Dear Friends

At the start of a New Year we all reflect on where we stand in our lives. Perhaps it is good to do that for the church too. You may or may not know that we count people at worship each November for returns and to see how we are doing. In November 1997 the numbers at our morning worship increased for the second year running and our evening numbers increased as well, returning to the same figure as 1995. This is a cause for encouragement as we begin a new year and something to build on.

The same can be said about the 'Emmaus' groups which began in the autumn, which are allowing more of our people to join in fellowship/study groups than has been the case for some time. We also had much encouragement in response to the survey we began last September and which we will be able to continue in the spring. These three areas of a church's life are, in many ways, a good barometer of what is happening - worship, growing together and reaching out with the Gospel. As these begin to take shape we can begin to see the Spirit move among God's people.

If these are plus points, we have to be honest enough to face up to negative aspects too. The greatest cause for concern is our inability to attract children, where our Sunday numbers continue to fall and we have seen the closing of our BB Company. We have a very committed group of people who work with our children and young people, but they do need our support. We have been asking for more help in Junior Church for almost a whole year now. Our young teenage group and junior age group operate with only one regular adult who must find someone to help each week. Our FURY group continues to be leaderless on a Sunday evening. We cannot expect young people to be sent by the Lord if we do not make the commitment to this work ourselves – on the other hand look at how the Lord has honoured our commitment as a church to Little Fishes.

Financially we continue to find the going tough. Our weekly giving at best covers our national contributions to the URC which means we need to look at other ways of financing our other work. The result of this is that we get locked into maintenance, working very hard to keep going and ensure our buildings don't become too shabby and the worse for wear. So we are grateful to those who work hard to manage our buildings and our finances, but when our greatest dream is to paint the church, what are we saying about our vision and our willingness to meet the Lord's vision for this area and the way in which our buildings can serve Him.

We are also facing challenging times on a broader church base. We, as a fellowship, have clearly stated our views over the training and ordination of practising homosexuals. However, we need to recognise that there are a number of people within our fellowship who do not agree with that view — a relatively small number, but nevertheless we need to be careful that we are listening to them rather than simply disregarding what they have to say. There are also a number of people who query how far we should take our protest and how far we must accept, however reluctantly, the decision of the Assembly. We also need to recognise that we are in a minority at this moment in time, within the denomination if the official interpretation of figures is to be accepted, and it can be dangerous to be in a minority!

We are being challenged about ministry with the setting up of the Worthing Team Ministry. I believe we have established a structure which will allow us to cope with this transition, and that through our Pastoral Elders and Administrative Committees we have begun to use the talents of so many people. Indeed we already have effective team ministry operating within our midst and this has already proved beneficial to the fellowship as people use the gifts that they have been given by the Lord. Yet I can understand the fears that many are expressing about the future and the pattern of ordained ministry which is being presented. Again this becomes about vision – what does the Lord want to see happen? Surely more than some administrative unit which allows us to believe we are fulfilling His plans, but rather an opportunity to enjoy a new revelation of His ways of bringing His Kingdom to

bear on our life together.

So on a good day we can say all is going well; on a bad day we can despair, but most of the time it is the joy of living by faith, that no matter what may be said or even done, the Lord is in the midst of it all and we have the real privilege of being called to be His servants.

May we wish you all a New Year filled with the Lord's promise.





Dear Friends

We are moving quickly into 1998 and indeed to the new millenium with all the discussions that are going on about the importance of that event. Personally we are saddened that as we now draw to the end of a 'decade of evangelism', so few seem to think that this event has little to do with Jesus Christ. What has gone wrong? There is a great danger that we sit within our churches imagining that we need do no more than turn up on Sundays, dutifully sing, pray and listen to God's Word for the week and then go our separate ways, having coped with the 'religious slot' for another week. Sunday service in church or on television is just another part of life, like 'Neighbours', 'East Enders' or 'Coronation Street'. Yet Jesus calls us to be His witnesses in the world! Teresa of Avila once wrote a prayer

"God of love, help us to remember that Christ has no body on earth but ours, no hands but ours, no feet but ours.
Ours are the eyes to see the needs of the world.
Ours are the hands with which to bless everyone now.
Ours are the feet with which He is to go about doing good."

Yet lest we are put off by this enormous responsibility Jesus made a promise to go with this last command to His disciples:

"Go, then, to all peoples everywhere and make them my disciples And I will be with you always, to the end of the age." (Mattew 28)

To the disciples this task was important; it was not just part of their life, it was their life. The task Jesus had entrusted to them was not to be fitted into life, it was to be the reason for life itself. The same should be true for us for unless Jesus is central to all we are, what message do we share with others? Those who say Jesus is irrelevant or should be sidelined, or even consigned to a part of life, need to hear what the Gospel really means to those who believe, and they will not just hear with their ears, but also by your living and your actions.

We cannot criticise those who want to diminish the Christian input to the millenium if we put Jesus only into a compartment of our life. We cannot be critical of those who want to diminish the importance of Jesus in these celebrations if we treat our relationship to Jesus as belonging to some club or society. We need Jesus to be at the heart of all we do as individuals and as a church, so that others will see His importance to us – so that others will see Him with us – then they will seek Him and they too will see all He means and join us as His disciples.

We have been entrusted with the task of sharing the most powerful, the most potent message to the world, that God's love is offered to all who will accept it through faith in Jesus Christ, His Son, your Lord.

Please continue to pray for all who are involved in sharing His Good News as we seek God's guidance.





Dear Friends,

"You are the chosen race, the King's priests, the holy nation, God's own people, chosen to proclaim the wonderful acts of God, who called you out of darkness into His own marvellous light. At one time you were not God's people, but now you are His people; at one time you did not know God's mercy, but now you have received His mercy." These stirring words are from 1 Peter 2 vv 9-10, written to Christians many years ago, yet how true they have remained to Christians throughout the ages, and how real they are for us today, a reminder of what God calls us to be. St Paul tells us "the Spirit makes you God's children' (Romans & v 15) and reminds us that "we will possess the blessings He keeps for His people" (v 17). So these two great apostles want you to know how you are raised to a new status and how the forgiveness Jesus brings places each one of us in a new relationship with God.

This new relationship brings responsibility, a responsibility which is shared, for the church is not called to follow leaders blindly, but to be the King's priests, called together to proclaim the wonderful acts of God. Those who want to follow the way of Jesus need to recognise that none are to be raised up as leaders, but rather to see that we are all to serve one another as priests of the heavenly King. Everyone who has an experience of Jesus in their life has an account to give and share of God's wonderful deeds. No experience is more important or better than another; all should be given to glorify God who called us into His marvellous light. Too often we seem to want to measure what God has done in a person's life when really we should be thanking Him for His saving love and grace.

On 24th May 1738 John Wesley wrote in his journal:-

"I went very unwillingly that evening to a Society in Aldersgate Street. Someone was reading these words from Luther's Preface to his Commentary on the Epistle to the Romans: 'Faith is a divine work in us, which changes us and makes us newly born of God and kills the old Adam, makes us completely different men in heart, disposition, mind and every power, and brings the Holy Spirit with it. Our faith is a lively, creative, active, powerful thing, so that it is impossible that it should not continually do good works. It does not even ask if good works are to be done, but before anyone asks, it has done them, and is always acting.' Before I could raise my usual question (concerning this change that God works in the heart through faith in Christ) the Holy Spirit performed this miracle, and I felt my heart strangely warmed. I felt I did trust in Christ, Christ alone for salvation; and an assurance was given me that He had taken away my sins, even mine, and saved me from the law of sin and death."

John Wesley was aware that evening of the personal forgiveness of God, and that was the strength of the revival he and others were to lead. This forgiveness was for all who believed, all had their story to share of God's wonderful deeds. In our age the world needs to hear again the story of God's working, but it will only do so when we, the people of the church remember again 'you are the chosen race, you are the King's priest, you are part of the chosen race, you too have received God's mercy and move from darkness into His marvellous light.'

Please continue to pray for our family as we seek our part in God's planned revival.

I expect we all share, from time to time, a concern sometimes verging on despair, for the fate of the world and where it all seems to be heading. Dad and I spoke of it often, but he knew, better than anyone I know, that children are the future, and that what we teach them, by how we are, will shape everything.

He was in the habit of reading Readers' Digest in the toilet. In the last edition he was reading is an article entitled "Teach Your Child to Wonder". The guidelines could have been written by him - "listen to their questions", "give them time to think" then "fly a kite".

"Share your children's curiosity...they will learn that it pays to persist, to experiment, in the face of difficulties. And they will see clearly that...learning is something to be enjoyed every day, for a lifetime."

With a commitment & dedication that was so typical, he lived as he believed. The child in him was alive & strong - full of mischief and open-hearted simplicity. He insisted on being spontaneous & irreverent and refused to take himself, or anyone else for that matter, too seriously. He loved to undermine pomposity and beaurocracy. He loved to break the rules, but he stood for his principles with a certainty that in today's uncertain world inspires respect.

He stood for his Christian values with a quiet, modest and cheerful determination, and such certainty that I was moved to ask him when I was a child - "so how do you know there's a God then?" Always uncomfortable with anything personal, but acutely aware of the enormity of the question, he told me. I understood then that this was the cornerstone of his life, the key to all that he did.

His own remarkable self-discipline, intelligence and strength of character enabled him to learn to speak fluent Italian, to knit jumpers on his own machine, to practise portrait photography, to learn to use a computer - and marvel at it - in his 70's. Mind you, it had to be a second hand one - because, as Glenda says, he was green before green was invented. He passionately disapproved of waste, and did everything he could to preserve and protect the planet for future generations. I never heard him give an excuse for himself, and I never heard him put anyone down.

People's response to his death has been heartwarming. Dad would have been suprised, and pleased for Mum's sake. He only ever wanted the best for her, and Glenda, and myself, and took enormous pride in all our achievements.

For himself, he would have been really chuffed to know that he was to have been approached by fellow worshippers at Bury Drive Methodist Church about becoming a steward. The warmth and acceptance of his welcome there meant the world to him, and has been underlined by the many tributes to his very own, and distinctive, humanity. Many have referred to his love of children. Glenda and myself are in the unique and privileged position of knowing of this first hand. My own cherished and abiding memory is of the reassuring presence at the end of a torch, next to my bed within seconds of my calling out, to help me deal with a nightmare. Only Dad could chase away the bad guys.

A final note. At moments of being at my most intractible and infuriating, my mother is given to raising her eyes heavenwards, and declaring - "you are just like your father."

What can I say? Except, perhaps, thank God for that.

Report from the Special meeting called by Sussex West District Council January 15th 1998

The meeting was called in order that it should be possible for the Sussex West District Council to make known its response to correspondence received concerning the passing of Resolution 19 at General Assembly 1997.

The President Mr. Geoffrey Dearsley was in the Chair and 32 District Council members were present. Also present were friends who had come both to hear and to speak. Two formal motions had been received for the meeting and no amendments were permitted.

Motion A was proposed by Mr Maurice Young and Rev. Kenneth Lynch, Motion B by Revds Peter Heckels and Charles Martin. Each of these four spoke to their motion before the meeting was opened for discussion.

Following a period of time for discussion with statements supporting both motions each proposer made a response in summing up before the meeting fell quiet for prayer. A secret ballot was taken for a simple majority vote.

The result of the vote was given:- for Motion A 8, for Motion B 29. There were 3 abstentions.

After we had sung an hymn and shared the Grace we came away.

MOTION A proposed by Mr Maurice Young and Revd Kenneth Lynch

THAT District Council, bearing in mind the paramount need to respect and uphold the authority of the General Assembly and to do all in its power to maintain the unity of the church, HEREBY RESOLVES

- i) THAT it takes no precipitate action regarding Resolution 19 of the 1997 General Assembly and awaits with interest the outcome of the deliberations of the various groups set up by Mission Council;
- ii) THAT if, during this period of further reflection a particular case arises concerning a person in a homosexual relationship, District Council shall consider the case on its merits at the time and after it has been considered by the Pastoral Care Committee.

MOTION B proposed by Revds Peter Heckels and Charles Martin

- 1. West Sussex District Council reaffirms the traditional teaching of scripture and the church on human sexuality; namely chastity for all outside marriage and fidelity within it, and therefore will not concur in a call made to anyone in a homosexual relationship.
- 2. West Sussex District Council calls on Mission Council and Assembly to state clearly the URC position on sexual relationships conducted outside marriage and to move to rescind resolution 19 which allows sexual relations outside recognised marriage.


UKRAINE - A LIVE UPDATE

On January 20th Mrs Irene Tuley joined our meeting and spoke on The Lord's Prayer, how it ought to be seen as a pattern for the way we live, and how, when we accept Jesus into our lives, we become God's children here on earth. She stressed how important it is to pray daily for young people, the homeless, those who uphold the law, and those who offend. To know God, she said, can be a life-changing experience. Thank you Irene. Your talk gave us much to think about.

Mr Ian Donaldson, a retired Commandant of the Metropolitan Police, gave an interesting and, at times, amusing talk on Scotland Yard on February 3rd. 1298 saw the beginning of law and order with the Statute of Winchester. Justices of the Peace and Constables were in evidence by 1673 and were, over the years, followed by the Bow Street Runners, the Anti-Popery Gordon Riots, and Robert Peel, who became Home Secretary in 1821. He spoke of the changes in police uniforms, and how the 1914/18 war saw the beginning of women (unpaid) in the Metropolitan Police. By 1978 women were given full equality with men, and now held positions in the C.I.D. and as Chief Constables.

Dear Friends.

This month we shall celebrate Easter together and enjoy together the Good News of Jesus' victory over death as we come to rejoice in the joy of the Resurrection. Celebration is something which often happens and then fades into the mists of time as just a happy memory, but not so with Easter celebration, which goes with us day after day as the Risen Lord Jesus walks with us. Yet this annual celebration is a special time to come together as the followers of Jesus to remember His last meal with His disciples, to watch again the true cost of His love as we share in the events of Good Friday and Jesus' crucifixion, and to show our joy as we too discover the tomb is empty and Jesus has risen, Lord of all, standing in our midst. What are we to say? 'Hallelujah! what a Saviour!'

That service will be at Shelley Road at 3.00pm when we shall meet with our brothers and sisters from Shelley Road, St Columba's and St Andrew's, Rustington for the inauguration of the Worthing Team Ministry. At this service we will recognise the ministry of those already ordained as ministers of word and sacrament to serve the team, and we shall recognise and commission those elected by the churches to serve as lay representatives. This is, of course, a major step for the churches and will demand much prayer and careful thought as the team develops, so this is a service we all need to support to acknowledge God's calling to each and every one and to take these first steps with our Risen Lord on this path that He has called us on. Recognising that 3.00pm is an unusual time for most of us to be at church on a Sunday, let us not make this an excuse, but move forward positively, and what more positive start than to have standing room only available at this service – although there will be chairs for those in need!

Team ministry brings great benefits, the benefits of the different skills and talents which God pours onto His people, and what a joy it is when these are used and recognised as part of a team serving the Risen Lord. Nineteen years ago when we married we agreed with our Lord that this would be a partnership of service to Him and that we would use our combined gifts in His service. So it is that things are prayed about and worked through so that God can use us both in the work of ministry. This is as well, as we both have different gifts which can be brought together to complete what we believe is God's hope in any single event. Such an event will be the Flower Festival planned for June, an event which, like most things we plan is designed to include as much of the whole fellowship as possible, so that it truly is a united event. So Eileen has been busy with those who are willing to give their flower arranging skills, while Peter is working on a Sunday Service to celebrate the theme of 'weddings'. Meanwhile others are concentrating on other 'musical' parts of this weekend. Again, this is designed to be a celebration, and while we recognise that many of you no longer have your partners with you, we do hope that we can all come to offer all that has been shared to the God who continues to love us in whatever situation we find ourselves. So this we pray is an event for us all to work in and celebrate together, upholding and supporting one another and those who may come that they may find God's love working in His people.

Please continue to pray for us and our family as we exercise ministry together.

He has already approached some people to take part, and we are optimistic. We shall, of course, need people to help with the wardrobe, and back stage, so if you think you can help in any way do not be afraid to volunteer.

There is to be an Evangelism Training Day on April 25th from 10.00am to 4.00pm at Rochester - cost £5.

There is to be a 'Form a chain-age' at the G7 Summit in Birmingham from May 15/17 when Jubilee 2000 will be discussed. Rev Beryl Chatfield will be going, and has information.

On Palm Sunday, April 5th, there will be a Time for Tots Service at 9.15am and on Easter Sunday evening, April 12th, we shall repeat 'Breaking Bread'. IN THE PLACE WHERE HE WAS CRUCIFIED THERE WAS A GARDEN. (John 19 v 41)

Have you been on a pilgrimage to the Holy Land? I have. It can be the most wonderful experience of a life-time. For me, one golden experience stands out from all the others, and I would love to share it with you.

In Jerusalem they show you two possible sites of our Lord's tomb. The first is in the bazaar, where the Church of Holy Sepulchre is built, which has some 700 years of tradition behind it.

The second is so much more attractive, and true to the gospel description. There is a green hill outside the present city wall, a green hill shaped like a human skull and, at the foot of the hill, just across a narrow path, there is a beautiful garden in which there is an ancient empty tomb. I have knelt in that garden, with 40 other pilgrims, in silent prayer before the empty tomb. During that time the garden seemed to blossom and glow with the very presence of the Holy Spirit among us. One could almost hear that Voice lifted in triumph 'He is not here, He is risen', even as He said. One could imagine the return of the women, and that electric moment when Jesus met Mary in the garden. Then there was the breathless rush of Peter and John to tell the other disciples – 'He is risen! The tomb is empty!'

While our Lord was being crucified He made that dreadful tree to blossom. Here is one of the blossoms. 'Father, forgive them, they know not what they do'. Here is another, handed to a dying thief. 'Today thou shalt be with me in paradise'. Here's another, handed to a broken-hearted woman. 'Woman, behold thy son'. Blossoms that will never die. Praise be to God.

THE OPEN BOOK

The Open Book project set up by the Bible Society and Churches Together in England is a project born out of the Decade of Evangelism. It is a project which we will all hear about and wish to be involved in. It is a project committed to bringing Scripture back into its place in society. It is a project which aims to educate society in the values which it holds which are born out of Scripture and which form the basis of our every day lives; values which are not self evident to reason but which are rooted in God's story.

In February, Norman (our Bible Society Rep.) and Alma Prattent and Graham and Hilary Redman joined the Southern Provincial weekend conference in Eastbourne the theme of which was The Open Book. Of course we had a lot of fun and found tremendous fellowship, but we were also involved in many activities centred on the theme. We were able to listen to Rev David Spriggs the Coordinator of The Open Book and to Rev Colin Green from churches Together in England.

We were reminded that the Bible has been replaced in society by many other stories which people hope will answer the questions, "Who am I?", "Where do I come from?", "What is the purpose of my life?" These other stories include the Scientific story, the Economic story, the story told by Astrologers, the story of Individualism, of Destiny. These alternative stories are beginning to crumble and we move into a 'post modern' time when people who are unsatisfied are looking for yet another alternative.

We, who have the key to the answers in Scripture, also have a responsibility to make opportunities for society to share our treasure. Many many people have Bibles in their homes but they remain unopened and forgotten.

The Open Book takes five key stories to help people understand the answers to their questions.

1 The story of CREATION

the theme of IDENTITY

2 The Story of the EXODUS

the theme of FREEDOM

3 The story of the EXILE & RETURN

the theme of JUSTICE

4 The story of the NATIVITY

the theme of HOPE

5 The story of the CROSS & RESURRECTION the theme of FORGIVENESS

The Bible is a BIG story; a collection of stories not just for a few, but for EVERYONE. Not just for Christians - God so loved the <u>world</u>; God created the <u>Universe</u>; <u>Adam</u> was the father of the human race; we should pass it on.

HOW?

The Open Book has produced all sorts of resources for passing the message on, Goring URC has a Resource pack and will be using some of the ideas contained in it. We are already getting out into the Community in our neighbourhood, knocking on doors and inviting people to take time to learn more about the Christian faith. We would like to give away copies of St. Mark's Gospel. We have already planned a flower festival to draw people in to our building, and we are planning to put on a pantomime at Christmas with several performances so we can invite all our neighbours. There are many other ways in which we can begin to expose the Bible in our society. Please look out for more material connected with The Open Book, and make the project a subject for your prayers. More ideas will be circulated from other churches, and we are invited to share our ideas too.

Although this was a subject for the URC Southern Provincial weekend **The Open Book** project will be taken up by all denominations and the other Churches in Goring and Worthing, and throughout the country.

"No one will deny the need to give back to the people of this land the book on which our faith is based. It has become for many a closed book. It needs to be re-opened, and its riches, its teaching, and above all God's love for the whole of His creation, fed back into our culture by all the means of communication at our disposal, including art, music, drama and all the tools with which modern technology equips us." CTE Evangelism group.

Isn't it wonderful to see so many children in Church on a Sunday morning. We give thanks to God for each one of the children he gives us the priveledge to teach. We are greatly encouraged by the arrival of new children, some who have just moved into the area but mostly coming from the 'Little Fishes' playgroup. Each one of the children who come to Junior Church is 'special' to Jesus.

As I write this the Trailblazers and G.A.S. are approaching the end of their study of this year's Bible Exploration which is based on the life of Peter. We meet Simon the fisherman, boisterous and overenthusiastic one minute and fearful and hesitant the next. Under Jesus' influence we see him gradually become Peter, the firm 'rock'. The change is not an easy one, but the mistakes Peter makes along the way offer hope to us all as we journey in faith and fellowship. The youngsters will be sitting their exam on Friday 27 March and will share in an outing to the aquarena on Saturday 28 March...

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Norman Prattent, Irene Dearlsey and Chris Byerley who agreed to teach during the Bible Exploration, without your help we would have found it difficult. You have all given of your time and shown your love for our Lord to the children, may He bless each one of you.

We do still need some more helpers/teachers among our children. As the numbers of our children increases so does our need. If anyone is interested why not visit us on a Sunday morning? See what we get up to with the children, what fun we have, how responsive the children are. Have a word with Peter or myself and it can be arranged.



RUTH's CHAT

(from the FIELD)

No. 15

February 1998



Greetings from Cameroon, where I am still "in exile" since last year's civil war in Congo-Brazzaville forced us to leave there. The 5 month war ended in October, and gradually efforts are being made to collect in weapons, restart schools, restore basic services and get the country back on its feet...

I wrote in my October newsletter: "We do not know whether Louis and Roch ever reached Boundji safely, nor whether our house there has been looted." We now know that the answer to both questions is YES!

* We are grateful to God for sparing Roch and Louis' lives! Roch was beaten by soldiers in Brazza and only by God's grace escaped with his life, but both he and Louis were able to flee the war and travel to Boundii.

* We finally heard that our house has been looted, but we don't know whether they took the entire contents or just some of them! Other foreigners' houses and the poorly equipped hospital in Boundji were also pillaged. It's disappointing, but it also helps us not to be too attached to material possessions!

It is a miracle of God's grace that so far we have not heard of anyone we knew well who was killed during the war (10,000 are thought to have died), although many have been traumatised.

SO WHAT ARE OUR PLANS NOW???

Actually, this new year is still full of uncertainties. Although it has been possible for colleagues to visit Brazzaville, we are not yet sure when is the right time to move back and start re-furnishing and equipping our centre. Not all weapons have been handed in and we still hear of isolated incidents of looting.

Some of the SIL Congo group will shortly be moving to Congo's second city, Pointe Noire, to continue working from there. It is, however, too far from Boundji to be a useful option for us, and so at the moment we plan to continue with our work on the Mboshi language here in Cameroon

HOWEVER, Andrea and I have a tentative plan to visit Boundji for a couple of weeks around April/May. We would like to travel first to Gabon to collect and have work done on our Daihatsu truck (it needs new brakes!), and then drive it back across the border into Congo. We want to spend time with our Boundji friends, find out what needs replacing in our house, and assess how soon we might return to live there. There are various possible reasons why this trip might not happen and there are potential difficulties - but we know God can work it out in His timing...

Belated thanks for all your Christmas greetings! Pauline (another SIL Congo member) and I spent the holiday season visiting the far north of Cameroon! It was very hot, dry and dusty! No more humid rain forests, but instead a stark, rocky landscape. Most of the river beds were dry, but fortunately the water table is high enough for wells and irrigation systems to be widespread.

We visited some SIL teams who work in the far north, and also the Waza Game Reserve where we were able to observe a pair of lions at close range from the safety of our vehicle. (Happily we were not at such close range when our vehicle got a flat tyre...!)

Apart from the physical features of the landscape, another lasting impression from northern

- Cameroon was of the mosques and the Muslim calls to prayer. "Prayer stops" were a regular
- . feature of our bush taxi journeys! Just imagine coaches in England making stops to give Christians the opportunity to get out and kneel down by the roadside to pray!!

Here in Yaoundé, the Mboshi-French dictionary is slowly taking shape with the help of Michel and Jean de Dieu (both from Boundji, and both students of philosophy!). We are also slowly progressing with grammar analysis. Michel has still heard nothing from his family who were in Brazza when the war started 9 months ago. We are praying that during this difficult time he will come to know the Lord in a real way!

THANK YOU if you prayed for my American friend, Deb, who I told you about in my last newsletter! Having broken her neck in a swimming acident, she is continuing to make an excellent recovery, although she still has some pain and disability. She has been given a computer which she talks to and it writes down what she says!!! However, she has just heard that her Mum now has a broken back caused by cancer...


As Chair-person of the Little Fishes Playgroup I would like to apologise to anyone who felt left out of the Little Fishes Mativity Show last December.

Dear Friends

'Go, then, to all peoples everywhere and make them my disciples'. With these words Matthew draws his gospel towards its conclusion, but what do they mean to us now – in Goring in 1998? The words were originally spoken to the disciples of Jesus who had witnessed the Resurrection of the one who they believed dead and buried, yet who they knew to be God's Son. The words of Peter when he affirmed 'You are the Christ' now took on a new meaning and significance. Jesus had triumphed, the victory was complete and the way to everlasting life was now open – no wonder the disciples wanted to tell the whole world the Good News of the Gospel. They could hardly wait to get started.

A similar urge and enthusiasm has come to the church on many occasions when either individuals or groups have sought to stir the church from its lethargy and moved it into action. Often this has been over some particular issue where it is felt that the church should have a voice or it has been on a general conviction that the church should be spreading the Gospel to those who have not heard it. The church on these occasions has been able to mobilise its forces certain that Christ is calling it into action.

We live in an age of a spiritual famine. Not only do people generally not go to church, but they are ignorant of what church is all about. The church is a place where a few 'do gooders' who love all God's creatures gather together to sing hymns and meet each other. This is unfortunately the impression we give most people who come to a church for christenings, weddings or funerals, and then, perhaps, only because they are invited guests. What a sad reflection of the church of Jesus Christ, the Living Lord, whose victory we have just celebrated. Most people are ignorant of what we are because we have not made the effort to tell them - unfortunately we are too often concerned with running our own little part of the church or with organising fund raising events, just to keep everything going as it always has. 'Go, then, to all peoples everywhere and make them my disciples.'

The whole reason for the church being here is to proclaim the Gospel - that is what Jesus calls us to do, and we must look at all our activities to ensure that through them this is what we do. Our age cries out for an alternative way of living which is spiritually rather than materially based, and we must respond. Of course, we need to be clear what we are proclaiming, but as God calls us so we know He will be with us as our help and guide. We can, of course, talk and talk about these things and sit back and wait, but Jesus calls us to action. 'Go' He says, and we can all respond. As individuals we can talk and share with friends and neighbours, at home and at work, and as a church we can be responsive to those who come to seek and learn and go to those who are waiting to be challenged. Now this is not easy, and no-one should ever tell you it is, for such a viewpoint of going and doing challenges us as a church and as individuals. Yet it is through this that we will all grow for we go dependent on Jesus and Him alone and all that is done is done through Him.

We are called to go, to bring others to Jesus, to welcome them in His name, to make them feel part of the family, to make them comfortable. We are given this challenge by Jesus who offers us His Holy Spirit to enable and equip us. This is the challenge of Easter as we await the Spirit coming at Pentecost. Continue please to pray for us as we face this challenge with you.

Extracts from her letter to her dear parents reproduced by kind permission. 'Well, I can hardly believe that it is already the middle of February. must say I'm really enjoying the winter weather here, and I guess I've been very fortunate in as much that it has been a very mild one compared to the sub-zero temperatures they usually endure. There was really only one weekend, when the temperature plummeted to minus 50 degrees with the chill I caused everyone a lot of merriment when I rushed off to try to find somewhere that sold a hot water bottle! Over here that's more difficult than you can imagine! Some one made me laugh a while ago when they said, in all seriousness, that they could always tell when the temperature was 20 or more degrees below because, when she breathed in, her nostrils would stick together! I'm very glad to say that this rather charming piece of information hasn't been my experience at all! certainly makes the most of all the snow that's around, and at every possible opportunity I take my class of children out, with their sleds, to go racing down 'killer hill', which is just by the school. The children are really fearless in the manner in which they zoom down at breakneck speed, and I have got totally addicted! I've also gone snow shoeing - one night following a candle-lit trail - which was really fun trying to walk with what looked - and felt - like a pair of tennis racquets strapped to my All the lakes here are well and truly frozen, and it does seem a strange sensation to walk across a huge frozen lake, watch people ice fish, using huge drills to break through the ice; other people ice skate or snow mobile across. This is one thing I haven't been persuaded to try. I went skiing for the first time last week - with older children from the school. I was horrified to see the It was supposed to be cross-country skiing. trail included several steep slopes. The children made it appear effortless, but I spent more time on my bottom than standing up on my skis, but it was a lot of fun, and I guess I just need a lot more practice! They're going downhill skiing next month, so I can't resist the chance to try my hand (or my bottom) at that!

For 10 days during January St. Paul has it's annual winter carnival where everything wonderful about the cold and the snow is celebrated big time! This includes crowning a snow King and Queen, a very impressive carnival, every float, band and entertainment imaginable, through the streets, and what I enjoyed seeing most — ice sculptures. Unfortunately they didn't build an ice castle. It wasn't cold enough this year. (in 1992 they built one 166 feet high). They still built huge ice thrones that you could sit on, and amazing statues of windmills, dolphins jumping out of surf, huge ice musical instruments, etc. I found it amazing watching them sculpt the ice, using all manner of tools, and then, finally, using a hot iron to smooth off rough edges and make the ice glisten! It really was an incredible 10 days, and I don't want Spring to come just yet because I'm far too busy enjoying the Winter!

Last weekend some teachers invited me out for a meal and we all agreed to meet at one house, and from there proceed to the restaurant. Everyone arrived looking smug and pleased with themselves, and I had the definite feeling that they all knew something that I didn't! Shortly after, I was told to go and open the front door, and to my utmost surprise I saw, waiting outside, a great big white stretch-limo, which they'd hired to drive us around the sights of Minneapolis for an hour, before taking us to the restaurant! I couldn't believe my eyes - it was amazing! Inside there was champagne to drink, and we ended up toasting everyone we could remember (including the Queen Mum and her new hip!). The chauffeur drove really slowly, so that we held up the traffic behind us, and it was fun seeing people turn and try to look and see who was inside this amazing car! Vill my little Ford Fiesta ever feel the same again I wonder, after this star treatment!

School is still going extremely well; my little children who couldn't read at all when I got them in September are reading really well now, and surprising me on a daily basis! I must say I've grown very fond of all of them, and am very proud of them!

This week-end Marion, a friend from the school back in London, is coming to visit for a week, and I'm really looking forward to that. I think the mandatory visit to the Mall of America is called for, and it will be fun to show her around the twin cities now that I know where most things are! Vell I think that's all the news for now. I hope reading of all this ice and snow hasn't made you feel too cold! I hear back home daffodil shoots are already beginning to appear. We have to wait until May for that! Take care, and do drop me a line some time. It would be really great to hear from you. Much Love. Amanda. xxx

DOULOS • LOGOS II

FINANCIAL UPDATE

We face a difficult financial forecast for the beginning of 1998. The LOCOS II crew must renew a sizeable area of steel on deck, as well as installing a new freezer and fire doors. The cost for these renovations are US\$ 450,000 and US\$ 400,000 respectively. It is unfortunate that these projects come so close together. Due to legal requirements we are unable to delay this work. According to our best projections, the ship ministry will incur a significant cash-flow deficit early in 1998. Later in the year, DOULOS should again be in the black, though it is predicted that LOGOS II will end the year with a deficit. However, a special opportunity has been presented:

a German businessman has set up a matching fund to help with the LOGOS II renovations. For every two dollars given for this project, he will give one dollar up to US\$ 57.800 (DM 100,000). Gifts in any currency can be sent to any OM office, marked "LOGOS II renovation".

Late on Sunday 11th January, the Bunga Cempaka Dua, a Malaysian container ship, struck and damaged the DOULOS while at anchor off Pair Gudang, Malaysia. Thankfully, no injuries were incurred, however, the ship itself will have to undergo structural repairs in Singapore before being able to carry on her passage to India. The DOULOS had been delayed, and was waiting to receive final written permission from India before sailing.

Try and change tomorrow



Women in Madagascar demonstrate that community development begins with them.

In the spare room of a family house, Lanto is busy embroidering a wildlife design on to a blouse. Her mother and friends today are hawking their wares in town.

Welcome "Anjarasoa", which means "Precious Gift", a thriving six-women cooperative Moramanga in western Madagascar. It began last year when a handicrafts exhibition came to town and inspired them to set up their own cottage industry. They bought sewing machines and basic tools through a charity grant and the Church

of Jesus Christ in Madagascar's development department, SAF, loaned them MGFr3 million (UK£380) for raw materials. One year on, each person in the cooperative is earning around MGFr60,000 (UK£7.50) a month.


In the next town of Andasibe, one room of a wooden two-storey house by the railway line is a pharmacy. It has a basic stock of antibiotics, antimalaria drugs and pain-killers.

Ten women run the service – it sells at a lower cost than other druggists and is open to the whole community. Although they invest time and work in maintaining the accounts and buying in new stock, those 10 women gain nothing financially from the project.

Women shoulder the burden of work in Madagascar. According to the United Nations Development Programme 48% of people in all kinds of employment are women. In agriculture, women account for a massive 78% of the total work-force. What they do for their families and commu-

nities should not be underestimated.

In the hill villages around Moramanga, men clear the forest, but planting and cultivation is women's work. Traditionally, the greeting when

a baby girl is born is "Congratulations! You have someone to fetch the water and transplant the rice!" Unlike most of Madagascar's rural poor, male villagers here can turn to local indus-

tries such as graphite mining, logging and the railways for cash but families still rely on women's extra earning capacity. The Church of Jesus Christ in Madagascar (FJKM) realises that developing communities depends a lot on developing women.

Tsoa dropped out of secondary school after her father was killed in a cyclone and her mother, a linen maid, could no longer support the family. Both were recruited by SAF's MIORA project – an apt acronym for "Try and change tomorrow" – and received nine month's training in embroidery and sewing. Now they have a reliable export sales outlet for their goods.

In July this year, however, SAF called a halt to the PROFEM programme responsible for the successes in Moramanga, Andasibe and MIORA. What, SAF has wondered, is the long-term effect of women-only projects? Ndranto Razamanarina, SAF Technical Officer and one-time field worker in Andasibe, fears that they actually aid rather than lessen discrimination against women. So, the new policy is to integrate women into all community groups and projects (and men into women-only projects).

"We believe women should be involved at all levels of the community" says Ndranto, which also means decision-making: as a result, SAF have made sure that at least 25% of people in its committees are women. ◆

"DO WOMEN-ONLY PROJECTS ACTUALLY AID DISCRIMINATION?"

Some in the church believe that women need the encouragement they get from women-only projects. Perline Razafitrimo, President of the church's Dorkasy department, thinks "women can take responsibility in church

and in the community, but they are reluctant because they believe decision-making is a man's job". Dorkasy (the women's department of FJKM) will soon open its own handicraft sales and training centre in the capital, Antananarivo, to help rural women. Administration and management skills' training will feature strongly.

Whatever the right and wrongs of the different approaches, women are saying "Don't ignore us". Recognising their role is long overdue.



Dear Friends,

At the beginning of the year, it was decided that we would engage in two major events, a flower festival and a pantomime. The first is now on us and the second we will be exploring in some depth over the next few weeks. If it has passed you by may we draw your attention to the fact that the theme of our flower festival is 'Wedding Anniversaries'? Much hard work has already gone into the planning and preparation of this event by a small team of people who are especially skilled in arranging the natural beauty of those flowers God has made into expressions to speak of a particular theme. Everyone knows that to be married 50 years is a golden celebration, 25 years silver, but what about 14, 6 or 2? The answers to these questions will be found in the midst of the arrangements. Few people are privileged to celebrate their golden anniversary, and in contemporary society, few will reach 10 or even 5 years of celebration, indeed many do not even consider marriage as a worthwhile institution. However, for those who marry in church and seek God's blessing in their new relationship this is a new beginning in which both parties pledge themselves to one another in the hope that God will bless their

Marriage of course is a commitment. The day you get married, you commit yourself to your partner no matter what may happen. At one time, for richer or poorer usually meant poorer would bring the most pressure to the relationship. However ask any lottery winner about the pressures brought by richer and you get an insight into the changes that go on in many relationships in today's materialistic society as both partners pursue earthly riches. On your wedding day you make the commitment with no idea as to what the future will hold, it is a step into the unknown no longer only yourself to consider but a step into a future as a partnership. It is into this unknown that we seek to step with God at our side as those sharing in Christian marriage. It is this journey that we will celebrate over the weekend of our festival whether that journey has lasted 1, 5, or 50 years.

For many in our church fellowship there will be a looking back at a life shared with a partner now in the Lord's presence, and although celebration may be tinged with sadness there should still be the opportunity for thanksgiving for all that was shared. For many of us who made our commitment some time ago, whether a number of years ago or more recently, there will be an opportunity to re affirm that commitment before God as we rededicate our marriages at our evening service to conclude the festival. Of necessity, this will need to be a shared act rather than a series of individual acts.

Commitment is not a popular word in today's vocabulary and just as many people are no longer willing to make a commitment in marriage neither are they willing to make a commitment in any other area of their life. Our Lord, however, calls for His people to commit themselves to Him in response to the commitment He has made to us in Jesus. Jesus who gave His life that we may live deserves our fullest commitment as we place him first in all that we are and all that we do. Our celebration of marriage is an opportunity for us to witness of God's commitment to those who seek His blessing and to share with the world the principle of putting God first even in the most important area of life, those who we love. Let us then encourage those who we know to come and share in all aspects of this weekend that we may speak of God's commitment to us and our putting of Him above all else in our lives.





Meskal Square in Addis Ababa thronged with what felt like a million people. Ranks of deacons and priests in brilliant robes, carrying dazzling parasols, surrounded the Demara - a bonfire sunnounted by a cross and covered in the same Meskal yellow daisies which blanketed the ground. Colourful choirs from every church in the city danced and sang in turn to the Patriarch. When the Demara was ablaze, our guide whisked us away before the crowd swarmed in to gather ashes from the bonfire.

At 7am the next morning we arrived at the Church of St Estifanos next to Meskal Square, where thousands were gathered. For the next four hours we shared in the relayed Eucharist, followed by the processing of the Ark of the Covenant three times around the church with singing and preaching. Many came forward to a priest to make offerings, kiss the Cross and receive his blessing. The three Christian Aid partners we went on to visit in Ethiopia were all addressing the challenges of those in extreme poverty for whom there is no safety net. One, the Gemini Trust, was founded when Dr Carmela Abate discovered what a financial catastrophe twins can be to a poor family. The Trust provides extra food for the family until the twins are five, help with school fees and health care, and vocational training for mothers.

Dr Abate told us how some mothers

have been affected by international debt; Gemini gave loans to 20 women to start small businesses and become self supporting. But the IMF told the Ethiopian government to increase its revenues if it wanted continued credit. Shop rents were increased and shop keepers were forced out; the women were squeezed back into poverty.

To believe that human beings lived in such poverty, I needed to see it. I needed too to see the strength of spirit of those who struggle against such odds, and the dedication of those who devote their lives and skills towards solidarity with the should-haves.

0 Lord our God, most holy and most humble, you were content to come among us to do lowly service and suffer insult for our salvation. Make us ready to follow your example in living out our hope. In our efforts this week, and through the gifts of many, bless us with your grace so that the weak may be strengthened, the troubled may he

the oppressed may rest, the hopeless may he delivered, and the sad may reioice.

Our television sets bring us not only documentary films about different parts of the world but also the news as it is happening with live pictures of cities and countries which when we were at school were merely names on a map.

We are no longer isolated either as people or as nations for we are all part of this shrinking world. We all have responsibility for each other and for the environment in which we live. There are those that would want to see an increasing movement towards a system of government that binds nations together so as to avoid any conflict. There are also those who see that the world can only know true peace through the power of Jesus and the establishment of His Kingdom here on earth, a prayer offered daily as Christians meet together in His name. How good it is to remember that we are united as God's people throughout the world.

One of the most common complaints that I hear is that we become too concerned about the church overseas when there is so much to do on our own doorstep. Of course if we had 3 or 4 times the number of people willing to engage in our door to door survey we could achieve more. If we had more people willing to give up their time to engage in youth work or the nurturing of new Christians we could do even more but we do as much as people's time and commitment allows us. The same is true of support overseas. We can only do as much as resources enable us, but we should be doing this work from a real sense of thanksgiving. When you last read your Bible, did you read it in a language that you understood and spoke or was it in a second language? Let us remember this as we support the work of Ruth Chatfield and the Bible Society. The next time you are enjoying a meal either in your own home, in a restaurant or hotel this is perhaps the time to remember those who will not eat that day or even the next and to rejoice for the work of Tearfund and Christian Aid. The next time you pick up something you have dropped or you burn your fingers perhaps this could prompt you to remember the work of the Leprosy Mission. We have so much to be thankful for and really riches beyond the understanding of so many.

The reality of the world in which we live is that our neighbour, although far away, is very close at hand. What a joy it is for us to be part of the Christian family joined together with our brothers and sisters be they in North Africa, Nigeria, Greece, Belgium, Poland, Japan, Indonesia, Peru or anywhere else even just round the corner here in Goring! We are assured that we can talk to any other Christians through the wonders of technology, either on the telephone or the Internet within minutes and we do know that we can write and they will receive our letter within a few days. Yet, we are assured through the promises of Jesus that His Father hears our prayers even before they are spoken and that to support Christians in all sorts of situations through our prayers is a real privilege. So let us, in real thanksgiving for all that we have, even if we don't think it's very much, pray for and support the work and witness of God's people wherever they may be.

Please continue to pray for us.



MY TRIP TO SOUTH KOREA

I was very privileged to attend the 34th Convention of the World Women's. Christian Temperance Union from May $5^{th} - 11^{th}$.

The long journey was very enjoyable - and we passed through a marvellous dawn - a most unforgettable experience. On arrival at Seoul airport, we could have been at home: the rain in torrents!!! But we were quickly driven to our hotel - The Swiss Grand Hotel - THE HOTEL in Seoul.

The Korean people are charming and very helpful in all ways - very efficient in all their duties, and they work hard and appear to work long hours. The leader of the Korean Convention is a theological teacher at the university - so there were many students around to help us when we needed them. Koreans love to sing at every opportunity, and four young students played and sang to greet us every day as we entered the hall where the conference was held beautiful music, creating a wonderful atmosphere. On the Saturday morning we had all age groups of children to entertain us, and tiny tots came onto the stage with action songs (reminded me of our little Fishes entertaining our Kestro members) and one of the favourite songs they sang was (Sunday School days) "Jesus loves

me this I know, for the Bible tells me so". We heard this several times from all ages - primary children, junior school children, and harmonised by the students - they all loved to sing and dance with fans and sashes.

We are a Christian movement and it was a great joy to meet with members from so many different countries, who love our Lord and working for our temperance cause. We all have the same difficulties with alcohol abuse, and drugs, and how to reach our young people - some made me feel I do so little. In England, we concentrate on our Education Van - very well equipped - taken to shows, etc. all over the country. I hope it will be in Worthing sometime when interested in this project.

can get permission from authorities) - countries were most My highlight of the whole visit was the church services we attended on the two Sundays. The first Sunday only six of us went - others had not arrived. The second week, five coaches left the hotel - 252 delegates from 27 countries all over the world - from Australia, Argentina, China, Egypt, Taiwan, Fiji, Guatamala, Japan, India, W. Samoa, Philippines, Indonesia, Mongola, all European countries, Canada, USA and all Scandinavia.

We entered this large church, full with 7,500 people - five services held each Sunday, the first at 7.00am; chair of about 500 young people, already singing praises (seats had been reserved for us). The service was quite simple and although the first week it was all in Korean, it was surprising how much I could understand, and was able to join in with familiar hymns - the first, "Praise to the Lord the Almighty". What a joy to worship with that large congregation - a church full of praise and joy. Korea is a Buddhist country, but so many in that land are turning to our lord and Saviour, and joining the church -

turning to our lord and Saviour, and joining the church up to now there is tolerance between Buddhists and
Christians. The Christians are so full of joy and long to
tell you of their love for Jesus Christ.

I could write so much more, it was altogether a wonderful experience, but I will close now and thank all those who were praying for me while I was away.

I know you were praying, I was so uplifted and everything went so smoothly - journeyings, etc. I know my Lord was there by my side.

What is happening about Resolution 19 at Assembly ?

As reported in our May Newsletter, a motion is going to be proposed by two members of Assembly, that Standing Order 3 e (iv) be suspended, so that RI9 can be reconsidered.

This will be proposed by Mr John Ellis, Secretary of Medway District, and seconded by Dr. Graham Campling, who together proposed the successful Southern Province resolution at their Synod in March. If this enabling motion is successful (and that will require a three quarter majority of Assembly), they will then propose the Southern Province resolution:

The Synod of Southern Province, recognising the diversity of views on the matter of ordaining to ministry persons in a homosexual relationship and the hurt caused to many individuals, local churches and district councils by the passing of R19 and believing that the 1998 General Assembly should reconsider R 19 on the grounds that it does not promote the unity of the Church during the period in which resolution 18 is being implemented.

- a. requests General Assembly to rescind R19 so that the procedures for candidating and call to ministry may return to those followed prior to the 1997 General Assembly until work under Resolution 18 is complete;
- supports in prayer those who are now responsible for doing the further work outlined in R 18,
- c. encourages all local churches and district councils prayerfully to await the presentation of the work being undertaken under R18 and not to take further action which would destroy, the concern for the unity and fellowship of the United Reformed Church as expressed in Resolution 17.

PLEASE PRAY THAT THIS
COURSE OF ACTION MAY BE SUCCESSFUL.

n a massive operation, MAF aircraft have delivered over 650 tonnes of food to help the beleaguered islanders on drought-stricken Papua New Guinea and neighbouring Irian Jaya.

So far, it is a six month logistical marathon in an area three times the size of England to beat drought and disease, the results of little rain, and the scorching flames which swept through huge tracts of jungle. At first, bush fires and smoke severely hampered the early relief flights.

Brifish pilot Michael Duncalfe, in charge of MAF's drought-relief team, estimates from reports that even now in some areas one person in two is sick with a variety of diseases such as malaria, diarrhoea and respiratory infections, made worse by malnutrition.

In Papua New Guinea the delivery operations were briefly handicapped by engine trouble in one of the Twin Otters, leaving only four Twin Otters to take the strain of the enormous challenge of carrying vital supplies to isolated communities. Each aircraft can carry 1.5 tonnes at a time.

In Indonesia's Irian Jaya province, MAF USA's fleet of 15 light aircraft and helicopters are working seven days a week delivering food supplies. Other mission work has had to be relegated to lower priority levels.

Food shortage

In some northern areas of Papua New Guinea, gardens have been replanted, but despite consistent rain there is a shortage of the energy-giving foods which provide the normal staple diet. Other parts of the country, however, have had little or no rain while some districts in the Highlands have had too much too quickly - washing away growing crops and flooding large areas.

Even when rivers begin to flow again, the stocks of fish - another vital food source - are much reduced, fellow-victims of the drought. Stocks of aviation fuel at the MAF base at Kawito became very low when the poor river level prevented barges arriving. In

January the river levels rose sufficiently to allow transport to flow once again.

In the capital, Port Moresby, power cuts last several hours because of the lack of rain.

MAF aircraft have been delivering rice, flour, oil and other vital commodities for a number of organisations, including the Lutheran, Anglican and Brethren Churches and World Vision, as well as carrying supplies bought by MAF with donations from the Swedish government.

Relay flights

During February and March, Twin Otters from Mount Hagen, Goroka and Telefomin worked in relays over several days to deliver food to communities north-west of Tari. In all 90 tonnes of food were flown to Agali, Auwi, Kopiago and Wanakipa, staging posts for even more isolated villages, in an operation organised by World Vision. Now crops are beginning to grow there again, so no further aid flights are anticipated.

At Owena, the aid cargo of an MAF Twin

Otter was being unloaded when men from a different village arrived with bows and arrows and stole some of the supplies - and aimed arrows over the nose of the aircraft.

As arrows flew, the pilot took off with two passengers for their next destination.

But while that hostile reception was going on, supplies paid for by school children in northern Australia were welcomed with open arms and smiling faces in Wiawia - a remote community in the Eastern Highlands. Several loads were flown into the village by Cessna 206 in a single day.

Elsewhere in Telefomin, Michael saw hillsides once covered with lush green jungle, burnt brown and black by fires which have ravaged the island. 'The remains of the trees stand either lifeless or lie as so much useless timber on the ground,' he comments, 'and now the rain is washing away the fragile top-soil.'

From the air, the full devastation is visible. Yet another incentive for the pilots to keep their busy aircraft flying and bring relief.

Jubilee is a word that now means little. more than anniversary, silver or golden. But it originated in the Bible as a loaded term with very radical implications. The teaching on Jubilee (mainly in Leviticus 25) meant that land and property should be restored to the original owners, serious debts remitted and slaves freed, to mark the passing of 50 years (a 'Sabbath of Sabbaths 1, the period of living memory in an oral culture. In this spirit, for example, the contemporary calls for Third World debt remission to mark the coming Millennium invoke the Jubilee principle, a campaign strongly supported in the United Reformed Church. So it is troubling that Israel, of all peoples, should be celebrating its own 50th anniversary as a nation state in 1998 with too little sense of that Biblical call for liberation and renewal at a time of Jubilee. Their celebrations mark an anniversary but is that enough?

The language of Middle East discussions is full of subtle contradictions. But it is the fundamental ambiguity of the term 'Israel' that undermines every effort to offer calm or logical analysis of the current Middle East crisis. This is the key to the acknowledged inconsistency in US policy Israel, whatever that means, is the key.

As a persecuted people, the Jews needed this homeland and they deserved it. Only a very few of those who resist some of Israel's current policies are so extreme as to deny that. Certainly none of the Palestinian Christians with whom I spent time recently would deny that Israel as a state not only does exist but should exist.



WITH ISRAEL'S 50TH ANNIVERSARY AS A MODERN STATE JUST CELEBRATED, PETER BRAIN REFLECTS ON THE CALL TO A TRUE JUBILEE IN THE MIDDLE EAST

Whether you hear echoes of Child of our time or Fiddler on the Roof, anti-Semitism is simply evil and can be truly horrendous.

But can we distinguish between the language of religious rights and that of secular liberal democracy to get at the truth of what the term 'Israel' means today? Apologists and opponents of Israel alike are forever confusing the categories. There are religious overtones and undertones affecting all political comment. Critics of what the state of Israel is doing are met with accusations of anti-Semitism as though such criticism was anti-Jewish. Supporters of the oppression of the Arab Palestinians, including the religious Right in the USA. are bolstered by the sense of divine destiny. How many British Christians, too, instinctively cheered the result of the 1967 war when 'the Jews came home and find the Biblical promises to 'Israel' hard to ignore when reading their newspapers even now?

It is the shadow of the Shoah that clouds both religious and political analysis. That was the awesome event which welded the two adjectives together. It was the persecution to end all persecutions – itself a term which signifies that something deeper than politics is happening. To call it a holocaust (meaning 'whole burnt offering') reveals it as a quasi-religious act – a profoundly blasphemous one. No wonder that Israel can never be a normal nation state.

With such birth-pangs, it is understandable that no effort is spared by Israel to achieve national security, whether by developing a strong economy or through ubiquitous lobbying in western capitals or, of course, by sustaining a top-rate military machine which is superbly

equipped, well led and highly motivated. The need to assert the state's right to life was tested from the outset against invasion and terrorism, as the marvellous documentary series, The Fifty Years War. on BBC2 demonstrated. A 'settler' instinct characterises the Israeli national mood, not simply in the designated settlements which will soon occupy every strategically important hilltop across the land. Americans subconsciously warm to this settler instinct which touches their own deep roots. It was this, too, which presumably led to the sense of kindred spirit with white South Africans with whom Israel shared nuclear programmes. Sadly, that connection may also have led them to a policy for the Palestinian lands which seeks to reduce them to homelands or 'bantustans'; examine some of the maps used at the Oslo talks and you can discern a clear clustering of easily controlled areas, delimited by fine new roads from which vehicles with Palestinian number-plates are forbidden.

But what of the religious message? Who will tell Israel that what grows out of the barrel of a gun is power, not security and certainly not peace? Who will call for a true jubilee? Maybe their own military leadership who are making this point will be heard. It must be accepted that no European Christian leader can bring that word, since it was Christian Europe which allowed centuries of pogroms leading to the Shoah. But must the Palestinians forever pay the price of the suffering that Europeans inflicted on the Jews? Sharing the land is actually a religious as well as a political challenge and that is precisely what is required

RUTH & ANDREA'S TRIP TO CONGO



We flew into

Brazzaville on May 1st. The city

was quiet - no May Day celebrations this year! It was good to spend the night at our centre. The apartments are empty, but a mattress on the floor and a bucket of water for washing were all we needed.

The shells and bullets have left their mark everywhere and there are more armed soldiers on the streets, but many markets are functioning normally and life seems to go on much as before.

The next morning we set off with Mac, our assistant director, for Boundji. Since our truck is still in Gabon (we were advised not to drive it back yet) we took public transport. After a six- hour coach ride, we got in a small truck to take us the final 90kms to Boundji. Having paid the fare we then realised that it was a stolen vehicle (no ignition keys!), and after about 20 minutes it broke down decisively! The driver clearly had no idea about mechanics, so we camped out overnight in someone's living room in a nearby village. Next morning we were on another truck by 6.30am, and this time made it all the way to Boundji.



The Sunday morning market was in full swing as we drove into Boundji and there were shouts of surprise as we were spotted and people came to greet us. It was good to be back!

Our house was in good shape, apart from a leak in the ceiling caused by a stray bullet which came through the roof during some shooting in the air! All our furniture and many of our possessions were still in place.

Missing was the gas stove, paraffin lamps, much of our kitchen stuff, dictionaries, sheets, mosquito nets, cassette player, etc. But many other things were rediscovered as we sorted through the various boxes and trunks we had left.

Even our cat was still hanging around our house and seemed none the worse for wear (just slimmer, like many of the people!).



Mac stayed with us for two days so that he could talk with the local authorities and be assured that the security situation posed no threat to our being there. Andrea and 1 stayed for a further 6 days, and we were able to meet many of our friends, make an inventory of the remaining house contents, and even do some work on a few bible verses in Mboshi for next year's calendar.

Our friend and co-worker. Roch joined us in Boundji for the week and his commitment and vision for God's work among the Mboshi people were a big source of encouragement to us.

Some of the church leaders in Boundji have moved on and the churches are limping along, suffering from lack of mature/stable leadership and direction. Since it will no longer be possible to produce a Gospel for the centenary of the Catholic church, the plan is now to publish the Mboshi-French dictionary (and perhaps a couple of Bible stories) for the year 2000.

After the week in Boundji we had a few days in Brazzaville, tracking down our friends there - many have been displaced by the war. Both the evangelical church I attend and Andrea's house church are currently planting new churches and neither suffered any casualties from the war! We visited some of the Mboshi community in Brazza and we were even able to show the "Jesus" video in Mboshi to a handful of people.

We had a difficult meeting with co-worker Louis. He is accusing us of treating him unfairly, and not giving him enough money for his work. Sadly, this attitude has been apparent for some time, and it is now clear that we will not be able to continue working with him.

Much to our delight, we found in the middle of a lot of papers left at our centre, copies of the word lists from the different Mboshi dialects which we collected on our survey trip last year!! This was a special encouragement to Nboshi student, Guy, who had given up hope of doing his masters degree based on this data, since he believed it all to be lost.



We finally flew out of Brazzaville on 18th May, and returned to Yaounde. Michael, the Mboshi student here who had no news of his family in Congo, finally has a letter saying they are well!!

Thanks to all who prayed for this trip! We did see God's hand on our daily activities and meetings with people. We stayed in good health (even when a plastic bag of duty free bottles fell on my head out of the overhead locker on the plane!), and had no problems with the authorities/military.

GOD IS GOOD ALL THE TIME!

VEHICLE??

We praise God that we were able to get all our money back on the Toyota truck we



ordered just before the war. It was not desirable to ship it into the country whilst all the looting was going on! We are now considering selling our old Daihatsu truck in Gabon and buying some other vehicle for our journeys to Boundji.

We continue to pray for the on-going stability and recovery of Congo, and also for <u>Guy and Guy</u> (one of whom mentioned above) who both made decisions to follow Jesus a year ago. One has since fallen back into his old lifestyle and the other does not seem to have "taken root" in God. Prayer changes things ...

WHAT NEXT??

I plan to stay in Yaounde until September. As well as helping again with the "Discover your language" course for Cameroonians, I hope to produce some write-ups on Mboshi tone and phonology, and, with Michael's help, to finish going through the dictionary so that we can have a first draft available soon.

In September I expect to come home to England for a few months! The details of how I will spend the time have yet to be worked out, but I'm looking forward to seeing some of you.

Andrea is hoping to leave for a visit home sometime in June. She will then return to Cameroon around September and attend literacy courses and workshops which will be taking place during the autumn. Our return to Congo is therefore likely to be in January 99.

Have a good summer! We've been enjoying mango season in Yaounde!

Dear Friends,

The past few weeks have been, to say the least, 'interesting'. In some churches life drifts on Sunday by Sunday without any interruption happily this is not so for us. Since last writing to you, we have been on the usual roller coaster that being a member of Goring URC seems to imply. While it is always lovely to welcome people into our buildings it is probably better to be there to receive them and to be able to guide them around and open the doors to the facilities that we offer. It was therefore disappointing not to be around on the night of $10^{th}/11^{th}$ June when those who came found it necessary to remove a door from the wall and prise others open causing considerable damage. It was even sadder that on their return 10 days later they still thought it would be easier to find their own way round. These two break-ins and the distress and heartache they caused could have resulted in a low point within the life of our fellowship. However, we can be grateful in a real sense that they brought us to a high point as we turned to the Lord.

Those who were able to come together on the evening of the second break-in were the first to experience a real sense of being at one in adversity and a sense of the Lord's hand upon our work for Him here. So it was that what could have been a really depressing time turned into a time of fellowship, one with another, and praise for the fellowship we shared in our Lord.

So it was we moved that week into the Flower Festival (reported in last month's Chronicle) and to the excitement of collecting vast numbers of flowers two days before only to be handed two bunches! This administrative mix up was another real body blow that fortunately brought us once again to our knees. The result, once again, of many prayers was seen in another time of everyone pulling together and turning a potential disaster into a challenge that spoke of the Lord's hand very much on what was being done. Yes, the event may have been financially encouraging but how much more encouraging were the people who came and especially those who on the Sunday evening were able to rededicate their marriage before the Lord. The event was conceived in order that we should have the opportunity to draw people to a deeper understanding of the Lord's desire to be in their life, and here was the real reward for all the hard work.

This turning of disappointments into challenges is being reflected in many areas of our life together and we believe that the two things that we have highlighted are but a small part of an overall pattern. We were all disappointed when B.B. closed and when we heard that G.B. also was having to close due to lack of leadership. However, we have seen a real growth since Easter of youngsters between the age of 5 and 7yrs who have come to Monday Group where there are now 15 children on the register. It is also good to report that we are looking forward to starting a group for 8-11 year olds in September on a Tuesday evening. The pattern of being able to develop through the week the work done in Junior Church on a Sunday is proving very enjoyable and exciting for both leaders and children. An interesting note is that one Monday evening with 13 children present only 4 had been around on the Sunday (about ½ the children usually come on a Sunday and Monday). That week therefore, 9 children did not miss the scriptural teaching that our teachers and mid week workers are co-operating to share with them. We are also sad when people choose to worship elsewhere and, of course, we miss them and the gifts they take with them. However, in our releasing of them do we stop and recognise how the Lord uses these opportunities too as He draws others into the fellowship who are willing to use their gifts and so enrich us in our work for His Kingdom. Perhaps the challenge in this disappointment therefore is to recognise the Lord's hand on the work that He wants to do and the direction in which He is moving us. We continue to believe that as a church we are called to reach out into the community around us and we can only do this with a real sense of unity and love of one another



Exploration into God.

What does one mean by "God?" Is He the sum of our ethical strivings, the goal of our moral aspirations? Are we speaking about our moral and spiritual goals? Theology & Science are, after all, specialized fields. William Temple acknowledged God as the source of all ethics - which are derived from God.


In Genesis one reads, "A man's God is that which has over-riding authority in his life." Our Minister (in New Zealand) said that every man has his own conception of God. Some call Him "The Voice of Conscience." Our values are, derived from God. Who speaks through Christ. He said, "God is a Spirit and must be worshipped in Spirit & in Truth.

All I have to lean on are the Teachings of Christ, Who for me is a window into God. Schweitzer said, Jesus had simply taken him prisoner since childhood. Jesus has had a compelling attraction for countless others of us. Karl Gibran wrote "Even as each one of you stands alone in God's knowledge, so must each stand alone in his knowledge of God. Those who try to solve Him seldom have the full answer. He comes only in answer to the heart's cry, the soul's desire - then is felt as a Presence. One has to make 'A leap in the dark, trusting Him,' He that planted the ear shall He not hear? He that planted the eye shall He not see? God must be greater than we imagine. Goring also needs to consider appointing a reserve for the Vacancy Committee, should one of our representatives be unavailable at short notice.


Editor's note

Dear Members of Basis.

The Basis committee met on July 13th at the Assembly and decided that it was important for us to communicate with you without delay, to make sure that you know what happened at the Assembly, and what we propose to do as the next steps.

Our attempts to have the 1997 Resolution 19 rescinded at the 1998 Assembly have failed. Three March Synods passed resolutions calling on the Officers of Assembly to allow R19 to be reconsidered at the 1998 Assembly. The Officers ruled that this was out of order on the basis of Standing Order 3e(iv). They suggested that a way forward was for 2 members of Assembly propose a motion that Standing Order 3e(iv) be suspended, so that R19 might be reconsidered. Such a motion was proposed on Saturday, July 11th. After some discussion someone proposed that the motion 'be not put' which was allowed by the Officers of Assembly and carried by 258 votes to 202. Naturally we are all very disappointed.

Basis was formed with the main aim 'to restore and promote the authority of the Bible within the URC' and with the short-term objective 'to rescind R19 at the General Assembly 1998'. Our short term objective has failed but our main aim stands firm. We need to consider new strategies to ensure the ultimate success of our primary aim. This we will do at our **next Basis meeting on October 3rd**, 11.30 - 3.30 at the City Temple in London. We are aware that some had already decided that if R19 was not rescinded at the Assembly, they would start the process of separating from the URC. Others have said that they intend to withhold money and to withdraw from councils and committees of the URC in order to protest at decisions made. Still others intend to remain committed to the councils and committees of the URC but wish to belong to some association of dissenting churches so that they can remain within the URC with some integrity. On October 3rd, we intend to explore these and other options and to plan the organisation which will best serve our purposes over the next few years. A battle may have been lost but the war is far from over. One thing is certain, the work of Basis will go on.

Please book the date in your diary, please study the Basis of Union for yourself, please continue to pray for guidance, and come to the meeting on October 3rd if you can. If you are unable to attend please write to us and let us know what your present position and plans are.

We do not intend to send out further newsletters until after October 3rd.

Thank you for your support so far and please continue to encourage others - individuals and churches - to join Basis.

PARTNERS IN MISSION IN MALAWI

Swanwick, celebrating 200 years since the London Missionary Society was founded. I chose an Art workshop – relaxing I thought.

'Make something connected with the work of the Council for World Mission.' I looked round for inspiration. Sitting across the table was a woman looking dejected. She hadn't any ideas either. 'Shall we do something together?' 'Let's make an African woman'.

I still have that piece of art that brought me together with Catherine Nkosi, the Chairperson of the Women's Executive in the Churches of Christ in Malawi. As we constructed the paper, fabric, wood and paint into our woman, complete with baby on back and hoe in hand. Catherine and I talked about women in our different countries. She said 'I wish you could come to Malawi to meet our women'. My reply was 'If you invite me I'll come'. And I thought I would never hear any more.

Eventually, after a long delay an official invitation arrived, not from Catherine, but from the Revd Nixon Chiwala, the General Secretary of the Churches of Christ in Malawi. A further delay because of their church programme and my diary, but April

1998 was to be the time.

I didn't really know what they wanted. Ten days before departure, Catherine wrote, asking me to teach them about the partnership of women and men in mission. Christian family life and leadership skills. Yes, I can teach, but what presumption to think that I could communicate with women, whose life and culture I do not share. The outline programme indicated four seminars, three of them covering two full days, and I had little time for preparation.

The CWM 1998 campaign material was appropriate. 'Women taking control of their livelihoods so that their families may benefit'. The five topics are education, health, economic empowerment, domestic violence and the partnership of women and men in ministry. I went armed with Campaign T shirts, shopping bags, paper clips, postcards and two action sheets on Work and on Partnership in Ministry.

The seminars went something like this. We explored the skills needed in the domestic day of Malawian women whether they lived in town or a village. We heard what the women did every week in their Women's Guild. In the home we recognized the skills of money management, making decisions, developing personal relationships, conflict resolution and

problem solving, training techniques involving speech and demonstration, time management, ensuring health and safety, setting high standards. In the Guild, committee experience, preaching to one another, praying in public, counselling the bereaved and tending to the sick.

These were women whose men thought they had no leadership skills. Some men who attended these seminars confessed that they had never thought of women having all these skills. The church does not have women elders or ministers, though women deaconesses are members of the church session. Women have very recently been allowed to pray in church services and to preach, though it was news to some of the participants. They are also allowed to sit down with men at church meals, after they have done the preparation.

The campaign supplied a well structured Bible Study on 1 Cornthians 12. One body, different members, varied gifts, many roles to play in the church. The women's and men's groups concluded that there must be change if their church could be in accord with that scripture.

We explored the nature of mission. It was interesting to me that we had to go back to the motives of the white missionaries in order to convince the women that the work they do with their church is indeed mission in their villages.

Responding to the crisis in Sudan



The crisis currently facing Sudan has many causes, but chief among them are the continuing civil war and failed harvests.

Thousands of people have fled from the fighting and are constantly on the move. They cannot stay in one place long enough to plant, let alone harvest, the crops they need to survive.

FOOD SUPPLIES

It is estimated that up to 1.2 million people in southern Sudan are in immediate danger of starvation. The most pressing problem for aid agencies trying to reach the areas most affected by hunger is how to deliver the urgently-needed food supplies.

Limited air access has now been granted by the government, which previously prevented humanitarian flights SPECIAL DELIVERY: Opening the contributions sent by supporters in response to the Sudan Appeal.

as a military strategy against the south. However, there are still many problems to overcome in transporting the food.

Even when the planes do fly in, it is difficult to deliver food to people who are on the move. Access by road to the neediest areas is also beset by problems — with landmines, heavy rains, expensive fuel and a shortage of vehicles all hindering the movement of supplies.

APPEALS

Various organisations have launched appeals for financial support, including Tearfund. Our supporters have responded with characteristic generosity to our appeal, and we have been tre-

mendously encourage the large amounts of mail arriving at all the Tearfund offices.

At the time of going to press, a total of more than £2 million has been given towards our relief operation in Sudan, together with £110,000 which we received before the appeal.

The Disasters Emergency Committee (DEC), a coalition of agencies of which Tearfund is a member, also launched an appeal on 21st May, and the money raised through this appeal is being shared by all the agencies. The DEC believes that to stabilise the situation in Sudan, they will need 12 flights a day to 14 destinations, flying in seven days a week for six months.

Tearfund has to date received an extra £160,000 from the DEC for our Sudan appeal.

ON THE GROUND

Early in June, our Disaster Response Team began a programme in Rumbek County, which is in one of the most severely affected regions, Bahr-el-Ghazal. The team is setting up a supplementary feeding project at Billing.

Tearfund's partner, ACROSS, is already working with people in Rumbek, where it has an established community healthcare programme. They are providing seeds, tools and other equipment to 5,000 families through local authorities, churches and community leaders. ACROSS is in an excellent position to help, and was able to respond at an early stage to the present crisis.

Please continue to pray for the people of southern Sudan and for the work of ACROSS and the Disaster Response Team. And please encourage the churches in your area to remember Sudan in their prayers.

Turkey

Evangelical Christians, still a tiny minority seem to be generating publicity out of all proportion to their numbers. The full Bible in modern Turkish is nearing completion and the number of Christian books available grows by three or four titles per month. In this secular state the propagation of the Gospel though regarded as undesirable, is not illegal, with an unprecedented degree of freedom for media coverage. A local Christian radio can now reach most of the ten million inhabitants of Istanbul, Pray for wisdom in planning for Luis Palau to visit next February.

Dear Friends.

Here we are again at the beginning of the Harvest and later this month we shall celebrate Harvest Festival and will probably feel that autumn is settling in. Many people will ask where the summer has gone and reflect what a short time it seems since we were planting our seeds in springtime. It's true, of course, that time does seem to pass very quickly and equally we cannot let time be wasted. Harvesting will lead to the preparation for fresh sowing so that the next harvest may be gathered. Much care needs to be taken with both and we recently came across the following article that certainly made me stop and think. "It's made of thin, steel rod, and it's a quarter metre square, and as we walk across the fields we throw it in the air. For the foundations of the harvest have been laid, and it's time for field walking and plant counting. It's random sampling you see and where the square lands you count the plants inside it's area and multiply by four. We look (hoping!) for 250 plants or more per square metre, for that will mean that the crop has overwintered well and that the potential is there for a good harvest. But there is a long time to go, and we are looking for the first signs of any fungal diseases that can attack the growing plant. If we find any we shall have to decide on what action to take, reluctantly, for spraying is an expensive business, and we do not undertake it lightly. But a healthy plant is paramount during its period of most active growth,'

Churches are, or should be, in the business of sowing God's seed, caring for it's growth and watching the harvest being gathered in. The seed we sow is the Word of God and the ground may have been prepared by ourselves or by others but often out task is to help the plant grow and watch over it's development. Is this the time for God to walk in his field and throw his steel square? If he does, what will he find? Is there potential for a good harvest? It's not just about the number of plants but what is being produced, only healthy plants will produce a good harvest and some will be diseased. It is our task in caring for God's harvest to ensure that disease does not affect the whole crop. Never an easy task but one that needs to be done regularly and often. As God walks the field he will find much to do but fortunately he is able to deal with each plant individually ensuring that each will be able to come to fruit. Jesus parable of the sower with it's explanation (Mark 4) is a constant reminder of the dangers of sowing seed, but also of the need to care for the seed as it grows. God's love for each of us means that his will be no random sample but a long process of care for each plant growing so that each may produce it's best. For God is not interested only in those plants which produce a lot but as Jesus constantly remind us God cares for each one in our own special way.

Harvest Festival is a time when we should be looking at God's field and what will he find? Some long established activities have disappeared and rightly there is some sadness about this, but perhaps they have borne their harvest and it is time for a new seed to be nurtured. So God will find new activities for young people on Mondays and Tuesdays which continue the work so ably done on a Sunday morning. He will find our worship developing as we continue to explore ways of praising him with the musical talent he has set in our midst. Some familiar faces may have departed from our fellowship but God continues to restock our fellowship as he draws others in to work alongside us. Our committee structure, and more importantly our regular day of prayer for the work of the church, continues to develop allowing us to adapt to the changes that team ministry is bringing. These seeds sown some time ago must still be encouraged and nurtured by us all to enable us to walk in the paths that God has set for us. God is walking in his field to see what is happening to the seed he has sown, and he is looking to gather in his harvest. The months and years do seem to pass very quickly, but Jesus reminds us we will know neither the day nor the hour when God will come to gather in his harvest. Until that day comes, we can only ensure that the harvest gift we bring is worthy of the love and care that God gives to us. Please continue to pray for God's harvest in this place.

In the first week of August I returned to Felpham to take part in the Scripture Union Outreach. During the week there were all age events on the beach: a tide fight, family picnic, activity and outreach meetings, as well as events at the Church hall: barn dance, BBQ, quiz, and concert.

For the team each day began at 8.15am with Team worship, bible study and reports on the previous day.

During the week as the children followed the pirates progress to find the treasure they learned. a) Treasure can be friendships as well as things, especially a friendship with Jesus. b) When we are afraid we need to ask Jesus for help and it will make a difference. c) We have to choose which way to go, some things look easy but are wrong, some things are hard but right. Jesus shows us the right way.

d) When we know Jesus as our friend he gives us forgiveness and freedom from sin and guilt. e) Now e are free we need to grow as Christians and serve the king.



FEBARADIO NEWS

AN UNSTOPPABLE

After Easter the focus of the world's news media fell on the famine crisis in Southern Sudan. Barh al-Ghazal, the region most severely affected, is in the reception area for Feba's Dinka broadcasts launched 18 months ago. Feba's Norman Brierley and others involved. visited southern Sudan in April. In spite of war, drought, displaced persons and the ravages of famine reported elsewhere, the Gospel is having impact; the radio broadcasts are welcomed.

onditions in Southern Sudan have meant that Dinka Bishop Nathaniel Garang of Bor diocese of the Episcopal Church in Southern Sudan now operates from Kenya With Norman Brierley he made a trip to his home diocese, which has some 90 churches and 60 pastors. Their MAF plane landed at Paluar airstrip and Norman says, "People were tilling the ground, it had rained the night before and they were trying to turn the earth over." The Bishop told him, "Planting time is May and Jone... but there is no food; last year there was no rain in the area." The airstrip was cleared and people were expecting a United Nations food drop.

"It was an extraordinary scene when we went to Labone after Paluar, said Norman. "Yes, people came rushing to touch me," said the Bishop. This amazing turnout to welcome the radio party at Labone deeply impressed Lee de Young of Words of Hope, sponsors of the Dinka broadcasts. "Within a few minutes the crowd had multiplied to five or six thousand people—a great, joyous gathering, so much enthuslasm... These people thrive, although you can see that there is relatively little that they can use to sustain their life. They want to see everyone reached with the Gospel." Lee referred to a listener who said they see the radio broadcasts as a missionary to Khartoum (in the Islamic north of the country). "They have suffered so much and yet have a vision that the Gospel reach everyone and don't see why it couldn't. That seems an unstoppable hope," he added.

IN BRIEF THREE CHEERS FOR IRENE!

People support Feba in so many wonderful ways. But Irene Carter is tops! Earlier this year she swam 1,400 meters in a *Great Britain One Hour Swim-in*. Her efforts were sponsored and she raised £78 for Feba. She is a member of *Aylesbury Area Disabled Club*. Irene says able-bodied swimmers aged from 10 to 80 also take part in the event. She was allowed to stay on, although she is 80+ and has been doing this to help missionary causes since 1982. She suffers from polio and osteoporosis.

STORM DAMAGE, SEYCHELLES STATION

Exceptionally strong winds on Bank Holiday Saturday, 2 May, severely damaged homes and property in Seychelles, cut off power and tore off half the roof of Feba's transmitting station. With three 100kW transmitters exposed to the elements it was a race against time to cover the gaping hole with tarpaulins before it rained. Just 15 minutes after this task was achieved. it poured down! The Lord further answered prayer in that, in spite of damage to two antennas, the station was back on air as usual early next morning with just some loss of power to some transmissions.

'M" IS FOR

Mobilising

Ahoy Shipmates! We are nearing Jamaica as I write to you. Sailing is a time when I find myself taking time out to reflect on how are we doing with mobilising. Are we exciting Christians for evangelism and missions? Are we fulfilling the "M" for Mobilising in "METAL", the acronym for our ship ministry fivefold mandate?

Looking back from the aft -who have we mobilised?

We on board LOGOS II have recently spent six months ministering in eight Mexican ports. Thousands have seen their world vision expanding as we have shared in conferences on board. In one weekend conference, 80 came forward in response to a dramatic mission presentation. They eagerly crowded the stage, indicating that they wanted to go. Many of those still seated, realising missions is not a spectator sport, said they wanted to help those going by praying and financially supporting them. In each port we have up to 40 volunteers working alongside us on the ship. They receive mission exposure to catch a vision beyond their shores. Christina was one such volunteer in Acapulco who started to catch a vision of what God could do with her life. Her church has now sent her for two years of missions service on LOGOS II. Through these eight ports, 80 Mexicans have sent in 'first step' applications to serve with Operation Mobilisation. The Mexican Church is now sending her own missionaries, and we on LOGOS II are excited to have a part in this mobilising. Yes! We have mobilised.

Looking forward from the bow-who will we mobilise?

As we sail, I also find myself going to the bow of the ship and looking forward to the next six months in the Caribbean. A very different culture awaits us, but the same mandate—to mobilise the church to local and global evangelism. Thirty people eagerly await our arrival in the next port of call in order to come on board as volunteers. Will there be another Christina? We trust so. In addition, another 15-20 local believers will daily be mobilised in evangelism as they work with us in our 'Welcome On Board' programme. This newly-launched evangelistic event could reach 2-3,000 people a day. Yes! People will be mobilised.

Looking around on board-who are being mobilised?

Recently, during our regular Thursday prayer evening, we were interceding for the unreached in North Africa, Central and South Asia—some of OM's target areas, and for the millions of 'Children at Risk' around the world. After we had prayed, I asked who had a burden to reach out to the unreached in these areas. Around 40 of the ship's company of 200 stood. Gathering around them, we asked God to confirm their sense of call and open a door for ministry. Carla, from the Netherlands, is one of those who stood. She completes her two year assignment this August and is planning to work among street children in Thailand. There are others like Walter who did not stand but are still being mobilised as senders. Walter is planning to return to his home country, Argentina, to become the pastor of a mission-mobilising church. Yes! People on board are being mobilised.

Whichever way I look, beyond the aft, from the bow and around on board, my heart is filled with thanksgiving for what has happened, is happening, and will happen in mobilising God's people to complete the Great Commission.

 Thanks shipmates for being a significant part of this mobilising adventure.



Dear Friends,

As we write, we are coming to celebrate Harvest and share in a time of thanksgiving, but before we move on too quickly, we would like to encourage you to look at the resources that man has been given. The Harvest hymn says, "For His mercies aye endure, ever faithful ever sure," but do we believe it? As part of creation God gave to man every seed bearing plant and fruit for his food (Genesis 1:29), and he also gave all domestic animals, large and small (Genesis 1:26). In the restoration which followed the flood God renewed His covenant, "while the earth lasts seed time and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night shall never cease," (Genesis 8:22). God promises to bring the Israelites to Canaan, "a land flowing with milk and honey," (Exodus 3:17) and even in their desert wanderings He supplies all the people's needs, (Exodus 16:4). The Bible sees man as a 'resource-full' being, richly endowed by God, but there is a realistic awareness of poverty and deprivation which brings a special concern for the poor (Deuteronomy 24:19-21).

In the light of what we know today about the needs of the world and the ever widening gap between the rich and the poor in all areas of society and between nations, and the way in which we are exhausting the earth's resources of mineral deposits and fertile land, we could say that God has not provided for all our needs and that the claims "you will never live in poverty or want for anything," (Deuteronomy 8:9) are misconceived. However, the Bible is clear that God has more than adequately anticipated human needs. It is human greed and human mismanagement and above all the confusion of needs with wants which result in economic collapse and social chaos. Needs are finite, wants appear to be infinite. There are adequate resources to meet our needs but our wants create appetite that is insatiable and grows as it is fed.

Abundant resources and the proper stewardship of them enable us, not only to enjoy the resources but also to be grateful for them and to share them generously. We must never forget whom it is who gives so much to us for the greatest resource of all is God himself. Wherever you open the Bible, you will find men drawing strength from the certainty that God is with them. This is the conviction that determines the way they live. "Surely I will be with you," God assures Moses (Exodus 3:12), and in the Psalms we read of the total power of God in every situation of human need. Psalms 23, 40, 84 and 121 are just a few that celebrate the guidance of God and His protection for His people. In the New Testament, Jesus reminds us of God's provision, "therefore do not be anxious saying, 'what shall we eat?' or 'what shall we drink?' or 'what shall we wear?' Your heavenly Father knows that you need them all." (Matthew 6:31-32)

We are constantly reminded in the Bible that God himself is the GREAT RESOURCE and stewardship of resources which fails to recognise that God is there to strengthen, inspire and renew is like depending on the petty cash while having access to the vaults of the Bank of England. As we move forward from Harvest surely this must be our message to the world seeking to deal with the huge problems created by our mismanagement of all God has given.



A wonderful experience of being used by the Lord.

During his recent stay in hospital Douglas Pullen, a member of our church who worships with us each week at 8.00 am. had a wonderful experience of being used by the Lord. While recovering from his operation, a man was admitted to the bed next to his. This patient was given the news that he had cancer and reacted very badly to the extent that the doctors sedated him and told his wife that she should return later that evening. The man awoke from his sedation much earlier than expected and was still considerably distressed. Douglas began to talk with him and in conversation started to share the love he had found in Jesus. His words were very faltering and he did not feel he was able to express what he wanted to say. At this stage, however, although he continued to talk he knew that words and the voice were not his own but that he was being used as a channel to share Jesus' love. The man calmed down and remained calm when his wife returned to visit him. At the end of visiting the wife came to Douglas to thank him for all he had said to her husband. Douglas pointed out that it was not him but Jesus.

We do not know what has happened to this man since but we do know that Douglas has been used by the Lord to speak of Jesus' love in this situation. Only by being willing to begin the conversation and recognising his own weakness could Douglas be used in such a way. Children in need

"They shall not... bear children for calamity." Isaiah 65.23 (New Revised Standard Version)

ife can be very tough for Indian children. They are often forced to work like adults in harsh conditions to provide support for their family. Girls usually suffer the most as they are not considered to be as important as boys. This leaves them vulnerable to exploitation by ill-meaning adults, as the following stories show.

MALINI

When Malini was eight, her mother killed her youngest daughter and committed suicide. She could not stand the pressure of not bearing a son. Malini was left to care for her two other sisters and her father.

Her father had regularly battered his wife, often after he had gone out drinking. With her now gone, he turned his anger on Malini. After three years, she ran away to stay with relatives.

But life there was not much better. She was given shelter, but her relatives sent her to work in an aluminium factory from eight in the morning to six in the evening. They kept her wages and forced her to do all the housework every day. Eventually, Malini could take no more and decided to speak about it to her relative.

In return, he sold her for 5,000 rupees (US\$126) to another relative who again made her work hard and gave her little. He beat her and threw her out one day when Malini inadvertently lost the shopping money.

Malini was left helpless, lost and hurt with nowhere to go. Eventually, a local pastor took her to a crisis home where she was treated for her injuries. Although she is now a helper in the home, Malini has closed in on herself and refuses to learn anything. Her future seems bleak.

KAMILA

Kamila's father deserted his family of five when she was 14. Working at a local clothing factory for 10 rupees a day, she became the main breadwinner for the whole family. Her mother was ill and would often vent her anger on her children.

One day, a middle-aged man took an interest in Kamila. He would buy her food and give her presents. He also used to caress and fondle her, although Kamila thought he was just expressing his affection for her.

Eventually, he made her have sex with him. By then, Kamila had realised that she could use her body to obtain favours from men. Before long, she left her job at the factory and worked for the man, selling her body.

But one day her life came close to ending. A vicious client beat her up badly and left her half dead. She was rushed to hospital and was then taken to a crisis home as her mother refused to look after her. Kamila is broken physically and psychologically. She is only 16 years old and she has lost everything. She has a long way to go before society accepts her as a normal person. And Kamila's story is nothing out of the ordinary. There are thousands of girls around the world who sold themselves and ended up in similar situations.

I now understand what bearing children for calamity means. Children are supposed to be gifts from God, but they are made to feel the consequences of human selfishness. God wants an end to child suffering and will make this a top priority in the world order he wants to create.

As members of the body of Christ we are responsible for promoting this new world order. It is our duty to stretch out our hands in friendship and acceptance and bring hope and happiness to these children.

"If any of you put a stumbling block before one of these little ones who believe in me, it would be better for you if a great millstone were fastened around your neck and you were drowned in the depth of the sea." Matthew 18.6 (NRSV).

I feel this warning applies to those who ignore the stumbling blocks as well as those who place them. Christians have to address this issue now, before it is too late. •

ARPANA - A SPECIAL SCHOOL FOR SPECIAL PEOPLE

Arpana is a school run by the Church of South India in Bangalore for children aged five to 17 years who are mentally or physically impaired. Classes include children of different ages. They are taught basic arithmetic and writing skills, but also various art techniques, such as decorating egg shells, making thread pictures or shaping wood.

THE CHALLENGE

Society Director Sharon Norrish, "and we especially want to thank Christian Witness Ministries for lending us their stunning mobile stage. But this is only the first

step of a long

journey and it needs each and every Christian to get involved."

Platform for the gospel

It was the first national usage of the huge mobile stage, provided free of charge by Christian Witness Ministries (CWM). Paul Clarke, CWM Project Manager said they had purpose-built the huge Radio-1-style-roadshow truck in order to take the Christian message to where people are. The truck, he said, is "a vehicle to evangelise the nation up to the year 2000 and beyond. It's a mobile means of communication. it's not limited geographically and it will be a platform for the gospel. We will do gospel roadshows and go where people are. The idea of The Open Book is to bring alive the true story of the Bible to the ordinary man and woman in the street, and communicate God's Word in a way that they can understand -and that's what the truck is all about too."



I wonder how many of you have seen, or taken part in one of the great Shakespearean plays? Opening Worship led by The Revd. Ceri Lewis, Minister of Trinity U.R.C. The Worship and the Theme of the day was based on 1 Samuel 3 vv. 1-10. Listening for Gods call, maybe for three times before answering 'Here I am Lord'

In his introduction the Moderator announced that Christine Meekison (Synod Clerk) could not attend due to the very recent death of her mother. Diarrhoea claims 32 more lives

Diarrhocal diseases took a serious turn yesterday when hundreds of people afflicted by the disease crowded the medical centres in different parts of the country, reports UNE.

Health Directorate and ICDDR B a specialised hospital for treating diarrhocal patients, said 11.390 people reported with the disease yesterday. Thirty-two of them died.

Officials admitted many more afflicted by the disease in remote areas may not have resported to the incidical teams.

With yesterday's figure, the death toll in diarrheeal diseases rose to more than 400. About 3.22 linkh people were attacked by diarrhoea since midduly, according to official estimate.

Doctors and health workers feel that as the flood water receiling, water-borne diseases are spreading across the flood affected areas.

The ICDDR B in Dlinka said two patients died in its intensive care united.

Of the deaths, five were re-ported from Shariaipur, four from Sylhet, three from Ki-shoregang, two each from Kuri-

gram. Tangail, Mymensingh. Rangpur and Barisal and one cach from Comilla, Narail. Chiradanga, Sherpur, Narayangani, Nilphainari and Bogra districts.

All inficial of ICDDR.B told UNB that the rush of diarrhoea patients has increased with receding flood wrier. Some 250 to 300 patients are coming to the hospital everyday.

The however, said the highest number of, 917 patients on an average every day, were given freatment.

Doctors fear that there is a chance of the outbreak of the disease in an epidemic form after receding flood writer from the affected sreas if adequate measures to combat the disease are not taken immediately.

ICDDR.B has so far treated 9.686 patients in July, 21.512 in August and 15.955 patients till today in September.

The centre also recorded the death of diarrhoea related complications to 20 in July and 42 in August. The casualty figure for September was not available.

Food distribution 🖟 needs more attention: WFP

As the World Food Programme (WFP) launched its hislory for the country's flood victims, the UN body desires more speedy distribution of foodgrains, reports UNB.

"Government's performance so far is well-managed. How; ever, the distribution in field levels needs more attention and speed," said an WFP official in the city yesterday.

The official said WFP has already talked to senior; government officials in this respect and expects to meet the top aughorities to elaborately explain the UN's expectation.

At the suggestions of the WFP and other donors, the government has already decided to increase the vulnerable group feeding (VGF) cards to reach food to the most needy.

Some 1.9 corre people will be benefited by the WFP's "Emergency Assistance to Flood Victims" project with 3.55 lakh metric tons of foodgrains, mostly wheat.

The foodgrains costing more than 84 million US dollar will allow the vulnerable people to get food from the current month to January next either through

The work that we (my German colleague, Andrea Waldschmidt and I) have been doing this past year in Cameroon was: Continuing linguistic analysis of the Mboshi language, working particularly on a Mboshi~French dictionary,..as well as describing the grammar and tone in the language, collecting folk stories, etc.

This work was possible due to God's amazing provision of two Mboshi young men from Congo who were already_living in Cameroon before the war broke out in Congo.

The other activity in which I was involved was working with Cameroonians taking an SIL course called "Discover your Language".

This course helps equip students to develop good alphabets and produce literature, including Scriptures, in their languages.

Civil war broke out in Congo in June 1997. We had to leave but were warmly received by the Cameroon branch of SIL, and given accommodation and a place to work in Yaounde. The Congo war having finished in October 1997, we made a 3-week visit to Congo in May 1998.

Highlights of the year include:

- our visit back to Congo after the war. It was encouraging to meet up again with our friends, hear testimonies of God's faithfulness and see how people are picking up their lives despite the difficulties.
- Seeing the enthusiasm of Cameroonians as they "discovered their language" and realised that they too could help develop a writing system and encourage reading and writing in their language.

Setbacks or disappointments we have encountered:

- The civil war in Congo has been a massive setback for the country in terms of the economy and infrastructure, to say nothing of the loss of life and the on-going emotional scars it was hard leave behind our Congolese brothers and sisters in the war.

Family situation, including wider family:

God gave me a new "family" of friends, colleagues and fellow believers in Cameroon! It was great to be stable in one place all year.

Health:

I praise God for good health! A medical team visiting from the States told me that I had a low-level of infection with filaria, which meant 1 could treat it before developing any symptoms!

Support level:

Excellent, thanks to many of you reading this report!

Plans for the coming year:

Sept-Dec 1998: in England! I will be spending time with my family and supporting churches.

From Jan 1999: UNCERTAIN! There is a degree of on-going instability in Congo, exacerbated by renewed fighting 'next-door' in DRC (Ex-Zaire) Our centre remains empty following looting, and we do not yet know whether it will be possible to return to work in Congo next January...

House to House Survey Resu



We have visited so far 278 houses and have had 164 positive responses (in 4 homes 2 people were willing to respond), had only 39 refusals but sadly were unable to find anyone at home in 75 of our visits. 120 people had some religious belief, 31 did not and 17 were not sure.

Attending places of worship

40 people regularly attend a place of worship, 37 occasionally do, plus 54 at special times, and 37 never go to a place of worship.

Belief in God

When asked about belief in God, 89 people said they definitely believe in God, 34 said they believe in God but

are not sure, while 20 believe in God at times


Belief in Jesus Christ

11 were unsure how to answer.

14 people definitely do not believe in but not at others. God, while 11 were unsure how to answer.


Regarding Jesus Christ, 97 people believe he is the only Son of God, 33 believe he was a good man, 13 believe he was a


prophet, while 14 believe he was a myth or legend. Again,

In the latter put of the survey, we asked if people had a Bible in their house. We received 81 responses to this question, of which 77 were positive. 9 of those who replied read their Bible regularly, 45 occassionally, and never read their Bible.






17 of the 168 people we talked to expressed some interest in knowing more about Jesus and the Christian faith and these people have been visited by us or we have contacted the church to which they belong.

We received a total of 35 prayer requests, which ranged from world issues, mainly peaceful settlements problems, to family problems, mainly ill health.

Dear Friends,

There was a lot of talk going on, the new Emperor wanted to know how many people were under Roman control so that they could be taxed. The idea of a census in Israel was to bring Glory to God and maintain the Temple. Throughout their history, every other reason for a census had led to disaster and people could not see what glory to God could come from this head count.

It would be dangerous too, those opposed to Rome would employ all their terrorist tactics to disrupt what was going on and anyone seen to cooperate with any enthusiasm would be liable to future reprisals. So it was that poor Joseph set out on the long and arduous journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem. How could he best insure the safety of his new wife Mary as they journeyed through the dangerous hill country? Perhaps it would be best to be part of a large party but how could Mary keep up when the baby was about to be born? Maybe he should just stay where he was and appeal on compassionate grounds to the local centurion. Neither did he have any family in Bethlehem so there was no welcome bed at the end of their journey.

It had never seemed like this when the angel came to Mary. She had been afraid then but that was because she wasn't used to talking with angels. Now her fear was easier to explain, fear about leaving her home and family. Fear about the journey. Fear too about Bethlehem, which was after all a small place with not much room for strangers especially at a time like this when so many people would be on the move. It would be all right for her and Joseph; they could manage but what about the baby? Mary had heard so



many tales about having babies; some people tried to be comforting while others just seemed to go on about all that could go wrong. So Mary and Joseph set off with love for one another and trust in God who had promised such great things for the child about to be born.

The shepherds had watched people arriving: they looked tired and weary, dusty and dishevelled. They had come from all over to their little town of Bethlehem. Some had been robbed on the way and others were about to be robbed with the price of a room, but at least the shepherds could settle down on the plain. gathered round the fire where they could keep an eye on their flocks. The angels spoiled all that as the sky was filled with the Good News of the birth of God's Son and they were the first to know. They were the first who would risk their jobs, their livelihood and their reputations to go and see what had happened.

That's the remarkable thing about Christmas, it's about ordinary people who have their part to play in a very extraordinary event, the birth of Jesus. We shall all celebrate this birth again this year but before we surround it with the trappings of a fairy tale let us remember just what happened. Jesus came into an ordinary and yet real world. It's our world because not that much has changed. God did not create a special environment for his Son and nor does he today. Jesus still comes to make the ordinary special because God comes to be part of what we do. So this Christmas, Jesus waits to be born in your heart because to God you are an extraordinary part of his creation, like Mary and Joseph and the shepherds at Bethlehem.



Christmas cake started life as 12th Night Cakes More than 100years ago the rich fruit cake would be the centrepiece of the 12th night feast, one half of


celebrations.

World Church and Mission

Our church supports the main aid societies of Christian Aid and Tear Fund, being responsible for fund raising as well as promoting their activities. We also sell produce from the Third World under the Traidcraft label at realistic prices which means that the ordinary people involved in the production receive a fair wage for their work.

The World Church and Mission Committee, works to create dialogue wherever practical with churches overseas and with various Missionary Societies who are active throughout the world and to recommend prayerful and financial help where needed.

On a regular basis we also support The Leprosy Mission,



Missionary Aviation Fellowship and The Bible Society. We are also fully committed to the work of the Council for World Mission. which operates in

partnership with many churches throughout the world.

We have supported the building of a new church in the Ukraine, one of our church members going out to see the conditions there at first hand and our church recently sent a large donation towards the Flood Relief Appeal for Bangladesh.

There are two other main areas in which we are deeply involved. Firstly, we have a direct link with a

Presbyterian church in Ghana having regular contact with the minister. We have, over the years, contributed funds to help build a church, school and medical centre, even providing funds for the minister's bicycle! We also have a direct contact with the chaplain to Ghanaian students in London.

Secondly, one of our former members is working in Congo translating the Bible in to the local African dialect. Ruth Chatfield works with the Wycliffe Bible Translators and we support her financially as well as having regular updates on the situation in Congo.



Ruth is currently home on leave from Cameroon where she has been evacuated to avoid the troubles in the Congo. She is hopeful of returning to the Congo in January next year to resume her work.

This is just a broad outline of the work of our committee which is continually updated as new requests are received for our consideration. We find the work interesting and very challenging.


We are now in the middle of rehearsals for the Christmas pantomime. Some of us are still learning our lines and trying to remember our exits and see page 12.




