair of Worthing Action Group. Mrs Mary Stewart will now take on the task. On our behalf she expressed grateful thanks for all Muriel's hard work and enthusiasm. Mary welcomed everyone and thanked us for the help and support she had received.

Clifford then led us in prayer, Mary conducted a short service wherein the needs of the Bible Society were remembered. Thankfulness was expressed for so many blessings and prayers full of hope were offered for the future. Olive McCarten, our area representative, then showed slides, taking us through a short history of the 200 years of the Society.

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
