

Budget 2002

Budget 2002

The November 2001 Church Meeting approved the Budget shown opposite on page 9. As you will see I am once again seeking an increase in giving to guard against a deficit at the end of year, i.e. our income should be sufficient to cover our "running costs". It is essential that we meet this target. If we do not, our plans for Church and Manse repairs, required under the respective Property Surveys will be in jeopardy.

As you will see I am asking that you increase your giving this year by 9.3% - let's call it 10% for simplicity. I ask you once again to commit your giving to prayer. I have prayerfully calculated that the Lord is calling us to make a 10% increase, as a body. What do your prayers tell you? What increase is he calling you to make?

Last year I asked for a mighty 29% increase. Figures to date (the 2001 accounts are not yet complete) suggest that your response was around 18%. What can I say but - praise the Lord! Another increase of that order (is that what the Lord is asking of us?) would enable us to

contribute to the property repairs out of our weekly/monthly giving as well as meeting our regular costs.

Don't forget we need to have a Gift Day each year until repairs are complete. Our plan set a target of £10,000 per Gift Day. We raised £5,958 (including Tax rebates in 2001). This was a tremendous response, but £4,000 short of target. We need to pray about this aspect of our giving as well, if we are to meet all our commitments. We have a wonderful Church and we want to keep God's house in the highest state of repair. If we don't our ability to carry on His work could be endangered.

If you want to discuss any aspect of your giving please speak to me. I can advise you on the hows, but only God can help you with the "how much".

Gift Aid

I recently had the pleasure of a visit from the taxman (poetic justice?). As a result of that visit I need to remind all who have signed a Gift Aid declaration of the following:

If you have not signed a declaration, and you do pay tax please have a word with me. I am sure you would rather have the use of the tax you have paid.





Churches Together in Worthing Annual General Meeting

eoffrey Dean and I joined 36 representatives from 53 churches in Worthing who were present on this occasion.

The meeting was addressed by Dr. F. Tahzib, the deputy director for public health, for West Sussex Area Health Authority. His theme was: Health & well-being in the Worthing Community. The aim of his address was to enlist the support and help of the Christian Community in Worthing, to work alongside the Health Authority in promoting well-being. He began with citing six aspects of health: physical, mental, emotional, social, spiritual, societal. Of interest to us was a definition of spiritual health, which involves being "at peace with oneself"; a major determinant of (good) health was HOPE.

Health cannot be possessed it can only be shared - the health of my brother is relevant to each one of us.

Dr. Tahzib spoke of the value of being a good neighbour and cited the impact of cancer not only on the elderly but on the young and amongst youth — which involves coping, strategies and the vital support of family, carers and neighbours involving sufferers in a

re-appraisal of their lives finding core values leading to committal to God. Illness is an opportunity to learn - finding meaning in life and the Christian Community is strategically placed to meet these needs, which are seen as outside "the Health Service". Spiritually is a move from Theology because it involves healing and well-being. attendance involves Church relationships which contribute to support in need — often social need. His prescription for good health involved to his way of thinking "regular church attendance" the need to feed our inner being, because he believed that the purpose of God in creating man was to know his creator and attain His presence briefly put surrender, repentance, reconciliation- "my thoughts went at this point to the discourse of the Lord Jesus in John Ch 14-17). These are but jottings on a very able discourse -Churches Together in Worthing will seek to work out possible ways forward to put this perspective of health into practical terms. It was suggested one such way might be to form prayer groups to provide support for doctors' practices.

A Snapshot of life in the Congo

- Rev Beryl Chatfield

am unexpectedly writing this in Africa, because, having spent three weeks here with Ruth, my flight home last night was cancelled, due to an airport workers' dispute. I hope to get home in a day or two!

My time here has been in no way a 'holiday' in the normal sense, - but a 'life experience' - of a totally different existence, and one over which I shall ponder for many months. I have found it interesting and enjoyable and have coped well with heat, insects, French and different food, - any of which could have been a problem, so I thank God for that blessing.

The first week I was able to 'sit-in' on part of the workshop for Congolese Christians who are translating parts of Luke's Gospel into seven Congolese languages. Though in French, I was able to follow enough of the discussion to make it interesting. Ruth and I also ate main meals with these students, some of whom are Church Pastors. In the afternoons Ruth took me into the city centre, to see the river, and shopping in various markets.

The streets are full of street traders with small stalls selling anything from mangoes to toothpaste! - many of their wares laid out on the pavements.


The second week Ruth was in the Centre Office in the mornings, and I began painting some of the African flowers. We also had rain, some quite violent thunder storms & power cuts, so after six o'clock, (when it gets dark), - candles! - until power returned. In the city, roadsides are very rough, with deep, wide gutters, which makes walking quite hazardous! - and after rain it's muddy too! Taxis are cheap. 70p flat rate, and minibuses are packed full at 15p flat rate. (1000 Congolese Francs to the £1.00.)

During my third week, Ruth & I spent three days in a village. No electricity or piped water. (We took filtered water with us!) We ate meals with a family in a 'mud hut', but slept in a Church owned room with a shower fed from an underground cistern. Then it was back to Brazzaville & a return to England a day late. (NB. Flights out of Brazzaville were suspended indefinitely after I left.)



Beryl returned to the Congo to stay with Ruth for a few weeks during the autumn after Ruth's holiday in the UK. Many will know that Ruth works for the Wycliffe Bible Translators in Brazzaville, Congo.

Putting Gospel music on the radio

The Church of Jesus Christ in Madagascar is carrying out evangelism and education through a full-time radio station, the radio's chief editor, Solo Rene Ravoavison, told *Inside Out*.

"Radio is the best way of communicating in Madagascar, as many people can't read or write and don't have televisions or phones," he said. "it's a great way to promote health and education and preach the gospel."

Radio Fahazavana (Radio light) was set up in September 1997 with funds from CWM. Today, it has 17 full-time staff, including eight journalists, and 50 volunteers and broadcasts across Antananarivo, the capital.

Plans are to set up another church radio in the north-east of the country, in Sambava.

.. and the Pacific

weekly Christian radio programme in Papua New Guinea is telling the good news of the gospel and changing lives across the nation.

Rev Samson Lowa uses his 20 minute slot on the Radio Nati Broadcasting Commission to focus on the family. The programme is called Strength in the Family - Strength in Papua New Guinea. In other words, when you straighten out the home, PNG will become a strong nation."

One boy heard Lowa speaking about how God can use children to change the lives of their parents. When his father asked why he was so quiet, the boy replied, "You and Mum always fight, and when you fight I don't do well at school." He then invited his parents to listen to the show with him.

In the programme, Lowa pleaded with parents not to get drunk, and to resolve their conflicts. Afterwards the boy wept and said, "I believe this is our message, he is speaking to us," Later he wrote to Lowa to say that his parents were talking again and that his father had stopped drinking.

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Dear Friends

I am writing this letter after a week spent at Cliff College set in the middle of the beautiful Peak District. Sounds idvllic, but it was an incredibly intense time practically fitting a whole term into the space of a week, with long days, not much sleep and dodgy food. Despite this it proved to be a real time of blessing. I met, and had good conversations with people from all over the world who had come to study mission, they were drawn from such far flung places as; Sudan, Afghanistan, Tonga, Estonia, Poland, Sumatra, Kazakhstan and Leeds.

As they told their stories we began to realise that we share so much in common. The only difference that kept coming to the surface was that the church in the west has developed such a luke warm attitude to the faith. This is in contrast to many of the people of the two thirds world who seem to be so hungry to receive the word and accept the reality of Jesus as Lord and saviour. In many cases their lives, families, homes and jobs become! sacrifices to their faith.

There were about 50 students on my particular MA course. Some of the lectures were heavy and I heard words and concepts I had never heard before. Most lectures however were practical and gave great insight into

the state of the church in this country and its options for the future. One interesting fact was that since the 3rd century AD to this day the Christian population of the world has only varied between 32% and 37%.

The world has changed and continues to change at an ever increasing rate. A century ago a major change in society or technology would take decades to be achieved. In our age it can be a matter of months. Communication and transport has compressed the world and drawn peoples together, we can speak to any one anywhere at the press of a button. When we look at our churches they are not just stuck in another decade but some in another century. Many of our traditions have not only lost their relevance but their very meaning has been lost to memory. We in the church seem to be always one step behind society and therefore often lose our opportunities for mission.

But there is hope! In our age there is a renewed search for a spiritual element to life. A search for truth and meaning among all the technological advances and science speak. We seem to be in a period where all the philosophy has been done, scientific discoveries have slowed down. Having been unable to convincingly disprove the existence of God then perhaps we should begin (Continued on page 3)

Alzheimer's Society

Each year we name a charity we will support and this year it will be The Alzheimer's Society. So on 5th February Mr Peter Delamare and one of the Society's lady secretaries came to give us information of the help being given to the carers of those suffering from this debilitating disease. Peter is the chairman of the Worthing and District Society an area stretching from Littlehampton out to Henfield. We were surprised at the number of registered sufferers there were in this locality. Years ago nothing was done to ease the strain of those caring for a loved one suffering from Alzheimer's, but now people are trained as carers and can look after the patient for a few hours thus giving respite to those

looking after the invalid. A bus has been bought by the Society and trips are arranged to the Garden Centres and other places where lunch is taken for patients and their carers. Some money is funded by the Government but most comes from donations and fund raising events. I have a much loved brother who suffered in his later life from Alzheimer's Disease and it was distressing to see a person who had been so full of love health and vitality just waste away.

As always I end with an invitation to any male or female to join us at The Fellowship afternoons—our motto being 'To have a friend is to be one'



Commitment for Life (CFL)

t our January Church
Meeting I reported on a
letter we had received from
URC House inviting our
participation in CFL which is
the United Reformed Church's
own programme of working
with (mainly) Christian Aid to
enable local churches to play a
fuller part in tackling world
poverty.

This participation would not affect our ecumenical support through Christian Aid Week or responses to disaster appeals.

The programme integrates concern for the world's poor into the prayer and worship life of the local church and hopes to fulfil some of the Five Marks of Mission particularly in seeking to transform unjust structures of society. Current campaigns centre on third world debt relief and fair trades.


In practical terms this would involve for us:

- Involve a link person to lead our involvement,
 - (volunteer needed)

- Choose an overseas partner through Christian Aid, (in Zimbabwe, Palestine, Bangladesh, Jamaica)
- Relay decision to URC House.
- 4. Thereafter to grow in awareness about our chosen partners, praying for them, holding special Sundays, planning for regular giving, (this is expected to be 1% of personal income) supporting the two campaigns and generally promoting the programme.

NB Some pamphlets are available at the back of the church giving further details. At the church meeting it was decided to defer a decision as to whether we should support CIF by becoming partners, until members had more time to consider the proposal. It is now hoped to finalise our decision at the March church meeting, so please prayerfully consider how the church including yourself should go ahead.






As we pray for forgiveness we are reconciled with Christ, and with our neighbour. When we are reconciled we are blessed in the name of Jesus.





Ruth Chatfield in the Congo 14-16



Dear Friends

Easter is with us once again with all the joy and peace which surround our Risen Lord Jesus Christ, Spring flowers, hidden in the dark earth for so long but now blooming in a riot of colour, and the increasing length of each day remind us of the victory of Jesus over the powers of evil, darkness and death. We rejoice that God has the victory and that his Kingdom of love and justice will come to the earth. Once again, though, we open our newspapers or watch the news on television and wonder why such mayhem, violence and terrorism still dominate many areas of the world. Last month Andrew wrote about the need for today's society to rediscover God and at Easter it is also a good idea for us to rediscover the existence of the active forces of evil, or the Devil. if you want to put it in more personal terms.

We are not thinking about a small, red furry animal with horns and a tail - that was an excellent way for the forces of evil to make themselves appear ridiculous and, therefore, powerless. As we see when mobs of different religious persuasions burn each other alive, evil is anything but powerless.

Some of us have difficulty thinking about this subject because it makes us feel uncomfortable. That is another, very subtle way in which the forces of darkness exert their power and influence. It seems that to acknowledge the existence of evil as an active outpouring of the forces of darkness, or as the Devil if you prefer, is something Christians seem less and

less able to do. Recently there have been those who would prefer to see the inhumanity of different groups of people towards each other as something which, if everyone tried harder to be nice to each other, would disappear. The evil which we see stalking the earth today cannot be explained in those terms and this is why the season of Easter is the right time to think about such matters. On the first Sunday in Lent the Gospel lesson for the day is always one of the accounts of the temptation of Jesus at the beginning of his ministry. In Luke the passage ends with chilling words: "When the Devil finished tempting Jesus in every way, he left him for a while." The Devil was very real to Jesus as he tried to stop him doing God's will at every point in his ministry. The Devil works in many different ways, often through other people, using their human desire for power and influence to promote evil and suffering. The crowds which welcomed Jesus into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday had turned to a mob thirsting for his blood by Good Friday. That is not unusual even today, remember the violence of the Hindu and Moslem mobs towards each other. Perhaps also go back to last year to the violence of the mob of Protestants who tried to stop young Roman Catholic children going to school in Northern Ireland.

On Good Friday Jesus Christ met the active forces of evil, the Devil, headon and overcame them with love. The victory was won for us on the Cross where Jesus suffered and died to

enable us to come into a new relationship with God, despite our sinfulness and the way we are tempted and persuaded to sin by the Devil.

This is why it is so important to acknowledge the presence of active evil forces around us. The Devil wants to stop us living a Christian life in a similar fashion to the way in which he tried to stop Jesus doing God's will. We need to take that fact seriously. However, it is also vital that we know, deep within us, that there is absolutely no reason for us as Christians to be afraid.

Jesus overcame the active forces of darkness, the Devil, and if we follow him we, with his help, will also overcome those forces when they try to turn us from God's way. Easter is the time at which we especially celebrate God's victory through Jesus Christ. There is nothing for us to fear if we follow Jesus Christ. So, may each of us in our day to day lives know not only freedom from fear but also the joy, peace and love which come to us from our Risen and Reigning Lord. Wishing you a very happy Easter, with love and blessings,

He surprised us by saying that King Henry was a very musical man and wrote beautiful poetry.


We thoroughly enjoyed joining in by clapping and stamping our feet to the rhythm of the music.



MUM made it to Congo!


Here she is listening to a choir praising the Lord in one of Congo's languages:

She did really well with French, and the mosquitoes liked her too, but she stayed healthy throughout!

We pray that the translated Scripture portions in seven languages will not just sit on shelves, but will impact people's lives!



The Chronicle April 2002

It seems like a long time ago, but thanks to all of you who sent me Christmas greetings! Most arrived during January & February! It was good to hear from so many of you. I was able to spend Christmas once again with my friends in Cameroon and returned to Brazzaville in time to welcome Helga Müller, a Hungarian Wycliffe member who is here to work on the Teke dictionary this year. She is adapting well to life in Congo and has made a good start on learning the Teke language (it's complicated!).

Speakers of five Congolese languages came to a literacy workshop which we held in February to develop reading and writing manuals. These manuals are very important in setting out clearly the alphabet for each language, and they also provide a basis for literacy classes for those who already read and write French. There is still a lot of work to do, in terms of checking and finalising these manuals for printing.

We have just had a week of team meetings for fellowship and planning, and being renewed by the Lord. This took place in Pointe Noire (great beaches!) where our SIL colleagues Jean-Pierre and Alison work alongside three Congolese colleagues on the trade language. Our Congolese co-workers are growing in their understanding of the task of literacy and Bible translation and are gradually able to take more responsibility. This is a real answer to prayer!

Please pray particularly for Roch Beapami, as he prepares to move with his family back to his village in June, in order to start literacy classes in the Mboshi area. He is used to being part of the team in Brazzaville, but in the village he will be working more on his own. He will also leave a "hole" in the office in Brazzaville, although he will still come for visits and for workshops.

For the next three months, Andrea will be in Germany for rest and time with her family and church. Here in Brazzaville during April, we will be holding an evaluation course for new translators, and another Luke translation workshop (there's plenty more of Luke to translate!). I will need to juggle many tasks: teaching, translation-checking, administration, book-keeping, supervising Helga, Guy, Roch and Lydie (kitchen manger) We are pleased that SIL member Margaret Hill will be coming to lead the courses. Please pray for God to call and equip translators and for their support!

In May, Helga and Guy will be in Cameroon for a Dictionary workshop, after which a team from Congo, including myself, will go to Cameroon for a seminar on Using Mother Tongue Scriptures. We are grateful for these opportunities for further training for ourselves and for Congolese, and for the finances to make the travel possible.





Dear Friends.

As I write this poor old Sompting is having trouble with its teeth. We've had one of our folk become unrecognisable with a tooth abscess, another friend ended up as an emergency in hospital when his wisdom teeth had their own personal crisis and I have, at this moment in time, tooth ache. Hopefully by the time you read this letter all the pains and swollen faces will be a thing of the past. Sadly the tooth fairy doesn't seem to visit you once you are over 12 years of age. Perhaps she is ageist.

But pain is a sign that something needs changing. This has its spiritual counterpart.

At Pentecost the most wonderful change came upon the tiny Christian church as it sought to come to terms with the pain of losing Jesus a second time at the Ascension, and it began to grow under the powerful influence of the Holy Spirit. It occurred to me today, however, that perhaps the infant church found this hard. We always assume that Pentecost was so amazing that it swept folk along and so it probably did, but there must have been periods

when they wondered where the spiritual torrent was taking them and longed again for the quiet waters of spiritual mediocrity. Had they refused to change and sunk back into the sort of people they were in their pre Jesus existence at that point, I should not be writing this letter now

The changes the church world wide is undergoing also involve pain but, unless we change enough to be able to communicate the unchanging gospel to our changing world, there will be no minister of the Worthing Team penning a letter to the churches in the year 2102 because there will be no URC churches here to have ministers. So let us face change with courage and see in it an opportunity for progress.

The Holy Spirit is here to empower us just as he did the tiny infant church as they waited on Him in prayer. And just look what he did with that tiny, struggling band of people!



with education at all levels including adult skills and a training programme for nurses in a Christian environment. A very high standard has been achieved producing high officials to run the country. India has the largest growing IT sector in the world, lack of computers makes modern communications slow. It was suggested that our computers, which in industry are renewed every three years, be sent to India for their use.

Lomas House was on the agenda. Rev Peter McIntosh spoke about the renovations taking place and new jobs and new staff settling in creating a retreat for work and prayer.

This year the URC is thirty years old. Much has been achieved. Let us pray that this continues in this our twenty first century.

Living with unfair rules

A small village in Ghana, two hours' drive from Accra, may seem a far cry from the world of transnational corporations and international trade rules. Yet as international trade has continued to grow over the last few years, the people of Agbazo have had their lives turned upside down.

Ama Kale and her husband Samuel have seven children aged between 15 and eight months. They used to farm land which Samuel's family had rented for many years. Then one day the owner sold the land to a company exporting pineapples and papayas to the UK and Germany.

The director of this company didn't trouble to give the tenant farmers any notice – he simply came and destroyed all their crops. Although this was illegal, the farmers were too poor to take him to court. The consequences for the Kale family were devastating. Ama says: 'We didn't have enough food to eat. I had to sit by the roadside and beg. I used the money to buy soap to wash the children and porridge to feed them.'

Fortunately for the Kales, Christian Aid's partner the Development Action Association (DAA) was

working in their village. DAA's main work is supporting food production, and they provide small loans to help people start making a living. In particular they help people like Ama, who have been thrown off their land, to find new ways of earning an income.

For Ama, DAA provided training and a small loan. She used this to buy maize flour to make 'kenkey', a fermented dough which is eaten with fish or sauce. She sells her produce in the village and makes a small profit of around 60 pence per day.

When the Kales first lost their land Samuel had to go to Accra to find work. But now he is back in the village and works as the local handyman. With his sister Mary he has bought machines to grind cassava and maize, which they rent out to villagers.

Since DAA has been working in Agbazo there has been a marked increase in the confidence of the women as the loan scheme has enabled them to provide for their families. They are now planning new projects, such as growing mushrooms and making oil.

What do you know about... scales?

- The simplest form of weighing scales 'the equal-arm balance' was first used by the Egyptians around 2500 BC.
- Today's laboratory scales can measure amounts of material to the nearest microgram (one millionth of a gram) – but they have to be kept at a constant temperature to do so.
- Accurate scales are commended in the Bible: 'A false balance is an abomination to the Lord, but an accurate weight is his delight' (Proverbs 11:1).
- In Shakespeare's 'The Merchant of Venice' Portia tells Shylock that his
 fate depends on the total accuracy of the scales: 'If the scale do turn/But
 in the estimation of a hair Thou diest, and all thy goods are
 confiscate' (4:i).
- Scales feature on Christian Aid's trade badge, highlighting the imbalance of global trade.
 The figure to the right reminds us that the imbalance is the result of human rules; but it also gives us hope, because people are the solution – we must all take action to help tip the balance of trade in favour of the poor.



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

Dear friends.

Sussex has been the home to many famous characters, some that were a credit to the area and some that we would probably like to forget about.

One such character on the credit side was King Canute, (AD 994 - 1035).



As a young man he gave up plundering and pillaging and started valuing the territories and the people under his rule. He became so highly regarded and gained such authority, that the rumour spread that even the forces of nature would obey him. So was laid the foundations of the story that has brought Canute to the attention to every schoolboy and schoolgirl through the centuries. The story goes that he took his throne to the seashore and commanded the incoming tide to stop. We all know that it did not and Canute got very wet feet. He did this, we are told, to prove that he did not have authority over Gods creation and there was some one far more powerful in control of the earth than he!




Before we once again boarded our coach for home, we were invited, along with everyone else to enjoy a cup of tea and biscuits, which was most welcome.



The group is very full and we have a waiting list. The majority of our children come to us through recommendation, which is very rewarding for us.



Women's work

Career-wise, it sounds like a bad move. The hours are long and the wages low. You'll travel a lot, and you'll pay your own fare. Or walk. You'll be a preacher, health worker, social worker, and lots more. **Rev Margaret Kalaiseivi** reports on India's Bible Women

SEVENTY PER CENT OF INDIA'S population live in rural areas. Administering to their spiritual (and earthly) needs is a massive job.

Most of that job is done by church Bible Women and Catechists.

It's hard work, and only the multi-skilled need apply.

The Bible Women meet people of all levels; they visit the sick and reach out to the poor and the down-trodden; they act as counsellors and community workers; they conduct services - in fact, they do whatever needs doing for whoever needs helping.

Their main role is to tell people about the ministry of Jesus Christ. But the nature of this kind of work is that it cannot remain solely spiritual or religious: it becomes rather an integrated mission that has to involve other social, political and economical dimensions.

So when they meet a sick person, they don't just offer prayers - they offer help, such as by ensuring they get proper medical treatment, or they provide assistance in getting poor children into schools.

The Bible Women and Catechists see this as more than social work. For them, this is building communities and is the real work of mission.

No record

Tracing the history of the Bible Women is hard because of the lack of records. In 1949, the World Council of Churches asked the Christian Council of India and Pakistan to collect data for its Amsterdam meeting, which led to a study project on women workers in the Indian churches. But much of this information quickly became redundant, as there were changes in later years depending upon the policies of the various traditions and denominations.

Some patterns have emerged, and each diocese in South India now has between 20 and 25 Bible Women. The women don't do it for the money. Wages are low compared to what other church workers are paid, and many of the women get no expenses or travel allowances. Each woman has to cover a minimum of five villages. They travel long distances and walk mile after mile to preach the gospel.

I am working as an honorary assistant pastor in four villages in Madurai Ramnad Diocese. There is one Bible Woman and one Catechist working with these people. Working alongside these women gives me many insights into the nature of mission. They do important work, and we need to honour them and encourage them.

And we also need to document and investigate their role and the contribution they make to the work of the church. This will involve:

- Taking stock of the contributions made by women in the churches throughout the history of Christianity starting from the early church;
- Conducting a complete survey of the employment conditions of Bible Women in the mainstream churches;
- Networking and organising women workers in various churches:
- Maintaining proper records in official church documents of who these women are and what they do;
- Recognising and respecting their hard work by paying them a fair wage;
- Making provisions for them to undergo short-term training on basic theological education in a recognised institution.

These women are undervalued by the church. They have a lot to teach us about serving Christ. It's time their work was given due recognition.

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from the Manse ... Rev Andrew Sellwood

While I was at college there was a subject on the timetable that intrigued me, it was Christian Apologetics in the early church. Was this to teach people how to say sorry in church? For instance; I'm really, really sorry I didn't realise this was your seat, sorry. No, of course it wasn't about this. In the first century of the Christian churches life there were a group of people going round called apologists, Justin Martyr being the greatest. Because of a general misunderstanding of Christianity and the slander that resulted, there arose prominent Gentile Christians who wrote apologies in defence of the faith. Their main task was to defend Christianity against the false charges of atheism, cannibalism, incest, human sacrifice, indolence, immorality, abduction and other antisocial behaviour. I wonder if that list surprises you or even shocks you? Misunderstandings arose about Christianity because it was easier for society to criticise than to find out what it was all about. Christianity was a minority activity and mysterious to those outside. Christians were thought to be very odd and didn't fit in with the rest of the world.

Coming right up to date I wonder how far things have moved on? Are we inclined to apologise about our faith or are we prepared to defend it? Nearly 2000 years after Justin Martyr we are still a minority group in this country, and people who have had absolutely no contact with church see us as odd. But in this nation instead of persecution we are treated with apathy.

I think it is time we ask ourselves two fundamental questions. First, why is our church here? That's easy it is primarily a place of worship, a place where people are made welcome and are free to meet with God. Second, what should we be doing? That's easy too, we should be serving the Kingdom of God, ministering and witnessing in the name of Jesus. I now ask a third question, this one is perhaps harder to answer: How are we fulfilling those two roles?

From time to time in the church we are given the chance to review our current situation. We need to take these opportunities to seek God's will for our future. We need to put our own personal desires to one side and allow God's spirit to renew us. My prayer is that we rise to the challenge of the future in full confidence of God's plan of salvation for the world. With this in mind are we a sorry church or a confident defender of the faith.



Why the church is failing young people



Faith training:

Kim Hwa Jung slates the church for failing to tackle growing spiritual and social apathy among youth.

Intil recently, the Korean church was proud of its growing number of young Christians. A declining interest in religion was a problem for the West, not Korea. But now, the church is experiencing something it thought would never happen: young people are leaving.

In the 1970s and 1980s. Christian youth were in the front-line of the fight against dictatorship and injustice in Korea. Today, though, they think they have nothing to fight for as they can't see the new forms of exploitation that are invisible to society.

These are mainly the result of globalisation and modern technology. The gap between rich and poor keeps on increasing in Korea; small farmers are committing suicide because of heavy debt burdens; pollution is becoming a serious problem. The church, meanwhile, only focuses on church growth and preserving spirituality amid the world's chaos. Young people who expected to find the answer to modern life in the church feel that it has become old fashioned, with old traditions and worship.

It's been left behind by the world. They find it boring, while the world seems full of exciting things.

Caste oppression

In India, church youth are still in bondage to the caste system, as I found out when I was over there with CWM's Training in Mission programme in 2001. One day, I met a group of Christian youth who'd come for a retreat before their confirmation service. One girl from the group was always alone and didn't mingle with the others. I asked why, and was told, "She's from a Dalit family."

The caste system - with the Daiit untouchables at the bottom of the social ladder - is still alive among young Christians. I already knew this to be true, but never wanted to believe it. As Christians, we believe we are one in Jesus Christ. Jesus said, "Love your neighbour," and, "Love your enemy."

One Indian pastor proudly told me that his church sends missionaries to North India to spread the gospel. I asked, "What's the use in sending missionaries to convert other religious people to Christianity? Isn't that just going to give them the same experience of segregation, but now within the church?"

While with Training in Mission in South Africa, I was shocked to see how HIV/Aids was devastating young people - Christians and non-Christians. In Kuruman, a mainly rural area, the cycle of poverty was pushing youth to despair. They had no jobs or education, leading them to drugs, crime and promiscuous sex. Teenage pregnancies and Aids were common.

In Cape Town, I came across similar problems. One church youth group told us they found it hard to resist their friends who tried to pull them into "the world". Indeed, the secular world seemed so much more interesting than the church.

I met young people who didn't go to church who asked me what difference my faith made to my life. One young man said he used to be a Christian but had given up when he'd faced tough times and not had an answer from God. Now he believes in no-one, he said. I could see his deep loneliness and despair.

In each instance, what was the church doing? Couldn't the Korean church challenge young people not to focus so much on material things, instead of just thinking about church growth and building new churches? In India, why was the church allowing young people to prolong the caste system? In South Africa, couldn't the church do something about Aids, despite it being a taboo subject?

The church can't shut the door to the outside world. Jesus tells us to go into the world and preach the good news.

CWM churches need to challenge each other to more effective mission. They need to encourage narrow-minded churches to deal with problems and push CWM to broaden its mission. We need to shape our young people into God's agents to transform the world.



Dear Friends

The meeting at which the Task Group presented their report took place a few weeks ago now and I think most of us are still digesting its findings.

This is not the place to discuss the issues but one thing has become clear and that is the real feeling that the Spirit was moving among us on that Saturday. Some of you perhaps less directly involved, from St Andrew's and Sompting,

have told me that you also felt it. To me this suggests that we are all becoming empowered with the Spirit, not only the churches facing possible changes but also St Andrew's and Sompting as they play a vital role in giving stability and

prayerful support right across the Team. We are at the beginning of exciting times which will stretch us all as we ask for God's guidance and grace.

As I write this letter at the beginning of August. Norman and I are looking forward to visiting the St Columba's Brownie Pack at their camp in the New Forest. As a former Cub Scout Leader myself it evokes all kinds of memories from being thoroughly lost on a hike and depending on the Cubs to get us back to camp (which they did very successfully) to playing wide games in which the best policy was often to climb a tree to remain hidden. (Where else could reasonably sane adults climb trees and not be thought eccentric at the very least?)

Going to camp, whether with Cubs, Brownies or older Guides and Scouts is not only an exhausting experience but one in which we learn a lot. mostly about ourselves and how much we take for granted in ordinary life. At camp life gets down to basics. With no electricity, no television, no fridge or freezer and no hot water we begin to live with much more respect for our immediate surroundings. When it starts to rain and the fire begins to go out we realize that if we want any dinner we must keep the fire going. With no fridge or freezer we understand the importance of keeping the food properly covered and maybe. in a heat wave, even storing it in waterproof containers in a stream. When we cannot turn the tap on for

hot water a certain amount of forward planning must take place and with every drop of hot water being heated over the fire none is ever wasted.

The fire is the most important part of a camp under canvas. It gives heat to cook with (and to dry wet boots with!), hot water to wash with, and a certain amount of light at night so the site is not pitch black, even if the fire is dampened down. It is the main power supply for all the people camping. In a way we can look at God like that - God being the main power supply for the life of a Christian. God provides us with good, hot, spiritual food so that we grow and develop in the faith. If we have the ready supply of a regular prayer life then the "hot water" which we may need if we get hurt and have to clean a wound is already there. Even in the darkest times when God seems a long way away we do retain some light although our awareness of God may be damped down by pain or suffering. The enormous energy of the fire can also remind us of the magnificent energy of God.

So, however you have spent this August, on holiday, at camp or at home I hope it has been a time of refreshment and renewal for all of you.

RUTH's CHAT

(from the FIELD)

No.29

Congo-Brazzaville

July 2002



Dear friends,

Today is "ville morte" (dead town) because of local elections - no vehicles are allowed to circulate and most people are just staying at home (it's also World Cup final day). So I'm seizing the opportunity to write to you...

Brazzaville has been vulnerable in recent weeks. An attack on part of the city by rebel soldiers in mid-June was quickly quashed by government forces, but it led to insecurity, people fleeing parts of town and others taking advantage to loot. We also had a series of elections and have been warned that things may remain unstable until mid-August. We are thankful to God for the relative calm here in the centre of town, and that we are able to continue with our work.

Andrea returned to Brazzaville on 20th June after three months in Germany, looking

definitely more relaxed after good times with family, friends and churches. I was glad to see her back and thank the Lord for supporting me through the three months of her absence.

Since I last wrote completed a successful translation workshop on chapters Luke 22-24. helping translators from five languages to express clearly and naturally the meaning of each verse. A hiahliaht was hearing Scripture songs using the translated verses, which the teams had composed using traditional music from their culture.

ln Mav we took delegation of Congolese pastors to Yaoundé. Cameroon, to interact with church leaders from five other countries. consider the role and use of Mother Tonque (MT) Scriptures. (In the middle of the seminar, I celebrated my 40th birthday with my Cameroonian family and some SIL friends!) Here are some quotes from the seminar participants:

This seminar has belped me in a very personal way. For the first time in my life I have started praying to God in my own language instead of French.

> I see now how the MT Scriptures are one of the main means for us to reconstruct our African churches and give them a firm foundation.

I was particularly interested in seeing how easy it is to memorize Scripture in my own language. We have always found it hard to do in a foreign language.


Up to now I always thought I needed to praise God using music that has come from the West. On this seminar I learned to use our own tunes to make Scripture songs. This is new and exciting!

Roch Beapami has now found a house in his village (Boundji) and will move there with his family in July, to start literacy classes and promote the Word of God in Mboshi. As well as literacy materials, he will take with him Bible portions in Mboshi, and cassettes of an evangelistic message in Mboshi with some Mboshi songs.

In the meantime, Andrea and I are supervising two dictionary projects at the Brazzaville centre: Helga Müller (short-termer) is working with Tekes on the Teke dictionary database, and Guy Kouarata is working with Beembes on the beginnings of a Beembe dictionary.

You may remember one of previous mv praver requests for more workers. We are pleased that there are now several Wycliffe members interested in coming to join us in a year or two, and also that the **Phillips** family (John & Elisabeth + their two girls who worked for some years in Congo before the war) plan to return to work here in a year's time. It is a huge encouragement to have some experienced help to look forward to! ©

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Dear Friends

Traditionally in our churches at this time of year we give thanks to God for the wonders of creation as we celebrate Harvest Festival. In the words of the hymn writers, as thankful people we will sing about ploughing the fields and scattering the good seed on the land and we will raise the song of harvest home. We will give thanks to God for all that he has given us and for the way he sustains us day by day. However, part of our Harvest celebrating is an acknowledgement of the part that we are called to play. God gives us the things of the earth and also the skills to use those things. We are called upon to use those God given gifts, to look after and nurture created order so that all peoples may be nourished and sustained.

The writer of the letter of James (generally thought to be James the brother of Jesus) wrote of a harvest of goodness that will be produced by the actions of conscientious peacemakers. 'A harvest of righteousness is sown in peace for those who make peace.' [James 3:18] He points out that goodness is a natural product of peaceful living. As believers, once again we have a part to play for we are called to be peacemakers (Matthew 5:9) and, if we sow in peace, we will surely raise a harvest of goodness that will be better than we have ever experienced.

At Harvest Festival time we give thanks and praise to God for the

wonders of nature, the crops, our food, our drink and all the good gifts around us that are sent from heaven above; and, as we celebrate, we remember that the God of creation and harvest is the God on whom we can depend for everything. who are called to be sowers of God's perfect seed and harvesters of his word can place all our trust and hope in him. As Paul put it in Galatians, "Let us not grow wearv in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvesttime. ifwe do not give up." [Galatians 6:9]

A few weeks ago a friend and I sat by the side of the river Arun enjoying a leisurely day fishing. However, my leisure soon turned to panic as, to my horror, a large fish took my rod and reel out into the fast running stream. Fortunately all was not lost, my friend reacted quickly by casting his line out and landing not only my rod and reel but also the offending fish. A lesson learnt not only in the art of fishing but also in our Christian endeavours. If we are alert and prepared to play our part when opportunity calls we will reap a successful harvest.

So as we celebrate Harvest let us not grow tired or get dejected instead let us persevere and strive forward in our Lord's work.



Tuesday Fellowship "A visit to the Congo"





Lomas House Developments



LOMAS HOUSE resembles a building site. The work taking place to produce a facility worthy of the vision and purposes behind it, is extensive. Inevitably unforeseen technical and practical difficulties have occurred which have extended the time envisaged to complete the refurbishment, which means it will now be towards the end of January 2003 before the house opens its doors to its new life.

Preparation of programmes

In the mean time a full programme of retreats, events, and courses covering the whole of 2003 is being prepared to be published in October. The programme details the kind of place Lomas House will be, the nature of its retreats and quiet days, the content of its courses and events. its booking procedures and costs, distributed to every congregation and district within the Synod. Despite no official publicity having yet been made, several congregations and church groups have already made bookings for their own purposes and requirements. which is encouraging. I hope this congregation and individuals within it will also want to make use of Lomas as we seek to become more faithful and effective in our witness to the world.

Staff

Staff, required to run and service a House of this nature in a way that is both efficient and caring, are also being prepared during this time, not always an easy task as previous practices and routines are challenged and changed. Additional staff are being recruited, and a secretary will be in place from the beginning of October to be responsible for the processing of all enquiries and bookings, anticipated when the programme is published.

Residents

The six residents have not found this period of transition easy either, and considerable pastoral and practical care has been rightly necessary to ensure their safety and well being, including the provision of 24 hour, seven days a week staff cover.

Prayers

There is always costly 'cross' required to bring about any genuine and lasting resurrection or renewal. In this period of cross, Lomas House, and those who live and work there require and value your prayers. Each Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings at 10.00am, twenty minute prayers are still said for its life now, along with the church it seeks to serve, and the world in which it lives. Resurrection will come,' and by God's good grace it will be a wonderful thing to behold to His glory.

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Dear Friends

Jesus said 'I am telling you the truth: a grain of wheat remains no more than a single grain unless it is dropped into the ground and dies. If it does die, then it produces many grains. Who ever loves his own life will lose it.' John ch 12 verse 24. The scene is Jesus' house in Nazareth.

The springtime sowing has long past and it is now Autumn. In a dark corner of the house on a wooden shelf, Jesus comes across a tiny grain of wheat stuck in a join between two planks. The grain appears perfect, but Jesus knows that unless that grain of wheat is put into the ground where it will undergo the violent and transforming act of germination, it will remain a solitary grain.

I feel this is a parable for all the churches of the Worthing Team. Jesus chose the word 'die' deliberately. The Christian life is all about dying to ourselves and our own private agendas, our own little church comfort zones of mutual entertainment and socialising. As I look at our churches I see tremendous potential for growth in a way that could be attractive to people of the 21st century. I also see however that there is the possibility in all our churches to turn them into little grains of wheat left on the shelf in

warmth and comfort. One day they will shrivel to so small a compass, that death will come to them anyway. But death in this sense will not lead to wonderful new life. No! it will be terminal.

Naturally the grain of wheat shrinks from death in the earth. Even so every church community finds it very hard to constantly be seeking to bring the gospel of Christ to those outside the church. However if this is not top of our agenda then there is little hope for our continued life. God constantly brings his people to Kadesh Barnea, shows them the promised land and leaves them to choose life or real death. [Numbers ch 13 verse 25, chl4 verse 22, Hebrews ch 3 verse 11]

As I leave the Worthing team to retire may I encourage each church to put evangelism and Christian nurture to the top of the agenda, and the central churches to be prepared to fall into the ground and die in order to rise to new, vibrant life. God bless you all. Your friend and minister,

Electrical safety in the church

How many cups of tea or coffee do you make each day?

When you think about how much you use your own kettle, it's not surprising that the kettles at Church get worn out fairly quickly! We all use electrical equipment at home everyday of our lives, whether it be the radio or television; microwave or vacuum cleaner; the toaster or the kettle. In a public place where there are a lot more people about through the week, there is a much greater demand on the equipment than there is at home. It is important then, to be aware of the dangers associated with Portable Electrical Equipment. Just a minute!

What is Portable Electrical Equipment?

Well, Portable Electrical Equipment is anything electrical that can be moved around from place to place like kettles, vacuum cleaners or extension leads. Also stuff that perhaps doesn't get moved very much but could be moved if necessary like photocopiers, microwaves and televisions. Generally anything that has to be plugged into the mains can be classed as Portable Electrical Equipment.

So what are the dangers?

Damaged electrical equipment can cause electric shock which can kill. Damaged equipment can also cause fire. So spending a few seconds checking the outside of the equipment and its lead and plug, can prevent accidents and save lives.

"95% of faults or damage can be found just by looking"

(HSE Guidance note IND(G)236L)

What should I be looking for?

Before using anything electrical, remember that it may not be safe, so unplug it and have a quick look at the lead, the plug and the equipment itself. Remember the chances are that it has been used by a lot of people since the last time you used it, and something may have gone wrong.

- Look for damage to the mains cable e.g. nicks and cuts; use of taped repairs or joints; any chaffing or abrasion.
- Look for damage to the plug

 e.g. cracked casing; bent pins; signs
 of overheating like blackened pins or
 discoloration of the case.
- Look for damage to the appliance e.g. obvious loose parts or signs of overheating.
- Make sure that you can't see the coloured insulation of the internal wires of the mains cable where it enters the plug or the equipment and that the cable is gripped properly.

If you can't find anything wrong, then there is nothing to worry about. If, however, something appears to be damaged in any way, don't use the equipment. Please let me know asap and remove the equipment from service so that it is no longer a danger to anyone and it can be repaired.

This is all very basic safety information but the Law says that it's the responsibility of *EVERYONE* to help prevent accidents.

We were all spell bound and could have listened much longer. We just hope that Molly will visit us again.


Meeting 8 October Neighbourhood Watch





Walk Peninsular Isle of Grain, Kent 14 - 22 September by Ron Flashman

Saturday 14th We left Worthing at 7.45 am and arrived at Stoke, a few miles north of Rochester for registration at 10.00, followed at 11.45 by a short sending out service. We were then driven most of the way to Cliffe Woods walking only the last 4 miles. (usually we walk a long distance with full pack of about 30lbs) The rest of the afternoon was spent getting to know each other, and in the evening we were invited to a curry supper with a group of Christians and non Christians. Sunday 15th We started our day at 6.00 am for our own private devotions. After breakfast we had time together for prayer and Bible study, followed by the morning service. Monday 16th We took assembly in the local primary school and were given a good reception. Some of the children wanted to talk but they were moved off to their next lesson. This was followed by calling doors in the village. We were generally well received and gained a great deal of blessing from it. In the evening we had an evangelistic meeting and fireworks in the primary school grounds. A local Christian band played, and a talk given by our chief evangelist Rev Daniel Cozens, which was well received.

Tuesday 17th Today was spent on more house calls again was well received and had many blessings. In the evening myself and three others stayed at the church for a drama by the young people. Unfortunately it was poorly attended.

Wednesday 18th Our last morning at the Emmanuel Christian Centre. We did not do any mission work as such, but we had a de-briefing session with the church elders. After lunch we moved from Cliffe Woods to Cliffe, had lunch at the Rectory, met the new team members and spent the afternoon getting to know each other and planning our programme. I visited the local Cub Pack and led prayers.

Thursday 19th Most of the day spent door knocking. Again a good reception. Had lunch with local pensioners again good reception. Supper today I was with the church bell ringers.

Friday 20th Again started day with prayer at 6.00 am. After our Team time and breakfast we were out again knocking on the doors for the duration of the morning. After lunch we had games on the green with two classes from a local primary school including about 20 children from Chernobyl in Russia. The children mixed well despite not being able to speak each others language. In the evening I went with two others to the Scouts where I gave a talk and testimony which finished about 8.30 pm

Saturday 21st Started the day with prayer breakfast followed by more house calls. After lunch I took time off from calls to prepare for next day's Bible study. This was followed by the village annual wheelbarrow race and a 'night of colour' with Daniel where he spoke about is painting and gave his own testimony. He said that before becoming ordained into the ministry, he was a professional artist. He does these night colours on a regular basis all over the country.

Sunday 22nd The last day of our 'walk', and all feeling the strain, as most of the days had been very long. After Bible study and prayer we took part in the local church service, St. Helen's in Cliffe. Daniel was the preacher. The service of Communion was followed by the healing service of prayer which I took part in. After the Service we were joined by the other teams and all enjoyed a barbeque. A decommissioning service then took place on the local green outside the church. We left the Peninsular at about 3.30 pm and most of us feeling pretty completely exhausted!

Smiling is infectious, you can catch it like the flu. When someone smiled at me today, I started smiling too.

I passed the corner, and someone saw my smiling grin, when he smiled, I realised, I'd passed it on to him.

I thought about the smile, and then realised its worth, a single smile like mine, could travel round the earth. If you feel a smile begin, don't leave it undetected.

Let's start an epidemic quick and get the world infected.

100 years of the Gospel

The CWM-member United Church in Solomon Islands marked 100 years of the good news of Christ in its area with a week of celebrations in May. Celebrating God's Love was the theme for the week-long event, which commemorated the arrival of Australian Methodists in the western part of the country, where the church is based. The festivities began with the opening of a centenary building in Munda.

Solomon Islands prime minister Sir Allan Kemakeza made his first official journey outside Honiara to attend the celebrations.

"The United Church has sustained our human and spiritual resources,

"The United Church has sustained our human and spiritual resources, especially during times of conflict and disaster," he said.

The country is in turmoil following violent ethnic tension in June 2000.

The economy, law and order have broken down because the government has no money to pay state workers such as teachers and the police.

Converting the Chinese

A Congregational church in New Zealand is bringing Chinese people to Christ through teaching English via the Alpha course on Christianity.

Three Kings Congregational Church, Auckland, which is part of the CWM- member Congregational Union of New Zealand, started the course in 2000 under the guidance of church member John Eccles. Having completed a programme to teach English as a missionary to Japan, Eccles used his skills to redesign the Alpha course after his trip to Japan fell through. Eccles said: "Fifty thousand people come to New Zealand each year, mainly from Asia. They want to study English, so we offer this to them and teach them about Christianity at the same time." The course has 40 students, a fifth of which may become Christians.

Most are well educated, often doctors or accountants. Yet the course has to teach Christianity from scratch, Eccles said. "The Chinese are atheists. They've been taught there is no God."

Alpha is a popular course teaching the basics of Christianity in 15 sessions. It was started by the Anglican Holy Trinity Brompton church in London, UK.

SHE HAS SINCE BEEN KEPT AT KIBI HOSPITAL MORTUARY – SHE WAS FIRST SENT TO TAFO FOR ONE WEEK - BECAUSE THE MACHINE WAS NOT IN GOOD ORDER I REMOVED HER FROM THERE TO KIBI. SHE WILL BE AT THE MORTUARY FOR FORTY-FIVE (45) DAYS EXCLUDING THE ONE WEEK SPENT AT TAFO - I HAVE TO PAY OVER ONE MILLION CEDIS ON THE MORTUARY --THE BODY WOULD BE REMOVED FROM KIBI MORTUARY ON 15TH NOVEMBER 2002 THE BURIAL ON 16TH NOVEMBER 2002 – HER MEMORIAL SERVICE WOULD BE ON 17^{TH} NOVEMBER 2002 - EVERY EXPENSES WHICH WOULD BE INCURRED ON THE FUNERALS WOULD BE BORNE BY ME ALONE – BECAUSE I HAVE MARRIED HER ON HOLY MATRIMONY - ALL SHE HAS IS FOR ME AND OUR CHILDREN AND ALL THAT I HAVE IS FOR HER AND THE CHILDREN. PS/WHEN SHE WOULD BE LAID IN STATE I WOULD TRY TO SEND YOU PICTURES ON HER – GOD BLESS YOU ALL"

The World Church and Mission Group decided that members of our Church and Congregation would like to be given the opportunity to contribute urgently to a personal gift for Samuel, so a retiring collection was organised on two Sundays. We give thanks to God and your generosity that we collected a total of £174.75.

We were able to send a Bank Transfer to Samuel on Monday 21st October amounting to US\$ 270 which will convert to well over 2 million Cedis.

So let us do just that and have a quick look at St. Luke's account of the birth of Jesus. (Luke chapter 2 v 1 -20)



Maybe this was a deliberate move by God to remind us for all time that He is always with us especially in the mess and muddle of real life.






Handbook

How can I put into a few lines the wonderful afternoon we had when Mr Alan Readman, the West Sussex Archive Officer, came to our Fellowship - I cannot!!

The West Sussex Record Office in Chichester holds twenty five miles of archives covering one thousand and two hundred years of the County's history.

We had an afternoon of film snippets taken around our Area of West Sussex.

We visited Shoreham, where there was once a thriving film industry, and we saw comedies and dramas which has been filmed there. Just snippets - we would have loved to have seen more of the films! Then came films of Brighton, Lancing our own town Ferring, Littlehampton, Goodwood and Chichester, such interesting films of yesteryear.

It is difficult to pick out the highlights but here are a few - a rescue from the sea at Brighton. Ferring in the 1930s with the old deckchair attendant, we were surprised to see the number of people on the beaches and the number of vehicles travelling along the fronts - bicycles motorcycles and old cars almost like the traffic we see each day but a different type of car! We travelled with the pleasure steamer, the Brighton Belle, one of the Armada of ships used in the evacuation of our troupes from Dunkirk. We saw flying displays of Alan Cobham - how many remember those days of early flying?!

All these films are on videos - silent pictures of course. One very interesting film was of Knowll School, Shoreham, taken during the war. When the siren sounded each class was alerted by a youngster blowing a whistle at the door of each room, then it was down with the pencils, on with the gas masks and when the masks were on work was as usual.

The finale was an advert for Shiphams which was, apparently, made in Chichester, it was in the form of a comic opera with a background music of the operas which we see today.

In her vote of thanks our President expressed our appreciation to Mr Readman for the fascinating afternoon he had given us.

The Southern Synod Youth & Children's Work Forum

Presents, "Playing with Worship"

This was an event held at Orpington URC on Saturday 2nd November.

There were about 60 churches from the Synod represented by about 180 people. The day started at 10 am and was opened with a time of worship, led by our Moderator.

There was a choice of two workshops, "Godly Play" and "Refreshing Worship".

"Godly Play" was hosted by Sue Doggett, the Barnabas Commissioning Editor and Head of Children's Ministry at the Bible Reading Fellowship, (BRF).

"Refreshing Worship" was hosted by Brian Draper who works for the London Institute for Contemporary Christianity, (LICC) he lectures Contemporary Culture.

Unfortunately we could only attend one of these. I chose the "Refreshing Worship", this was because at our District Training Day we had a similar presentation of "Godly Play" led by BRF's Lucy Moore only 2 weeks before.

The "workshop" session with Brian was more of a lecture but that is what

Brian is good at. He spoke about how he thinks that the formal Christian religion has been forsaken by people and churches have entered a seemingly terminal decline. WHY, he asked? He said that he sees that the role of the Church is to tell and tell rightly the stories of Jesus. He says that there are many people who are spiritual searchers and many who are seeking a way to connect their soul with the divine source of all life. To these people the Christian Church can seem like just another product on the spiritual market that people are able to pick and choose from.

"We need to be insecure!" allow people to try new things and that includes youth and children - young people don't block new ideas in the same way that adults can.

Brian got us to think about how it can seem strange to men out side of the church to see other men inside singing love songs to a man, who's name is Jesus, even more so now-adays.

He said that it's not about "jazzing" things up, it's easy to start new institutions this way, but we need to find new ways of going deeper with God.

Brian shared with us the different things that they have tried at LICC, their service "Labyrinth" using visual aids, candles and music to create a pleasant atmosphere in which all five senses are used during worship. He said that it is important that people shouldn't have to participate in everything if it is not their desire to do so. Also meeting at other places outside the church to do secular things so that people don't become one person with the people in church and another outside, for example, more human in church, more Christian in the community.

Jesus used parables to teach, we should do the same, leave endings



open for people to make their own decisions.

After the workshops the two groups convened and a rep. from each session shared some of what they had learnt with the whole group. The children were also able to share their mornings activities with the adults, taking turns at the "open mic" to say what their ideal church would be like, (very interesting!). The morning closed with a two course hot meal.

Christmas Letter from The Moderator

Dear Friends.

"A Paradox, a paradox, a most generous paradox" - WS Gilbert

Isn't life a paradox? Two things illustrate that even as I sit writing to you. Yesterday I was in a glorious garden. It was full of country flowers. Most abundant were the Cosmos in every tint of pink imaginable. As I admired them a wasp sneaked up and stung me. This morning I have a seriously swollen left hand waiting for antihistamine tablets to take effect. The paradox of beauty hiding danger!

And here's another. Today is 11th September — the world is recalling the loss of thousands of lives when New York's Twin Towers were destroyed by suicide bombers. Yet we are also giving thanks for the remarkable rescuers and carers who laboured long and hard to bring succour. The paradox of what Rowan Williams calls "religious hatred redeemed by secular love".

Christmas-time is a paradox as well. I have so often been aware of how our festivities, brash and compulsorily jolly, unwittingly stir up the renewal of sorrow in so many an aching heart — a paradox. Then there is the over-lavish gifts bought to bring happiness, but at such cost that there follow months of debt and anxiety — a paradox. And what about those toy weapons given to celebrate the birth of the Prince of Peace? — a paradox.

The Southern Synod Province



Not that any of these paradoxes are surprising.

The whole idea behind Christmas is a paradox. We celebrate God coming to us in Jesus Christ — the Word made flesh. We marvel at the realization that "love came down at Christmas". And we join with the angels in singing "Glory to the new born King". Yet in a sense the incarnation was anything but glorious. It was about God emptying himself of everything that set him apart from us so that in his humility and humanity he could be utterly at one with us. It is not that this self-emptying somehow waters down who God is, limits his majesty. No. For me, Jesus' revelation of an utterly self-giving God was the truest, fullest revelation of God that could be given. Sacrifice and loving to the uttermost are at the heart of what I believe God is, so Jesus, in the crude cradle and on the cruel cross, paints the most complete picture possible of a God whose supreme greatness is in his self-giving — a paradox.

I think that we find here a key to how the Church should be the Church. It, too, has got to be something of a paradox. Even as we pray and work for Church growth, for the building-up of the body of Christ, we need to take seriously the idea, suggested by a self-emptying Christ, that we will be built-up and effective when we are self-emptying: on the edge as servants of the poor rather than at the centre as cohorts of the powerful; more concerned for the healing of society than for the security of the Church; more ready to take Christ to the world than to bring the world into the Church. It's a paradox, but I think it's the way of being Church which is modelled for us in the way that Jesus was God.

"Mild he lays his glory by, born that Man for man might die". That's the real paradox of Christmas. May yours be merry and rich in many things, but let's allow it also to model for us the best way to be the Church which, like Jesus, will find its real majesty in meekness.

About 100 ladies from West Sussex gathered in the comfortable Salvation Centre in Horsham to learn more about the service, which has been prepared by the women of Lebanon, with the theme "HOLY SPIRIT, FILL US".

Lebanon is one of the smallest countries in the Middle East, less than half the size of Wales, with a population of 3.4 million, and with Christians forming about 32%. Because of its strategic position, Lebanon has always been at the centre of world events. Much of the country still bears the scars of recent civil war, and its shattered economy is not yet rebuilt.

As the day progressed we saw slides of Lebanon, listened to Bible Study given by Mrs Kay McIntosh, and joined in the hymns for the service led by Mrs Elsie Flack. The conference ended with worship and drama taken from the service. Despite all that has happened in Lebanon the Christians held on to their faith, and we are urged to take up the cry of "HOLY SPIRIT, FILL US". We are encouraged to reach out to God for His enabling power in all circumstances.

Women, men, children and young people from many different backgrounds and in more than 180 countries (there are 3,300 branches of the Women's World Day of Prayer in the UK) will be celebrating this Day of Prayer on Friday, 7th March 2003.

Autumn Meeting and AGM - Holy Trinity Church Hall 29th October 2002

A number of supporters and friends from various churches met to enjoy this event. Canon Muriel Pargeter welcomed us then opened the meeting with devotions and introduced our speaker, Miss Olive McCarten - who is the B.S. Representative for Sussex. With the help of slides, Miss McCarten spoke of the worldwide ministry of the B.S., which is changing hearts and lives overseas. and here in Britain too. There is a great indifference to the Gospel in our country - and we need a healing in our society. It is felt that the challenge for future is on video work and literature, to present the Gospel by modern means to make it more acceptable.

We then went off on a World Tour, touching upon some wider aspects of the work of the B.S.

- There is a great hunger for the word of God in <u>China</u> and the Amity press continues to print copies of Scripture.
- In India there are 2.4 million
 Christians. Though there is
 persecution, Bible House is very
 active. There is a work aimed at
 "the untouchables" a literacy
 programme which helps the
 desperately poor to find work.
 The general Hindu population is not
 happy with this change in the

system however.

- In Ghana the ambition of so many is to own a Bible in their mother tongue. With so many dialects there are tremendous problems with the translation process.
- In <u>KazaKhstan</u> there is a work among orphans and Bibles are received with joy.
- There is a school for blind boys in <u>Nigeria</u> where Braille is taught and Braille Bibles are available. Jesus is bringing light into a dark world.

The work in various forms is proceeding in all areas of the world, even in the so-called hot-spots. Your prayerful and practical support is vital.

A short AGM followed Miss McCarten's talk. We learned that giving from the Worthing area in 2000 amounted to £23,565.00 and from 1st January 2001 to 31st March 2002, £21,410.00. Fellowship was then enjoyed at the stalls and over a light lunch.
